Moody's lauds Qatari banks' resilience

atari banks' resilience has been praised by international credit rating agency Moody's, which highlighted their robust growth, asset quality, and substantial capacity to navigate various challenges.

In its recent report, Moody's noted Qatari banks have demonstrated impressive liquidity coverage ratios and successfully attracted significant financial inflows through diverse deposits.

The report notes that, during the recent period, Qatari banks have been primarily funded by customer deposits, which accounted for approximately 52% of total assets as of June this year.

Moody's specifically pointed out the substantial level of deposits from government and government-owned entities, which represented around 36% of total deposits as of June 2024. Moody's commended Qatari banks for their successful efforts in expanding and attracting deposits from the domestic private sector while also drawing in foreign and international deposits.

In its recent report, the international credit rating agency noted Qatari banks have demonstrated impressive liquidity coverage ratios and successfully attracted significant financial inflows through diverse deposits

The agency also highlighted the ongoing expansion in the credit sector, which is in line with the country's economic growth trajectory.

In particular, Moody's observed that credit extended to the private sector is projected to the private sector is projecte

see notable growth this year, reflecting the sustained momentum in implementing large-scale projects within the country.

Moody's forecasts that private sector credit growth will be around 3% to 4%.

Moreover, Moody's emphasised the reduced credit risks faced by Oatari banks.

The agency noted that Qatari banks have effectively mitigated the risks associated with unexpected economic shocks due to their loan portfolios and credit exposures and their ability to manage associated challenges.

A significant portion of credit is directed towards the public sector, which significantly reduces the risk of credit defaults.

The report also underscores the pivotal role of prudential regulations issued by Qatar Central Bank (QCB) and aimed at curbing Qatari banks' over-reliance on foreign funding. **To Page 4**

The Secret Service said it was investigating the incident, which occurred shortly before 2pm (1800 GMT). Trump was injured in an assassination attempt in Pennsylvania on July 13.

National accreditation for public schools launched

The Ministry of Education and Higher Education, represented by the School Evaluation Department, held an introductory meeting to launch the National School Accreditation System for public schools. The system will be implemented in public schools for the current academic year 2024-25.

The public school principals along with several consultants and experts from the department attended the meeting. Director of the School Evaluation Department Nasser al-Yafei delivered a presentation on the National School Accreditation System, which has been applied to private and international schools

in Qatar since 2011. The system aims to enhance school performance, encourage continuous improvement, and ensure quality education and educational outcomes in Qatar. Intensive training workshops on "Preparing the Self-Study Report and National Accreditation Standards" will be conducted for the public schools selected in the first phase. Field visits to these schools will be conducted in the second semester of the 2025-26 academic year. Obtaining accreditation will provide schools with official recognition of quality, creating competition among other schools to achieve national accreditation (ONA)

Call to address traffic congestion near schools

ncreased traffic congestion around the schools' exit and entry points during morning and afternoon have been observed across many areas in Doha, especially around the schools located within areas of high density popu-

Accordingly, parents have called on the entities concerned to resolve the situation to avoid delays and to enhance the safety of students and their parents. A large number of vehicles converge on the schools in the early morning hours and during the afternoon. Limited parking lots cause congestion during peak hours around schools.

Talking to local Arabic daily Arrayah, a number of parents suggested some solutions to this persisting issue that arises at the start of a new school year.

Engineer Fawzi al-Nuaimi pointed out that the schools themselves could play an active role in mitigating the effects of this phenomenon such as regulating the exit and entry of students, and asking the Traffic department's help in organising the traffic around the schools during the entry and exit hours.

He said schools should be built away from the main roads and streets and the construction of the building itself should be designed




in a way that allows ample exit and entry points, with adequate number of parking lots. He also suggested that schools should encourage students and parents to

use school buses rather than their own vehicles to reduce conges-

Zakaria al-Maiid stressed that the most practical solution for this issue is the use of school buses by the largest possible number of students. He pointed out that at some schools around 600 vehicles assemble during the early morning and afternoon hours waiting for students, which causes congestion. Mohamed al-Obaidly suggested that schools could start and end their day early to reduce traffic congestion. All schools and work entities having the same start and end timings could cause congestion on the roads.

Mohamed al-Ghadid said that the daily traffic congestion around many schools is a problem that is very difficult to resolve, especially for the schools located within dense residential areas. While the use of school buses seems to be a good solution, many feel it is exhausting and time consuming for students, he added.

These regulatory frameworks have reinforced financial stability and helped decrease foreign liabilities to 33% of total liabilities (as of end-June), down from a peak of approximately 39% as of year-end

Additionally, banks have successfully diversified their foreign liabilities across various maturities and geographies.

The bond rating company also anticipates that the Qatari banks will shift toward a longer-term funding structure in a lower interest rate environment.

At the end of March this year, the Qatari banks' stocks of liquid assets stood at around 24.7% of total assets, Moody's said, providing a sound buffer against potential market fluctuations and risks and supporting their growth tra-

Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu said Israel would inflict a "heavy price" on the Houthis who control northern Yemen, after they reached central Israel with a missile yesterday for the first time.

Houthi military spokesman Yahya Sarea said the group struck with a new hypersonic ballistic missile that travelled 2,040km (1,270 miles) in just 11 1/2 minutes.

Missile pieces landed in fields and near a railway station. There were no direct casualties, but nine people were lightly hurt while seeking cover. Reuters saw smoke billowing in an open field in central Israel.

At a weekly cabinet meeting, Netanyahu said the Houthis should have known that Israel would exact a "heavy price" for attacks on Israel.

The Houthis have fired missiles and drones at Israel repeatedly in what they say is solidarity with the Palestinians, since the Gaza war began with a Hamas storming of Israel in October.

The drone that hit Tel Aviv for the first time in July killed a man and wounded four people. Israeli air strikes in response on Houthi military targets near the port of Hodeidah killed six and wounded 80. Previously, Houthi missiles have not penetrated deep into Israeli air space, with the only one reported to have hit Israeli territory falling in an open area near the Red Sea port of Eilat in March.

Israel should expect more strikes in the future "as we approach the first anniversary of the Oct first week operation, including responding to its aggression on the city of Hodeidah," Houthis spokesperson Sarea

The deputy head of the Houthi's media office, Nasruddin Amer, said in a post on X yesterday that the missile had reached Israel after "20 missiles failed to intercept" it, describing it as the "beginning".

Hamas official says group has 'high ability' to continue conflict

A senior Hamas official said yesterday that the Palestinian movement had ample resources to continue fighting Israel despite losses sustained over more than 11 months of war in Gaza.

"The resistance has a high ability to continue,"

Osama Hamdan said during an interview in Istanbul.

"There were martyrs and there were sacrifices...
but in return there was an accumulation of experiences and the recruitment of new generations into the resistance."

His comments came less than a week after Israeli Defence Minister Yoav Gallant told journalists that Hamas, whose October first week storming of Israel triggered the war, "no longer exists."

"The number of casualties... is much less than what is expected in a battle of this size, level and breadth," Hamdan said yesterday.

Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu launched retaliatory military operations to destroy Hamas after the group's surprise storming of southern Israel.

The Israeli military campaign has killed at least 41,206 people in Gaza, according to the Hamas-run territory's health ministry, which does not provide breakdowns of civilian and fighters' deaths.

Netanyahu is facing mounting domestic pressure to seal a deal in which hostages would be released in exchange for Palestinian prisoners.

But months of negotiations aimed at securing a truce have apparently stalled.

In the interview yesterday, Hamdan said the United States, Israel's most important military backer, was not doing enough to force concessions from Netanyahu that would end the bloodshed.

"The American administration does not exert sufficient or appropriate pressure on the Israeli side," Hamdan said. "Rather it is trying to justify the Israeli side's evasion of any commitment."

The war between Israel and Hamas has drawn in other groups in the Middle East, notably Lebanon-based Hezbollah and Houthi fighters in Yemen.

Yesterday the Houthis claimed a missile attack on central Israel that, while producing no casualties, triggered a rush to shelters and added to regional tensions.

Hamdan said the attack showed the limits of Israel's ability to defend itself, including its oft-touted aerial defence system.

"It is a message to the entire region that Israel is not an immune entity," Hamdan said.

"Even Israeli capabilities have limits."

Hamdan also reiterated Hamas's view that an attack earlier this month in which a Jordanian truck driver shot dead three Israeli guards at a border crossing underscored widespread anger at Israel in the region

As for leaders who have normalised diplomatic ties with Israel or are considering doing so, Hamdan said they should ask themselves how they would feel if their countries were occupied and the world stood by and watched.

Hamdan said yesterday it was impossible to imagine a scenario in which Hamas chief Yahya Sinwar would leave the besieged territory.

Sinwar and other leaders "are ready to be martyred thousands of times in Palestine rather than leaving it because everything he is doing is to free Palestine," Hamdan said.

Hamas has demanded a complete Israeli withdrawal from Gaza, including the Philadelphi corridor, a narrow strip of land along Egypt's border that has emerged as a key sticking point in the truce talks.

Jordan's King Abdullah appoints new PM

ordan's King Abdullah has designated key palace aide Jafar Hassan as prime minister after the government resigned yesterday, the royal court said, days after a parliamentary election in which the Islamist opposition made some gains in the kingdom.

Hassan, now head of King Abdullah's office and a former planning minister, replaces Bisher Khasawneh, a veteran diplomat and former palace adviser who was appointed nearly four years ago, a royal court statement said.

Khasawneh will stay on in a caretaker capacity until the formation of a new cabinet, the

statement said. Harvard-educated Hassan, a

widely respected technocrat, will face the challenges of mitigating the impact of the Gaza war on the kingdom's economy, hard-hit by curbs to investment and a sharp drop in tourism

In Hassan's appointment letter, the king said democracy should be strengthened in the country and that its economic future hinged on pushing ahead with donor-backed mega-in-frastructure projects in energy and water. The outgoing prime minister had sought to drive reforms pushed by King Abdullah to help reverse a decade of sluggish growth, hovering at around 2%, that was worsened by the pandemic and conflict in neighbouring Iraq and Syria.

Politicians say a key task ahead is accelerating IMF-guided reforms and reining in more than \$50bn in public debt in a country with high unemployment and whose stability is supported by billions of dollars of foreign aid from Western donors.

The Muslim Brotherhood opposition and allies of Palestinian Hamas group made significant gains in Tuesday's election, boosted by anger over Israel's war in Gaza. The Islamists won 31 seats, the most since parliamentary life was revived in 1989 after decades of martial law, leaving them the largest political grouping in parliament.

In a country where anti-Israel sentiment runs high, they have led some of the largest protests in the region in support of Hamas, which their opponents say allowed them to increase their popularity. Although the new composition of the 138-member parliament retains a pro-government majority, the more vocal Islamist-led opposition could challenge IMF-backed free-market reforms and foreign policy, diplomats and officials say.

Under Jordan's constitution, most powers still rest with the king. The assembly can force a cabinet to resign by a vote of no confidence.

Lebanese novelist Khoury dies aged 76

ovelist Elias Khoury, one of Lebanon's most renowned writers and a fervent advocate of the Palestinian cause, died yesterday from illness aged 76, sources close to his family said.

Khoury, who was born in 1948 to a Christian family in Beirut, died in the Lebanese capital where he had been hospitalised for months, the sources said.

Over several decades Khoury produced a large body of work in Arabic that touched on the themes of collective memory, war and exile, alongside writing for newspapers, teaching literature and

editing a publication linked to the Palestine Liberation Organisation (PLO).

Many of his books were trans-

lated into foreign languages including French, English, German, Hebrew and Spanish. One of his best-known novels,

Gate of the Sun, tells the story of Palestinian refugees expelled from their homes in 1948 during the war that coincided with Israel's foundation.

Hundreds of thousands of Pales

Hundreds of thousands of Palestinians were driven out or expelled from their homes during that war, in what Palestinians call the Nakba, or catastrophe in Arabic.

The novel was made into a film by Egyptian director Yousry Nasrallah.

Egypt rail crash kills three including two children

wo children were among three people killed when two trains collided Saturday in northern Egypt, the health ministry and state media said.

It was the latest in a series of deadly accidents to hit Egypt's extensive rail network, which has been beset by ageing infrastructure and mismanagement.

Another 49 people were injured in the crash, which happened in Zagazig, 80 kilometres north of Cairo, the ministry said on its Facebook page. State-owned newspaper Al-Ahram said two children were among the dead.

Transport Minister Kamel el-Wazir said in a television interview that the cause of the collision was "the human element, but what exactly we leave to the security services to determine", adding there had been no technical issues.

More than 40 dead after boat capsizes in Nigeria

ore than 40 people are presumed to have died after a boat overloaded with passengers sank on a river in northwestern Nigeria, authorities said yesterday.

The vessel was ferrying 53 farmers to their farms across the Gummi River in Zamfara State on Saturday when it causized.

"Only 12 were rescued yesterday shortly after the accident," said Na'Allah Musa, a political administrator of the flood-hit Gummi district where the accident happened.

Israeli leaflets tell residents of south Lebanon to evacuate

Israel dropped leaflets over a Lebanon border village yesterday urging residents to leave, state-run media said, but Israel's military said a brigade had taken the initiative without approval.

It was the first time Israelis had told residents of south Lebanon to evacuate in 11 months of crossborder fire between Hezbollah and Israel over the Gaza war, triggered by Hezbollah ally Hamas's October first week storming of Israel

"The Israeli enemy dropped leaflets over Wazzani calling on those in the area and its surroundings to evacuate," the official National News Agency said, referring to a southern border

Wazzani mayor Ahmed al-Mohammed shared with AFP a picture of the leaflets that showed a

map of the region with the areas marked for evacuation marked in red. The leaflet read in Arabic: "To all residents and refugees living in the area of the camps, Hezbollah is firing from your region. You must immediately leave your homes and head north of the Khi-

am region before 04:00pm (1300 GMT). Do not return to this area until the end of the war".

It added: "Anyone present in this area after this time will be considered a terrorist."

Wazzani is an agricultural region where Syrians are often

hired to work the land. Asked about the incident, an Israeli military spokeswoman said the leaflets had been dropped by drone in an area from which rockets had been fired into northern Israel. "This was an initiative of the 769 Brigade, it was not approved by the Northern Command. An investigation has been opened," she added.

In the Gaza Strip, Israeli aircraft regularly drop leaflets urging residents to evacuate before an attack

On Saturday, Hezbollah's second-in-command Naim Qassem warned that an all-out war by Israel aimed at returning 100,000 displaced people to their homes in areas near the Lebanon border would displace "hundreds of thousands" more Israelis.

The cross-border violence since early October has killed 623 people in Lebanon, mostly fighters but also including at least 141 civilians, according to an AFP tally.

Artificial intelligence is 'accelerating the climate crisis', expert warns

you care about the environment. think twice about using AI.

Generative artificial intelligence (AI) uses 30 times more energy than a traditional search engine, warns researcher Sasha Luccioni, on a mission to raise awareness about the environmental impact of the hot new technology.

Recognised as one of the 100 most influential people in the world of AI by the American magazine Time this year, the Canadian computer scientist of Russian origin has sought for several years to quantify the emissions of programs like Chat-GPT or Midjourney.

"I find it particularly disappointing that generative AI is used to search the Internet," laments the researcher, who spoke

with AFP on the sidelines of the "ALL IN" artificial intelligence conference, in Mon-

The language models on which the programs are based require enormous computing capacities to train on billions of data points, necessitating powerful serv-

Then there's the energy used to respond to each individual user's requests.

Instead of simply extracting information, "like a search engine would do to find the capital of a country, for example", AI programs "generate new information", making the whole thing "much more energy-intensive", she explains.

According to the International Energy Agency, the combined AI and the cryptocurrency sectors consumed nearly 460 terawatt hours of electricity in 2022 - 2% of total global production.

A leading researcher on the impact of AI

on climate, Luccioni participated in 2020 in the creation of a tool for developers to quantify the carbon footprint of running a piece of code.

"CodeCarbon" has since been downloaded more than a million times.

Head of the climate strategy of startup Hugging Face, a platform for sharing open-access AI models, she is now working on creating a certification system for

Similar to the program from the US Environmental Protection Agency that awards scores based on the energy consumption of electronic devices and appliances, it would make it possible to know an AI product's energy consumption in order to encourage users and developers to "make better decisions".

"We don't take into account water or rare materials," she acknowledges, "but at least we know that for a specific task, we

can measure energy efficiency and say that this model has an A+, and that model has a D".

In order to develop her tool, Luccioni is experimenting with it on generative AI models that are accessible to everyone, or open source, but she would also like to do it on commercial models from Google or ChatGPT-creator OpenAI, which have been reluctant to agree.

Although Microsoft and Google have committed to achieving carbon neutrality by the end of the decade, the US tech giants saw their greenhouse gas emissions soar in 2023 because of AI: up 48% for Google compared to 2019 and 29% for Microsoft compared to 2020.

"We are accelerating the climate crisis," savs Luccioni, calling for more transparency from tech companies.

The solution, she says, could come from governments that, for the moment, are

"flying blindly", without knowing what is "in the data sets or how the algorithms are trained".

"Once we have transparency, we can start legislating," Luccioni said.

It is also necessary to "explain to people what generative AI can and cannot do, and

at what cost", according to the expert. In her latest study, the researcher demonstrated that producing a high-definition image using AI consumes as much energy as fully recharging the battery of your cell-

At a time when more and more companies want to integrate the technology further into our lives - with conversational bots and connected devices, or in online searches - Luccioni advocates "energy so-

The idea here is not to oppose AI, she emphasises, but rather to choose the right tools – and use them judiciously.

Historic private astronaut mission ends with splashdown off Florida

The SpaceX Polaris Dawn mission, which made history when its crew conducted the first spacewalk by non-government astronauts, concluded early yesterday with a splashdown off the coast of Florida.

The Dragon spacecraft plunged into the ocean at 3.37am (0737 GMT), a webcast of the arrival showed, with a recovery team deploying in the pre-dawn darkness to retrieve the capsule and crew.

The capsule was lifted from the water and onto the recovery vessel half a hour later.


After brief medical checks, a smiling and waving SpaceX engineer Anna Menon was the first of the crew to exit, followed by engineer Sarah Gillis, pilot Scott Poteet and commander Jared Isaacman. A helicopter was due to transport them to land.

"Happy, healthy, home," the Polaris Programme wrote on X. "A new era of commercial spaceflight dawns, with much more to

The four-member team led by fintech billionaire Isaacman launched on Tuesday from the Kennedy Space Centre, quickly journeying deeper into the cosmos than any humans in the past half century as they ventured into the dangerous Van Allen ra-

They hit a peak altitude of 870 miles (1,400km) - more than three times higher than the International Space Station (ISS) and the furthest humans had ever travelled from Earth since the Apollo missions to the

Then on Thursday, with their Dragon pacecraft's orbit brought down to 434 miles, Isaacman swung open the hatch and climbed out into the void, gripping a structure called "Skywalker" as a breathtaking view of Earth unfolded before him.

"SpaceX, back at home we all have a lot of work to do, but from here, Earth sure looks like a perfect world," he told mission control in Hawthorne, California, where teams erupted in applause.

He went back inside after a few minutes and was replaced by a second astronaut, SpaceX engineer Gillis, who, like Isaacman, performed a series of mobility tests on SpaceX's sleek, next-generation suits.

Since Dragon doesn't have an airlock, the entire crew were exposed to the vacuum of space.

pilot Poteet and SpaceX engine Menon remained strapped in throughout as they monitored vital support systems.

It marked a "giant leap forward" for the commercial space industry, said National Aeronautics and Space Administration (Nasa) chief Bill Nelson, as well as another triumphant achievement for SpaceX.

Founded in 2002, the company has quickly outpaced its legacy competitors, now thriving as one of Nasa's prime contractors - thanks in large part to owner and chief executive Elon Musk's fervent drive to colonise Mars.

Since completing their extravehicular activity, the crew have continued to carry out roughly 40 science experiments - for example inserting endoscopic cameras through their noses and into their throats to image their airways and better understand the impact of long-duration space missions

on human health. They also demonstrated connectivity with SpaceX's Starlink Internet satellite constellation by sending back to ground control a high-resolution video of Gillis playing Rey's Theme by Star Wars composer John Williams, on the violin.

Polaris Dawn is the first of three missions under the Polaris programme, a collaboration between Isaacman and SpaceX.

Financial terms of the partnership remain under wraps but Isaacman, the 41-year-old founder and chief executive of Shift4 Payments, reportedly poured \$200mn of his own money into leading the 2021 all-civilian SpaceX Inspiration4 orbital mission.

The final Polaris mission aims to be the first crewed flight of SpaceX's Starship, a prototype next-generation rocket that is key to Musk's interplanetary ambitions.

Vance defends pet-eating story

The Republican vice-presidential nominee has defended his claim that immigrants are eating people's pet animals in an Ohio town, a claim multiple officials say is "dangerous" and unfounded.

Donald Trump's running mate JD Vance (pictured) had made the surprising claim earlier this month - saying that Haitian immigrants in Springfield, Ohio were eating people's pet cats and

Vance is a US senator who represents Ohio.

Trump amplified the claim during his debate on Tuesday with Democrat Kamala Harris, provoking widespread mockery

at home and abroad - but also prompting a series of threats that forced some Springfield schools and hospitals to close.

"My constituents are telling me firsthand that they're seeing these things," an unapologetic Vance said on CNN.

Vance denied any responsibility for the recent spate of threats against

Springfield, blaming them on "psychopaths" and "losers". Springfield's mayor, a local sheriff and the state's Republican governor

have said they have no evidence to back up Vance's claims. "These discussions about Haitians eating dogs and cats and other things need to stop," Governor Mike DeWine said on ABC. "What we know is that the Haitians who are in Springfield are legal. They came to

Springfield to work (and) ... they are very good workers? Thousands of Haitians have settled in Springfield in recent years, most of them under a federal programme granting them temporary protected

Governor Josh Shapiro of the neighbouring state of Pennsylvania, a Democrat once touted as a possible Harris running mate, accused Vance yesterday of recklessly fanning the flames of rumour.

"When they go out and they lie about this stuff, they put their fellow Americans at risk," he told CNN interviewer Dana Bash. "JD Vance should be ashamed of himself. This is dangerous stuff."

Vance denied that his remarks had any connection to the threats against Springfield.

"The violence is disgusting," he said. "We condemn it." However, he repeatedly blamed the problems in places like Springfield on the border policies of the Biden-Harris administration.

Trump, like Vance, has doubled down on his attacks on migrants. Campaigning on Friday in California, Trump vowed there would be

"large deportations" from Springfield if elected.

He has promised to deport millions of undocumented migrants nation-

Harris, meantime, appeared on Friday in Shapiro's state of Pennsylvania, perhaps the most crucial of the swing states expected to decide the November election.

"I offer a new generation of leadership," said the 59-year-old Democrat, underlining the contrast to Trump, who is 78. - AFP

US voters narrowly support Trump's tariff pitch, Reuters/Ipsos poll finds

onald Trump's campaign ow to increase tariffs on imported goods, particularly from China, has the support of a narrow majority of US voters, illustrating his economic advantage over rival Vice-President Kamala Harris, a new Reuters/ Ipsos poll shows. The Republican former presi-

dent and his Democratic opponent have both vowed to pursue tax cuts if they win the November 5 election.

However, voters also credit Trump with being more likely to lower the \$35tn national debt even though independent economic forecasters say that his proposals would have the oppo-

Some 56% of registered voters in the September 11-12 poll said they were more likely to support a candidate backing a new 10% tariff, or tax, on all imports, as well as a 60% tariff on imports from China.

By comparison, 41% said they were less likely to support a candidate attached to that proposal.

The poll showed Harris with an overall five-percentage-point lead over Trump nationally, though the US presidential race will largely be decided in about seven battleground states where the race is tighter.

The poll details Trump's strengths on a key issue, the US economy.

"This is what's keeping the election so close," said Karlyn Bowman, a polling expert at the conservative American Enterprise Institute.

Foreigners held over alleged plot against Venezuela

Three Americans, two Spaniards and a Czech citizen have been detained in Venezuela on suspicion of plotting to destabilise the country, the government said, as the United States and Spain denied Caracas's allegations that they were involved.

The arrests come amid heightened tensions between Venezuela and both the United States and Spain over Venezuela's disputed July 28 presidential election, which the country's opposition accuses President Nicolas Maduro of stealing.

Interior Minister Diosdado Cabello said on Saturday that the foreign nationals were being held on suspicion of planning an attack on Maduro and his government.

"We know that the United States government has links to this operation," Cabello asserted.

Cabello said two Spaniards were recently detained in Puerto Ayacucho in the southwest.

He added that three Americans and a Czech national were also arrested and linked the alleged plot to intelligence agencies in the United States and Spain, as well as to Venezuelan opposition leader Maria Corina Machado.

A US State Department spokesperson said on Saturday that "any claims of US involvement in a plot to overthrow Maduro are categorically false".

"We are seeking additional information. We are closely monitoring the situation," the official added, while declining to provide additional details due to privacy

considerations. Spain also rejected allegations that it was involved (**See Page 11**)

He added that about 400 rifles originating in the United States had been seized.

The Czech Republic has vet to react to the claims.

Maduro's claim to have won a third term in office sparked mass opposition protests, which claimed at least 27 lives and left 192 people wounded.

The Life of Chuck wins top prize at **Toronto film fest**

The Life of Chuck - the latest adaptation of horror master Stephen King's work, starring Tom Hiddleston - won the coveted top prize yesterday at the Toronto International Film Festival (TIFF). Voted for by audiences, the People's Choice Award at North America's biggest film festival has become something of an early Oscars bellwether, predicting eventual Academy Award best picture winners such as Nomadland and Green Book. The Life of Chuck, directed by Mike Flanagan, is based on King's 2020 novella about a banker, Charles Krantz (Hiddleston). It tells the story of his life in reverse chronological order - against a rather apocalyptic backdrop. Mark Hamill and Chiwetel Ejiofor

co-star in the film, which had its world premiere in Toronto, but does not vet have a distributor - a situation that is likely to change after vesterday's win. The first runner-up prize went to audacious musical Emilia Perez, about a drug lord who is of a minority gender, and the second runner-up award went to Cannes Palme d'Or winner Anora, about the life of a New York exotic dancer. The TIFF, opened on September 5, is known for attracting both megawatt stars and a large crowd of cinephiles eager to catch movies before the general public. Last year's People's Choice Award went to American Fiction. which went on to earn five Oscar nominations and win the statuette

for best adapted screenplay. - AFP

US to provide Bangladesh \$202mn more aid

he US is committed to supporting Bangladesh's inclusive economic growth, institution building and development and will provide an additional \$202mn of aid, a US delegation said during a visit to Dhaka yesterday.

The six-member delegation, led by deputy undersecretary of the treasury department Brent Neiman, is the first from the US since the interim government headed by Nobel laureate Muhammad Yunus took office last month following the ousting of Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina after deadly protests.

In a televised address last week, chief adviser Yunus said the government was appealing for \$5bn in aid to help stabilise an economy that has been struggling since the Ukraine war sharply increased the cost of fuel and food imports. Bangladesh last year sought a \$4.7bn bailout from the International Monetary Fund.

The United States Agency for International Development (USAID) said it would provide a \$202mn grant to promote good governance, social, human and economic opportunity and resilience, in a deal signed yesterday in Dhaka.

It follows a 2021 agreement where USAID pledged a total of \$954mn between 2021 and 2026, of which

\$425mn had already been provided.

In a statement released on its Facebook page following the meeting with Yunus, the US embassy emphasised its readiness to support Bangladesh in its pursuit of a more "equitable and inclusive

Yunus sought US support to help rebuild Bangladesh, carry out es-

sential reforms to the judiciary, police and financial institutions and to recover assets stolen by the previous regime, according to a statement from his office.

The visiting US delegation expressed Washington's willingness to support these reform efforts, offering both technical and financial assistance, the statement said.

Philippines sends replacement ship to Sabina Shoal, vows continued presence

he Philippines said it was sending a vessel to Sabina Shoal to replace a coast guard ship that returned to port yesterday after a five-month deployment at the contested feature in the South China Sea, in a swap that would likely irk China.

Beijing had demanded the Philippines withdraw the 318-foot coast guard vessel Teresa Magbanua it claimed was "illegally stranded" at the atoll, which it asserts it owns as part of its broader claim to nearly the entire South China Sea.

"The Philippine side's actions have seriously infringed on China's territorial sovereignty," Liu Dejun, a spokesperson for China's coast guard said in a statement yesterday about what it referred to as Manila's "withdrawal" of its ship.

Teresa Magbanua, which was deployed at Sabina Shoal to monitor what Manila suspects to be China's small-scale land reclamation activities in the area, has returned to port as its mission has been accomplished, the Philippine Coast Guard and National Maritime Council (NMC) said.

"Another will immediately take over," NMC spokesperson Alexander Lopez said, citing an order from the Philippine Coast Guard chief. "Definitely, we will keep our presence there."

Sabina Shoal, which China refers to as Xianbin Reef and the Philippines as the Escoda Shoal, lies 150km west of the Philippine province of Palawan, well within the country's exclusive economic

Teresa Magbanua's presence there has angered Beijing, turning the shoal into the latest flashpoint in the contested waterway.

Manila and Beijing have traded accusations of intentional ramming of each others' vessels near Sabina last month, just after reaching a pact on resupply missions to a beached Filipino naval ship in the Second Thomas Shoal.

Teresa Magbanua's return was necessary for the medical needs of its crew and to undergo repairs, and once it has been resupplied and repaired, it will resume its mission, along with other coast guard and military assets "as defenders of our sovereignty," Lucas Bersamin, executive secretary and NMC chairman said in a statement.

The move followed high-level talks between Manila and Beijing in China last week where the Philippines reaffirmed its position on Sabina and China reiterated its demand that the vessel be withdrawn.

China's coast guard said it would continue to carry out law enforcement activities in the waters under Beijing's jurisdiction in accordance with the law and safeguard its territorial sovereignty and maritime rights and interests.

China claims sovereignty over most of the South China Sea, overlapping into maritime zones of Brunei, Indonesia, Malaysia, the Philippines and Vietnam.

Volunteers rush to help as Myanmar flood toll surges

Volunteers rushed to areas inundated by floods in Myanmar yesterday as the country's death toll from the Typhoon Yagi deluge surged to 113 and remote areas reported increasing numbers of dead and missing

Floods and landslides have killed more than 400 people in Myanmar, Vietnam, Laos and Thailand in the wake of Typhoon Yagi, which hit the region last weekend, according to official figures.

However, with roads and bridges damaged in Myanmar and phone and Internet lines

down, information has been limited. One man said how he had tried to rescue people with ropes as floodwaters 15 feet high surged through the hill town of Kalaw in Shan state on September 10.

"The current was very strong and even some buildings were destroyed," he said, describing pieces of furniture being washed through the streets.

"I could see trapped families in the distance

standing on the roofs of their houses," said the man, who works for a local non-governmental group.

"I heard there were 40 bodies in the hospital," he said.

A businesswoman in Yangon who runs a company in Kalaw said her staff there had reported nearly 60 people had been killed in the town. The junta said yesterday the death toll had jumped to 113 by Saturday night. The previous toll had been put at 74.

It did not specify whether any of those confirmed dead had been killed in Kalaw.

More than 320,000 people had been displaced and moved to "temporary relief camps", junta spokesman Zaw Min Tun said.

At Inle Lake, a tourist hotspot about 30kms from Kalaw, flood levels had risen on Saturday to the second storey of houses built on stilts above the water, according to one man there helping to evacuate his family.

"Whole villages have been submerged" in some areas near the lake, he said yesterday, asking to remain anonymous.

It shared an earlier message on the royal family's X account which read: "Wishing The Duke of Sussex a very happy 40th birthday today!".

That post was accompanied by a photo of a smiling Harry and an emoji of a birthday cake.

Kejriwal to resign as Delhi chief minister

Indian opposition leader Arvind Kejriwal yesterday said he will resign as chief minister of the Delhi regional government, a day after he was released from prison on bail in a graft case.

Kejriwal was granted bail on Friday by India's Supreme Court and left prison on Saturday almost six months after being detained in relation to alleged irregularities in the capital city's liquor policy.

Kejriwal is a fierce critic of Indian Prime Minister Narendra Modiand a former anti-corruption activist whose decade-old Aam Aadmi Party (AAP) quickly rose to mainstream politics, although its clout is relatively small compared to older opposition parties.

AAP had expected that Kejriwal's release from prison would allow him to campaign as a chief minister in regional elections next month in the northern state of Haryana, and in Delhi early next year.

Kejriwal, announcing his resignation as chief minister at a meeting with AAP workers, said he would only return to the post if people certify his honesty by voting for him in the upcoming Delhi election. He called on the election commission to bring forward the Delhi election to November, from February 2025.

"I demand elections be held in November with Maharashtra elections, I demand the elections be held immediately," Kejriwal said.

He was first taken into custody in March by India's financial crime-fighting agency, weeks before the country's national elections, in relation to Delhi's liquor policy.

Scotland's only oil refinery to close next year

rangemouth, Scotland's only oil refinery, is to close in 2025 with the loss of 400 jobs, operator Petroineos said yesterday, as part of plans to turn the 100-year old plant into a fuels import terminal.

Petroineos said last November it was preparing to shut Grangemouth, Britain's oldest refinery. Production will cease in the second quarter of next year, subject to an employee consultation, a company spokesperson said.

The decision was criticised by trade unions and politicians.

"It is deeply disappointing that Petroineos have confirmed their previous decision to close Grangemouth oil refinery," UK Energy Secretary Ed Miliband said.

retary Ed Miliband said.

The site will become an import and distribution terminal for finished fuels, which will cut the number of employees at the site from 475 to around 75 over the next

two years.

Petroineos is a joint venture between PetroChina International London (PCIL) and INEOS Group, a British chemicals firm founded by

billionaire Sir Jim Ratcliffe.

The company cited economic difficulties as the reason for the closure, stating that the company

had invested \$1.2bn since 2011, and returned losses in excess of \$775mn over the same period.

"Grangemouth is increasingly unable to compete with bigger, more modern and efficient sites in the Middle East, Asia and Africa. Due to its size and configuration, Grangemouth incurs high levels of capital expenditure each year just to maintain its licence to operate," the company said.

It said the plant is currently losing around \$500,000 per day, and expects to see a \$200mn loss for 2024.

Petroineos's plans for Grangemouth had been opposed by trade
unions and local politicians and
there were campaigns to extend

production until a low-carbon alternative for its long-term future could be secured. The UK and Scottish governments announced a joint plan yesterday, including a £100mn (\$130.43mn) financial package, to secure an industrial future for Grangemouth after the refinery

This will go towards career support for affected workers as well as investments in local energy projects.

"We are announcing a package of investment to help the workforce find good, alternative jobs, invest in the community and serve a viable industrial future for the Grangementh site" Milliand said

Trade union Unite, which rep-

resents workers at Grangemouth, described the closure as an "act of industrial vandalism."

"The complex is critical to the nation's manufacturing base and energy security," Unite Scottish secretary Derek Thomson said.

Frank Demay, chief executive of Petroineos Refining, said demand for the fuels produced at Grangemouth had already started to decline. "With a ban on new petrol and diesel cars due to come into force within the next decade, we foresee that the market for those fuels will shrink further," he said.

The refinery processes mainly North Sea Forties crude oil, which it has a direct link to via the Forties Pipeline System (FPS), and U.S. WTI Midland. Both of those crude oil grades help to underpin the Brent global oil benchmark, meaning the refinery's closure could have wider significance for the oil market.

Ineos said it is "business as usual" for its other operations around the Grangemouth site, namely the Ineos Olefins and Polymers petrochemical plant and the FPS.

The new Labour government has previously committed funding to look into possible low-carbon projects at the site. The research has identified three possible long-term options, including low-carbon hydrogen, clean eFuels and sustainable aviation fuels.

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Rethinking pain: The hidden burden of abdominal fat

Excess abdominal fat has long been blamed for multiple health concerns. Now, going by a latest study, it turns out that excess abdominal fat could be contributing to chronic pain throughout the body. The study has discovered a surprising connection between abdominal fat and widespread musculoskeletal pain, with implications for how we understand and treat chronic pain conditions.

Researchers from the University of Tasmania and other institutions analysed data from over 32,000 participants in the UK Biobank study to examine the relationship between abdominal fat and chronic pain. Using advanced MRI imaging, they were able to precisely measure two different types of abdominal fat – visceral adipose tissue which surrounds the internal organs, and subcutaneous adipose tissue, which lies just beneath the skin.

The results revealed a clear dose-response relationship – the more abdominal fat a person carried, the more likely they were to experience chronic pain in multiple areas of the body. This held true for both visceral and subcutaneous fat. Participants with higher levels of abdominal fat had greater odds of reporting chronic pain overall and were more likely to have pain in multiple sites like the neck, back, hips, and knees.

Intriguingly, the connection between fat and pain appeared to be stronger in women compared to men. Women tended to have more subcutaneous fat and less visceral fat than men but showed larger increases in pain risk as their abdominal fat increased. The

researchers suggest this could be due to differences in how fat is distributed and functions in male and female bodies.

The results revealed a clear dose-response relationship – the more abdominal fat a person carried, the more likely they were to experience chronic pain in multiple areas. As to why would abdominal fat contribute to widespread pain, the study authors propose several potential mechanisms. Excess fat tissue produces inflammatory compounds

that can sensitise nerves and amplify pain signals throughout the body. It may also place increased mechanical stress on joints and tissues. Additionally, visceral fat, in particular, is metabolically active and linked to various health issues that could exacerbate pain.

The research, published in the journal Regional Anesthesia & Pain Medicine, challenges the traditional view that obesity primarily affects joint pain through increased load-bearing. Instead, it suggests that fat tissue itself may drive widespread inflammation and pain sensitisation. This could help explain why conditions like fibromyalgia that involve pain all over the body are more common in people with obesity.

The findings have important implications for both prevention and treatment of chronic pain. Maintaining a healthy weight and reducing abdominal fat through diet and exercise may help reduce pain risk. For those already experiencing chronic pain, weight loss interventions targeting abdominal fat could potentially provide relief. The sex differences uncovered also highlight the need for tailored approaches for men and women.

More research is necessary to fully understand the complex relationship between body composition and pain. However, this study opens up exciting new avenues for investigating the roots of chronic pain and developing more effective treatments. 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Putin's options for Ukraine missiles response include nuclear test, experts fear

ladimir Putin's options to retaliate if the West lets Ukraine use its long-range missiles to strike Russia could include striking British military assets near Russia or, in extremis, conducting a nuclear test to show intent, three analysts said. As East-West tensions over Ukraine enter a new and dangerous phase, British Prime Minister Keir Starmer and US President Joe Biden are holding talks in Washington on Friday on whether to allow Kviv to use long-range US ATACMS British Storm Shadow missiles against targets in Russia. President Putin, in his clearest warning yet, said on Thursday that the West would be directly fighting Russia if it went ahead with such a move, which he said would alter the nature of the conflict. He promised an "appropriate" response but did not say what it would entail. In June, however, he spoke of the option of arming the West's enemies with Russian weapons to strike Western targets abroad, and of deploying conventional missiles within striking distance of the United States and its European allies.

Ulrich Kuehn, an arms expert at the Institute for Peace Research and Security Policy in Hamburg, said he did not rule out Putin choosing to send some kind of nuclear message — for example testing a nuclear weapon in an effort to cow the West.

"This would be a dramatic escalation of the conflict," he said in an interview. "Because the point is, what kind of arrows has Mr Putin then left to shoot if the West then still continues, apart from actual nuclear use?" Russia has not conducted a nuclear weapons test since 1990, the year before the fall of the Soviet Union, and a nuclear explosion would signal the start of a more dangerous era, Kuehn said, cautioning that Putin may feel he is seen as weak in his responses to increasing Nato support for Ukraine.

support for Ukraine.

"Nuclear testing would be new. I would not exclude that, and it would be in line with Russia shattering a number of international security arrangements that it has signed up to over the decades during the last couple of years" he said

Gerhard Mangott, a security specialist at the University of Innsbruck in Austria, said in an interview he also thought it was possible, though in his view not likely, that Russia's response could include some form of nuclear signal.

"The Russians could conduct a nuclear test. They have made all the preparations needed. They could explode a tactical nuclear weapon somewhere in the east of the country just to demonstrate that (they) mean it when they say we will eventually resort to nuclear weapons."

Russia's UN ambassador Vassily Nebenzia told the UN Security Council on Friday that Nato would "be a direct party to hostilities against a nuclear power," if it allowed Ukraine to use longer range weapons against Russia.

"You shouldn't forget about this and think about the consequences," he said. Russia, the world's largest nuclear power, is also in the process of revising its nuclear doctrine — the circumstances in which Moscow would use nuclear weapons. Putin is being pressed by an influential foreign policy hawk to make it more flexible in order to open the door to conducting a limited nuclear strike on a Nato country.

British blowback

In the case of Britain, Moscow was likely to declare that London had gone from a hybrid proxy war with Russia to direct armed aggression if it allows Kyiv to fire Storm Shadow missiles at Russia, former Kremlin adviser Sergei Markov said on social media platform Telegram on Friday.

Russia was likely to close the British embassy in Moscow and its own in London strike British drones and warplanes close to Russia, for example over the Black Sea, and possibly fire missiles at F-16 warplanes that carry the Storm Shadows at their bases in Romania and Poland, Markov predicted. Putin has tried and failed to draw red lines for the West before, prompting Ukrainian President Volodymyr Zelensky - who is urging the West to be less cautious when it comes to confronting Moscow - to dismiss their importance.

But Putin's latest warning on long-range missiles is being seen inside and outside Russia as something he will have to act on if London or Washington allow their missiles to be used against Russia.

University of Innsbruck's Mangott said the way Putin's warning has been shown repeatedly on Russian state television created an expectation that he would need to deliver.

Dmitry Peskov, Putin's spokesman, told a press briefing on Friday that Putin's message had been "extremely clear and unambiguous."

Markov, the former Kremlin advisor, said "Russia has decided to break" the strategy of "boiling a frog on a slow flame," referring to the West's incremental increases in help to Ukraine aimed at not provoking a sharp Russian response.

"The step that the West is now planning next, it's a small step, but it crosses a red line that we will actually be forced to respond to. We will consider that you are at war with us."

Sergei Mironov, the leader of a pro-Kremlin political party, said in a press statement on Friday: "The moment of truth has come for the West, whether it desires a full-scale war with Russia."

Ukraine escalation Short of nuclear sa

Short of nuclear sabre rattling or strikes on British assets, more predictable responses might include Russia stepping up attacks on Ukrainian civilian infrastructure, Kuehn said.

Mangott predicted Kyiv would bear the brunt of Russia's military response if the West gave it the requested green light, and he did not expect a Russian military attack on Nato territory.

Another option would be for Russia to escalate "hybrid" actions such as sabotage in Europe or interference in the US election campaign, Kuehn said.

Mangott said the danger for the West was that it did not know where Putin's red lines really were. "Allowing Ukraine to use

"Allowing Ukraine to use Western weaponry, assisted with Western satellite images (and) Western military advisers is something that very closely encroaches on vital Russian interests," he said.

"So I think those (people) are wrong who say 'Well nothing will happen, let's just do it?"

Death toll rises as storm lashes central, eastern Europe

ne person has drowned in Poland and an Austrian fireman has died responding to floods, authorities said yesterday, as Storm Boris lashed central and eastern Europe with torrential rains.

Since Thursday, swathes of Austria, the Czech Republic, Hungary, Romania and Slovakia have been hit by high winds and unusually heavy rainfall.

The rains have flooded streets and submerged entire neighbourhoods in some places, while shutting down public transport and electricity in others.

Romanians waded through armpit-high water to safety, Poles sought shelter in schools and Czechs hurriedly put up sand dykes in an effort to keep the water

Yesterday's deaths bring the overall toll from the storm to eight, with thousands evacuated across the continent.

In Romania, two bodies were found yesterday, after four people were reported killed earlier, and one person was declared missing. Four people were reported missing in the Czech Republic.

"The water came into the house, it destroyed the walls, everything," Sofia Basalic, 60, a resident of Romania's village of Pechea, in the hard-hit region of Galati, told

"It took the chickens, the rabbits, everything. It took the oven, the washing machine, the refrigerator. I have nothing left," she

"Heartfelt solidarity with all affected by the devastating floods in Austria, Czech Republic, Hungary, Poland, Romania and Slovakia", EU Commission chief Ursula von der Leyen wrote on X, formerly Twitter, adding that the EU was ready to offer support.

Polish Prime Minister Donald Tusk said yesterday morning that "we have the first confirmed death by drowning, in the Klodzko region" on the Polish-Czech border in the southwest of the country, which has been hit hardest by the

Around 1,600 people have been evacuated in Klodzko and Polish authorities have called in the army to support firefighters.

Separately, a fireman in northeastern Austria died in floods in the Lower Austria region, which has been classified as a natural disaster zone, regional governor Johanna Mikl-Leitner told reporters yesterday.

"For many residents, the upcoming hours will be the worst of their lives," she said.

Emergency services had made nearly 5,000 interventions overnight in the state of Lower Austria, where flooding had trapped many residents in their homes.

A highway from western Austria to Vienna was shut just outside the capital and four of Vienna's five metro lines had been shut in the city, where the Wien river was threatening to overflow its banks, according to local news reports.

In Poland, authorities shut the Golkowice border crossing with the Czech Republic after a river flooded its banks on Saturday, as well as closing several roads and halting trains on the line linking the towns of Prudnik and Nysa.

Tusk said that Ukraine, which is fending off a Russian invasion

in its third year, has offered to send some 100 rescuers specially equipped to deal with floods to help as an expression of solidarity with Poland, which has steadfastly backed Kyiv during the war.

"It's very touching", Tusk said of the offer.

In the Czech Republic, a dam in the south of the country burst its banks, flooding towns and villages downstream.

In the village of Velke Hostice, residents put up a wall of sandbags 500 metres long in an effort to hold back the rising waters of the River Opava.

"If we don't stop the wave, it will flood the lower part of the village," local hunter Jaroslav Lexa told AFP. In southeastern Romania, another body was found yesterday in the worst-affected Galati region, where four people had died on Saturday.

"We are again facing the effects of climate change, which are increasingly present on the European continent, with dramatic consequences," Romania's President Klaus Iohannis said.

Hundreds of people have been rescued across 19 parts of the country, emergency services said, releasing a video of flooded homes in a village by the Danube river.

"This is a catastrophe of epic proportions," said Emil Dragomir, mayor of Slobozia Conachi, a village in Galati, where he said 700 homes had been flooded.

Romania's interior minister said more than 6,000 households and 15,000 people were affected in the

In Austria, some areas of the Tyrol region were blanketed by up to a metre (three feet) of snow an exceptional situation for mid-September, which saw temperatures of up to 30 degrees Celsius last week.

Rail services were suspended in the country's east early yesterday. In neighbouring Slovakia, a state of emergency has been declared in the capital Bratislava.

Heavy rains are expected to continue until at least today in the Czech Republic and Poland.

Stricken **Red Sea** tanker salvage makes 'slow' progress

The towing of an abandoned tanker struck by Yemen's Houthi rebels in August, threatening environmental disaster, is proceeding slowly for a second day, a Greek military source told AFP yesterday.

The operation to tow the Greek-flagged Sounion which began Saturday "is proceeding at a very slow pace", the source said, adding that it was "initially headed north" without revealing a destination.

The tanker was hit on August 21 by Iran-backed Houthis with missiles off the coast of Hodeida while carrying 150,000 tonnes of crude oil.

After the initial strike, the Houthis returned and detonated charges on the ship's deck, setting off new fires.

Damage to the vessel had threatened a Red Sea oil spill four times the size of the 1989 Exxon

Valdez disaster off Alaska. The operation is being overseen by the European Union's Red Sea naval mission, Aspides, which yesterday said the tanker was being towed to a "safe location".

"The salvage of the MV SOUN-ION is a complex operation and consists of various phases," the mission said on X, formerly Twitter.

It added aerial shots of the tanker escorted by two warships, one dated Sunday, in which it is still emitting smoke.

Greek state news agency ANA said the tugboat was escorted by three frigates, helicopters and a special forces team, without disclosing the states of origin.

Fires were still visible on board in Aspides pictures on X dated Saturday.

"When it reaches safe mooring there will be an attempt to put out the fire and preliminary steps will be taken to secure the cargo from leaking," the Greek source said vesterday.

The ships' radars have been turned off for security reasons.

The tanker had been anchored west of the rebel-held port city of Hodeida, midway between Yemen and Eritrea.

The Sounion's crew - made up of 23 Filipinos and two Russians was rescued the day after the

attack by a French frigate serving with the EU mission.

The EU naval force was formed in February to protect merchant vessels in the Red Sea from attacks by the Houthi rebels, who have waged a campaign against international shipping that they say is intended to show solidarity with Hamas.

Since November, the Houthi attacks have caused the sinking of two ships and deaths of at least

four crew members. The Houthis have been firing drones and missiles at ships in the vital commercial route. saving they are targeting vessels linked to Israel, the US and Britain in solidarity with Palestinians over Israeli war actions in Gaza.

41 injured as Russian bomb strikes Kharkiv apartment

said on Telegram that rescue operations were proceeding, with 12 people in hospital, three in serious condition. He said residents could be trapped under rubble. Syniehubov posted photos of heavy damage to the top four of five storeys of the building, with smoke and fire billowing out of blown-out windows.

Zelensky, in his nightly video address, said three other guided bombs had struck villages in Kharkiv region, where population centres have been a frequent target of Russian attacks near the Russian border.

Russia did not immediately respond to a request for comment on the apartment building but has denied intentionally targeting civilians despite having killed thousands of them since it invaded Ukraine in 2022.

Zelensky called for rapid decisions on long-range strikes "in order to destroy Russian military aviation right where it is based. These are obvious, logical decisions. "Every Russian strike of this nature, every instance of Russian terror, like today in Kharkiv...this proves that there must be long-range capability and it must be sufficient."

He said appropriate decisions were expected in the first instance from the United States, France, Germany and Italy, "those whose decisiveness can help save lives." Russian President Vladimir Putin said last week that the West would be

directly fighting with Russia if it allowed Ukraine to strike Russian territory with Western-made long-range missiles.

wo Spanish nationals arrested in Venezuela had no links to the Spanish secret service and Spain was not involved in any plan to politically destabilise the South American country, a Spanish foreign ministry source said yes-

Two Spaniards, three US citizens and a Czech citizen were arrested in Venezuela on suspicion of links to an alleged plot to undermine President Nicolas Maduro's government, Venezuela's interior minister said on Saturday.

"Spain denies and absolutely rejects any insinuation of being implicated in an operation of political destabilisation in Venezuela," the Spanish foreign ministry source said.

"The government has confirmed that the (two Spanish citizens) detained do not form part of the Centre for National Intelligence or any state organisation. Spain defends a democratic and peaceful solution to the situation in Venezuela."

The arrests are likely to deepen Vene-

zuela's already tense relations with Spain and the United States after a disputed presidential election in July. Venezuelan Interior Minister Diosdado

2 Spaniards arrested in Venezuela

Cabello told a press conference on Saturday that two Spaniards were allegedly linked to Spain's secret service and were planning the assassination of a mayor.

He named the Spaniards as José María Basoa and Andrés Martínez Adasne, Photographs of the men were shown on state television.

The father of Adasne, Andrés Martínez, told El Mundo newspaper yesterday his son did not work for the Spanish secret service.

"My son does not work for the CNI, of course not. We are waiting for information from the consulate and embassy. We still do not know what they are accused of or the reason for their arrest," he said.

Cabello also accused three US citizens and a Czech of involvement in terrorist acts, including alleged plans to assassinate Maduro and other officials.

The US State Department said on Saturday that "any claims of US involvement in a plot to overthrow Maduro are categorically false".

The State Department spokesperson also confirmed that a "member of the US military" was being held and noted "unconfirmed reports of two additional US citizens detained in Venezuela".

The European Union's top diplomat, Josep Borrell, called Maduro's government "dictatorial" during an interview with Spanish television channel Telecinco vesterday.

On Saturday, a Spanish foreign ministry source told Reuters it was asking Venezuela for more information.

"The Spanish embassy has sent a verbal note to the Venezuelan government asking for access to the detained citizens in order to verify their identities and their nationality and in order to know what they are accused of exactly," the source said, speaking on condition of anonymity. The Spanish nationals were detained while taking photographs in the town of Puerto Ayacucho, Cabello said.

Venezuela recalled its ambassador to Spain last week for consultations and summoned the Spanish ambassador to appear at the foreign ministry after a Spanish minister accused Maduro of running a "dictatorship".

Eight migrants died yesterday when their overcrowded vessel capsized while trying to cross the Channel from France to England, French authorities said, less than two weeks after the deadliest such disaster this year.

The latest tragedy means 46 migrants have lost their lives attempting to reach British shores so far this year, a regional official said, up from 12 in 2023. The French and British governments

have sought for years to stop the flow of migrants, who pay smugglers thousands of euros per head for the passage on overloaded rubber dinghies. Regional prefect Jacques Billant said the incident happened at around 1am off the coast of the northern town of

Ambleteuse. "The toll was terrible, with eight people reported dead," he told the press near the site of the accident.

He said they seemed all to be men. Six survivors were hospitalised, including a 10-month-old baby with hypothermia, he added.

The boat had set off from the Slack river that flows into the sea between the towns of Wimereux and Ambleteuse. It had 59 people on board from Eritrea, Sudan, Syria, Afghanistan, Egypt and Iran, Billant said.

"Only one out of six had a lifejacket," he said. The dinghy "quickly got into difficulty

and ran aground", he said. "The boat was torn apart on the rocks." Christel

Leclair, a volunteer at a local charity, said a second boat had departed at around 7:30am despite the fatal accident.

Departures "happen the whole time winter, day, night, summer... as soon as the sea is calm." she said. "The boats are more and more

overcrowded. They don't have lifejackets, just sometimes the inner tube of a tire," she added.

"There are children, pregnant women and tiny babies. We're sad and deflated." The Auberge des Migrants (Migrant shelter) charity on X called on the French and British states to "immediately rethink their migration

policy". Billant said that this year French authorities had dismantled 20 people smuggling networks, arresting 77 people of whom 59 have been referred to the courts.

But Charlotte Kwantes, of the Utopia 56 charity helping migrants, said departures would only continue. Without enough legal options for migrants wishing to reach the United Kingdom, "people are continuing and will continue to take the same risks, whatever the quantity of patrols and means deployed at the border," she said. Maritime authorities said Saturday that migrants had made numerous attempts to cross the Channel in recent days, with 200 people rescued in 24 hours over Friday and Saturday alone.

Qatar Museums unveils major new public artwork honouring Sheikha Moza

atar Museums (QM) unveiled yesterday *Infinity Love*, a stainless steel sculpture in the form of Arabic calligraphy, as the most recent addition to the nation's programme of public art installations.

Commissioned from Qatari artist Bashayer al-Badr, the work honours Her Highness Sheikha Moza bint Nasser.

It is installed outdoors at Al Shafallah Centre for Persons with Disabilities in recognition of 25 years of her support for the institution, which protects the rights of the disabled in Qatar and provides services for people with mental disabilities and autism.

The artwork was unveiled by HE the Prime Minister and Minister of Foreign Affairs Sheikh Mohammed bin Abdulrahman bin Jassim al-Thani.

Shafallah Centre executive director Maryam Saif al-Suwaidi and representatives of the QM and various government ministries were present at the ceremony.

Al-Badr has explored the expressive potential of Arabic calligraphy in sculpture since 2016 and rendered the characters of *Infinity Love* in a non-tradi-

tional style, reminiscent of handwritten gestures.

In the sculpture, the initial letter of the word "love" (\mathbb{Z} , haa) and the final letter (\hookrightarrow , baa) intertwine to form the infinity symbol, creating a visual metaphor for both feelings of endlessness and unity, whether the bonds are between two individuals or among the people of the diverse nation of Qatar.

"Infinity Love pays homage to the tireless efforts of Her Highness Sheikha Moza bint Nasser to better the lives of Qataris, especially those in greatest need," al-Badr said. "I offer the sculpture to the public in the same spirit with which Her Highness has dedicated more than two decades of her life to this important cause."

"I am especially honoured to have been commissioned to make this work specifically for Al Shafallah Centre for Persons with Disabilities, where I hope it can offer wonder and joy to the patients, their families, and the dedicated staff," he added.

Infinity Love joins the more than 140 public artworks installed, and often specially commissioned, by the QM that comprise the nation's vast outdoor museum.

Olympic gold medallist Sifan Hassan shares her inspiring journey

lympic gold medallist Sifan Hassan has shared her inspiring running journey – from migrating from Ethiopia to the Netherlands aged 15, to winning three medals at the recent Paris 2024 Olympic Games – during a talk at Qatar Foundation (QF).

She was the latest guest of the Education City Speaker Series, Qatar Foundation (QF)'s platform for dialogue, with the discussion at the Education City Stadium exploring topics such as training, recovery, nutrition, faith, and her future goals.

"I started running as a child. In Ethiopia, running is part of the culture – everybody runs," Hassan explained. "I was born in the city, but I grew up in a village, and we would run to school."

"However, I really like to sleep in the morning," she laughed. "My mum would always say, 'you have to wake up,' but I'd say, 'please, let me sleep."

"However, at school, when you were late, you got into trouble," Hassan added. "And I always got up late, so I had to run really hard to get to class on time, every day."

Reflecting on her move from Ethiopia, Hassan shared how challenging it was initially.

She described the move to the Netherlands as difficult due to the cultural differences, and arriving in the winter made it even harder as she had spent so much time outdoors in Ethiopia.

However, as she explained in her talk,

she decided to pursue running as it was free, and this became her outlet.

Hassan is known for racing vastly different distances, and has won Olympic medals across four different events.

In the Tokyo 2020 Olympic Games, she ran the 1,500m, 5,000m, and 10,000m races, where she won a bronze and two gold medals.

In Paris this summer, she ran the 5,000m, 10,000m, and marathon, winning two bronze medals and one gold.

Speaking about why she chooses to run such a range of races, she said: "I'm a very curious person – when I was a child, I wanted to be a scientist."

"I was always very curious," she continued. "Sometimes I run three hours just to see the end of the route. When I do one thing, I get bored, so I'm always thinking of something new. I really like a challenge. It motivates me."

In Paris, Hassan also made headlines by wearing a hijab to collect her gold medal for her record-breaking marathon race.

"My faith is a big part of me," she said.
"I went to the Netherlands when I was

"I went to the Netherlands when I was 15, I had no family to guide me," Hassan explained. "As a child, you need someone to guide you. But I practiced my faith – this when I really started to practice my faith. Islam has shown me the route, the path."

Speaking about that podium moment, she said: "I was so proud. I am Muslim. I am an Olympic champion."

talk followed the announcement of the QF's Creating Pathways Programme, of which she is ambassador.

The aim of the programme is to nurture sporting talent in girls aged 12-16, with track and field being the first of five elite sports it focuses on.
