The European Union Commission announced yesterday its support for the United Nations Relief and Works Agency for Palestine Refugees (UNRWA) with 16mn euros. The commission said in a statement that this payment is the third provided to the agency since the beginning of 2024, stressing that the Furonean Union will contri to supporting UNRWA during this year with 82mn euros. It explained in this regard that this financial support comes within the framework of its commitment to addressing the humanitarian crisis of the Palestinian people.

Blinken back to ME to push for Gaza truce

US Secretary of State Antony Blinken left for the Middle East vesterday on a new push for an elusive Gaza ceasefire two weeks before US elections. It will be the 11th trip to the Middle East by the top US diplomat since war broke out a year ago. US President Joe Biden, who personally laid out a ceasefire plan on May 31 that would also free hostages from Gaza, has seen new hope since Israel last week killed Hamas chief Yahya Sinwar. Biden, speaking to reporters on a visit to Germany, said he called Prime Minister Beniamin Netanyahu. "I told him that now is the time to move on - move on, move towards a ceasefire," Biden said.

Gaza hospitals under fire; 26 killed Israel army hits 300 Hezbollah targets

sraeli forces besieged hospitals and shelters for displaced people in the northern Gaza Strip yesterday as they stepped up their operations, residents and medics

Troops rounded up men and ordered women to leave the Jabalia historic refugee camp, they said. An Israeli air strike on a house in Jabalia killed five people and wounded several others, medics said.

Palestinian health officials said at least 18 people had been killed in Jabalia and eight elsewhere in Gaza in Israeli strikes.

Israel's bombing and ground offensives in Gaza have killed 42,603 people, a majority civilians, according to data from the health ministry in the Hamas-run territory, figures

The UN Palestinian refugee agency UNRWA said Israeli authorities were preventing humanitarian missions from reaching areas in the north of the Palestinian enclave with critical supplies,

including medicine and food. Medics at the Indonesian Hospital said that Israeli troops stormed a school and detained the men before setting it ablaze.

The Israeli military yesterday said it struck about 300 Hezbollah targets in Lebanon over the past 24 hours, in a widening air campaign now also targeting the group's financial op-

"Approximately 300 targets were hit in the last 24 hours alone," the military said in a statement, after military chief Herzi Halevi said around 30 targets related to Al-Qard al-Hassan, a financial firm linked to Iran-backed Hezbollah.

The United States said yesterday it wants the Israel-Hezbollah war to end "as soon as possible"; and pressed for the enforcement of a UN resolution that required Iran-backed Hezbollah to with-



hostilities between Hezbollah and Israeli forces, as seen from Tyre, southern Lebanon, yesterday.

draw from south Lebanon.

The call from Israel's top ally came as Israeli forces escalated their nearly month-long war in Lebanon, including targeting a finance group linked to Hezbollah, and continued pounding Gaza more than one year into the war

With the fighting raging, US envoy Amos Hochstein, visiting Lebanon's capital, said Washington wants to see the conflict in

Lebanon end "as soon as possible". "Tying Lebanon's future to other conflicts in the region was not and is not in the interest of the

Lebanese people," Hochstein said. Hochstein also said that while UN Security Council Resolution 1701, which ended the 2006 Israel-Hezbollah war, should be the basis for a new ceasefire, the parties had not done enough to im-

plement it since then.

preparing a Gulf ethical charter to leverage artificial intelligence (AI) in the Gulf judicial systems.

At the conclusion of the meeting, GCC heads of the supreme, and cassation courts endorsed the work programme in its final version, with administrative excellence awards being distributed to winners nominated by the six Gulf states. The heads of the participating delegations expressed their appreciation to the State of Qatar for successfully hosting this meeting, along with the unwavering efforts of the legislative and legal affairs sector at the GCC General Secretariat which were the significant contributor to the success of this meeting. MoPH, GA to launch Qatar Healthy Cities programme

he Ministry of Public Health (MoPH) signed a Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) with the Generation Amazing Foundation (GA) to launch the joint programme, 'Qatar Healthy Cities: Sports for Health and Development'.

The MoU, signed by Dr Salih Ali al-Marri, assistant minister for health affairs, MoPH, and Nasser al-Khori, executive director, GA, highlights MoPH's commitment to addressing public health challenges such as non-communicable diseases, mental health, and social inclusion through sport.

The programme is also aligned with the United Nations' 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development and aims to increase physical activity by 15% serving as a global benchmark for WHO Healthy Cities, with plans for expansion following the pilot phase.

MoPH and GA initiated training

at 11 schools in September 2024, targeting students aged 6-12. The programme aims to improve the overall well-being of students in Qatar and equip teachers with the necessary training and resources to deliver the Sports for Health and Development Programme, which focuses on three key learning outcomes: the acquisition of health knowledge, social and emotional skills development, and physical literacy.

HE the Minister of Public Health, said: "The 'Qatar Healthy Cities: Sports for Health and Development' programme represents a vital pillar in the Ministry's efforts to improve the health and well-being of our population. We are not only promoting health and well-being by harnessing the power of sports, but also establishing the foundation for its expansion across the nation.

namic, health-supporting urban environments that place the well-being of all citizens at the

forefront. Central to this initiative is the principle of community participation and cross-sector

collaboration, which are essential components in addressing the wider determinants of health and improving the quality of life in our cities."

It reflects our belief in the transformative power of sport to drive positive social and humanitarian change. We are proud to offer this initiative to the people of Qatar, with the Ministry of Public Health as a trusted partner.

The 'Qatar Healthy Cities' programme will help create healthier lifestyles for our communities, empower our youth, and allow us to play our part in supporting the advancement of our country's National Health Strategy."

The implementation of the 'Qatar Healthy Cities: Sports for Health' programme began with a one-day training session, led by master trainers from Generation Amazing, for 24 teachers.

These teachers are now applying their newly acquired skills to collaborate on delivering sports and health programmes to school students, gaining hands-on experience beyond the classroom setting. The programme is initially expected to benefit approximately 1,000 children.

Additionally, a total of six sessions per semester will be conducted in international schools and Asslam Schools. The Asslam Schools are a network of schools run by the Education Above All's Together Project.

The Together Project provides education for students who are unable to access mainstream public or private education.

Joint military drills cement Qatar-South Korea partnership

he ongoing joint military exercises between Qatar and South Korea represent a significant leap forward in defence co-operation and a powerful symbol of strengthening regional stability, according to South Korean ambassador Hyunsoo Yun.

Speaking at a reception on-board the Korean Navy landing ship tank, 'Nojeok-bong,' docked at Old Doha Port, the envoy lauded the staging of the two-week exercise, which began on October 14, describing it as a milestone in the growing comprehensive strategic partnership between the two nations.

He said this military drills mark the first time South Korea deployed troops and military equipment – including 100 soldiers, Black Panther tanks, and K9 Thunder Howitzers – for joint exercises abroad.

According to Hyunsoo, the drills, involving the Korean army and Navy alongside the Qatari Land and Naval Forces, include

live-fire manoeuvres and collaborative equipment maintenance training tailored to the harsh desert environment.

"Soldiers from both countries are conducting intensive training, sharing best practices in the challenging desert conditions," he said, highlighting the dedication and team spirit of both our militaries. "The friendships forged during these exercises will serve as a strong foundation for lasting ties

between our nations".

Hyunsoo stressed the symbolic significance of the joint exercise, occurring in the year marking the 50th anniversary of diplomatic relations between the two countries, and just one year after President Yoon Suk-yeol's state visit to Qatar, which elevated the bilateral relationship to a comprehensive strategic partnership.

The envoy underlined the exercises as a prime example of this

enhanced co-operation, anticipating even greater defence and security co-operation in the future. "This joint exercise is not only a demonstration of our strong partnership but also a showcase for the cutting-edge capabilities of Korean defence equipment," Hyunsoo said, noting that the performance of these systems proves their reliability and effectiveness in the global market, offering reliable solutions to modern defence needs.

The envoy also underscored the shared commitment of both nations to regional and global peace and stability. He cited South Korea's Global Pivotal State (GPS) vision and Qatar's active role as a mediator in resolving regional conflicts as complementary initiatives.

"Qatar's diplomatic acumen and its ability to bridge divides in the Middle East are truly remarkable. Approved by the Arab Parliament, the Arab Women's Parliamentary Document consists of 16 articles distributed over five main chapters, revolving around empowering Arab women parliamentarians, building their capacities, promoting their popular communication and enhancing women's opportunities to contribute to parliamentary work. The document also addressed the role of Arab parliaments in supporting and empowering women politically, economically, socially and technologically, in addition to many other fields.

The Ministry of Municipality has achieved a 100% increase in the stock of Hamour fish in the Qatari waters, thanks to the Fish Stock Enrichment Initiative, according to the Internal Achievements Report for 2023-2024.

The Fish Stock Enrichment Initiative involved releasing farmed baby Hamour and Seabream into the sea. The increase in Hamour stock amounted to 100% by the end of 2022, at a rate of 2,000 tonnes.

The Fish Stock Enrichment Programme aimed to support fish stock with baby farmed fish, especially species with stocks threatened by overfishing, such as Hamour and other species, to maintain balance between fishing quantities and stock size, ensuring the sustainability of fisheries for current and future generations.

The Fish Stock Enrichment **Initiative involved** releasing farmed Seabream into the sea

The programme enriches the stock of high economic value fish, such as seabream and silver seabream, which is available in limited quantities in fisheries, contributing to higher fish production.

A specialised team prepares in advance for the release of baby fish to ensure its success, equipping fish transport tanks, preparing air

pumps, oxygen cylinders and boats. Baby fish are then loaded and transported from the hatchery to the designated trucks and boats, based on predetermined release sites, and subsequently released into the tar-

geted marine areas. The transport and release operations are overseen by a team from the Aquatic Research Centre, in collaboration with experts and technicians in the field. The selection of release sites is subject to a set of specifications and standards, including scientific criteria for suitable marine areas for the release of baby fish. The areas selected include fish nursery zones, natural nursery areas for marine fish, mangroves and protected areas where fishing is prohibited.

Awqaf, according to the report, built 31 mosques in 2023 while maintenance works were carried out at several mosques across the country. Also, carpets were replaced in several mosques and Imam houses were built. QM is renovating mosques in residential areas as a destination for worshippers. This is with the aim of preserving its historical identity and being a witness to the past while providing present and future generations with an ideal edifice that tells about the country's history.



QM, according to an earlier report by *Arrayah*, listed 67 mosques as ancient and planned immediate restoration and maintenance of any historical mosque by a specialised team.

Experts have been appointed under the supervision of Qatari specialists to give training courses for workers who carry out restoration work in archaeological buildings. Traditional materials are used in the restoration of mosques and archaeological buildings to maintain the importance and authenticity of the archaeological site.



Moldova's Sandu scrapes knife-edge EU vote win

Chisinau

'oldova's pro-Brussels President Maia Sandu said yesterday that her camp "won justly in an unjust struggle" in an EU referendum and first-round presidential elections marked by claims of Russian interference.

The referendum on joining the EU passed with a razor-thin majority in the key electoral test for the former Soviet republic bordering war-torn Ukraine.

Sandu said late on Sunday that Moldova had witnessed "an unprecedented assault" on its democracy," blaming "criminal groups, working together with foreign forces hostile to our national interests".

The Kremlin, in turn, called on Sandu to "prove" election interference in the country of 2.6mn people and alleged "anomalies" in Moldova's vote count.

Sandu, 52, a former World Bank economist and Moldova's first woman president, managed to top the first round of presidential elections held at the same time as the referendum on Sunday.

However, she will face a tough second round on November 3 against Alexandr Stoianoglo, a former prosecutor backed by the pro-Russian Socialists.

"We have won the first battle in a difficult fight that will determine the future of our country," Sandu told reporters, calling on Moldovans to vote in the second

"We heard you: we know we must do more to fight corruption," she added.

Sandu, who beat a Moscowbacked incumbent in 2020, applied for her country of 2.6mn to join the EU following Russia's invasion of Ukraine in 2022.

With more than 99% of the votes counted, the "yes" vote was slightly ahead at 50.46%.

The European Union said yesterday that voting was marred by Russia's "unprecedented interference and intimidation".

Polish Prime Minister Donald Tusk hailed Moldova as a "brave nation", while European Parliament president Roberta Metsola congratulated the country for its "bravery".

In the presidential election, Sandu gained more than 42% of the vote, while Stoianoglo picked up a higher-than-expected 26%.

"We have a huge chance to win on November 3 and we will win," he told journalists at his party's headquarters, calling the vote result a "resounding and shameful failure" for the government.

Fears of Russian interference have loomed large.

Police made hundreds of arrests in recent weeks after discovering an "unprecedented" vote-buying scheme that they say could taint up to a quarter of the ballots cast.

Police said millions of dollars from Russia aiming to corrupt voters were funnelled into the

In addition to the suspected vote buying, hundreds of young people were found to have been trained in Russia and the Balkans to create "mass disorder" in Moldova, including by using tactics to provoke law enforcement, according to police.

Voter Eugeniu Panfi, a labourer, told AFP in Chisinau vesterday that Moldova "passed this (electoral) test ... with difficulty but with gusto", adding the "the hybrid war" with Russia contin-

Pact reached with China on border conflict, says India

ndia said yesterday that it had struck an agreement with neighbour China for military patrols in highly contested border zones, aiming to resolve issues that flared when their rival armies

clashed in 2020. The announcement comes a day before Indian Prime Minister Narendra Modi is expected to attend a Brics summit in Russia. which Chinese President Xi Jinping is also due to attend.

China and India, the world's two most populous nations, are intense rivals and have regularly accused each other of trying to seize territory along their unofficial divide, known as the Line of Actual Con-

After the 2020 border skirmish, which killed at least 20 Indian and four Chinese soldiers, both sides pulled back tens of thousands of troops and agreed not to send patrols into the Line of Actual Con-

"Over the last several weeks Indian and Chinese diplomatic and military negotiators have been in close contact with each other," India's top foreign ministry bureaucrat Vikram Misri told reporters. "And, as a result of these discussions, agreement has been arrived at on patrolling arrangements along the Line of Actual Control in the India-China border areas, leading to disengagement and eventually a resolution of the is-

sues that had arisen in these areas in 2020."

To avoid clashes, the two militaries will patrol contested points along the border according to an agreed schedule, a senior Indian military officer aware of the details told Reuters.

Both sides will monitor the area to ensure that there are no violations, the officer added.

The officer said that both sides would pull back their troops a little from current positions to avoid face-offs, but would be allowed to patrol these areas according to a schedule that is being worked out. Authorities in Beijing offered no

immediate response to India's re-India's External Affairs Minister

Subrahmanyam Jaishankar said

disengagement with China was "complete" and that details would come out in "due course".

"The important thing is if we have reached an understanding, I think what it does is it creates a basis for peace and tranquillity along the border, which were there before 2020," he said at a conference hosted by Indian broadcaster NDTV. "If there is no peace and tranquillity, how can other areas of bilateral ties improve?"

India is wary of its northern neighbour, and disputes over their 3.500km (2.200-mile) frontier are perennial source of tension.

UK officer cleared of killing black man

British police officer was Aacquitted yesterday of a murder of a black man he acquitted yesterday of the shot dead in London two years ago, an incident that led to large protests and anger among the capital's black community.

Martyn Blake, 40, had pleaded "not guilty" to the murder of Chris Kaba, who was unarmed and died from a single gunshot to the head in south London on September 5, 2022.

Blake had shot Kaba through the windscreen after he tried to drive his car, which had been linked to a reported shooting the previous day, away from police vehicles that had boxed him in.

The head of London's Metropolitan police force, Mark Rowley, said Blake had made a splitsecond decision.

"Any fatal use of force understandably prompts huge concern among communities, particularly in black communities where trust in policing is low," he said. "There remains much for us to do to strengthen confidence in our service."

He said no cop was above the law, but the system for holding police to account was "broken".

"I worry about the lack of support officers face for doing their best, but most of all, I worry for the public," he said. "The more we crush the spirit of good officers, the less they can fight crime that risks London becoming less

Blake was acquitted by a jury after a three-week trial at London's Old Bailey court.

Kaba's family said in a statement issued by the charity Inquest that they were left with the deep pain of injustice adding to the unbearable sorrow we have felt since Chris was killed".

An independent 2023 review into the force found it was institutionally racist, misogynistic and homophobic and unable to police itself.

Erdogan rival Gulen dies in exile at 83

'uslim cleric Fethullah Gulen, who was accused by Turkiye of organising a failed 2016 coup, has died in exile in the United States aged 83, his movement said yesterday.

Gulen, who had lived in the United States since 1999, was once a close ally of President Recep Tayyip Erdogan before the two became bitter enemies.

"The leader of this dark organisation has died," Foreign Minister Hakan Fidan said.

"Our nation's determination in the fight against terrorism will continue, and this news of his death will never lead us to complacency," he told a press confer-

The charismatic preacher, who was stripped of his Turkish nationality in 2017, died in hospital on Sunday night, his nephew and a website close to him said.

Gulen moved to Pennsylvania in 1999, ostensibly for health reasons, and from there ran his Hizmet movement, which once operated 4,000 schools in Turkive and 500 others around the world.

Some 250 people died on July 15, 2016 when a rogue military faction tried to overthrow Turkiye's government. - AFP/Reuters

President Biya back in Cameroon after health rumours

Cameroonian President Paul Biya landed yesterday at the capital Yaounde's international airport, after several weeks out of the country amid rumours about his health, state broadcaster CRTV

The West African nation's 91-yearold leader appeared on television after the presidential plane landed, shaking hands with officials next to his wife Chantal, as a jubilant crowd waited to greet him. - AFP

UN proposal on Western Sahara 'unacceptable'

Morocco's Foreign Minister Nasser Bourita said yesterday that a recent proposal by a United Nations envoy to partition the disputed territory of Western Sahara was "unacceptable", citing past rejections of similar plans. In a closed session of the UN Security Council last week, Western Sahara envoy Staffan de Mistura proposed dividing the territory between Morocco and the proindependence Polisario Front to resolve a decades-old conflict. Bourita said de Mistura had already made the proposal in a visit to Morocco in April, which the kingdom had rejected. - AFP

Indonesia's Prabowo swears in cabinet of more than 100 ministers, deputies

'ndonesia's new leader, President Prabowo Subianto, officially swore in his cabinet yesterday, a team that analysts said reflected continuity of his predecessor's main policies.

Prabowo took office on Sunday as the eighth Indonesian president, taking the mantle from Joko "Jokowi" Widodo. In a fiery speech to lawmakers, he promised to eradicate corruption and aim to reach self-sufficiency in food and energy.

Prabowo's so-called "red and white" cabinet has 48 ministries with more than 100 ministers and deputies, including re-appointments of Sri Mulyani Indrawati as finance minister and Bahlil Lahadalia as energy minister.

Sri Mulyani will preside over Prabowo's main programmes, including giving free meals to about 20mn children which could cost the state budget 71tn rupiah (\$4.6bn) in the first year,

a number intended to keep the annual fiscal deficit under a legislated ceiling of 3% of gross domestic product.

A former World Bank managing director, Sri Mulyani has earned plaudits for reforming the taxation system while working under two presidents before Prabowo.

Other key re-appointments include Chief Economic Minister Airlangga Hartarto and Erick Thohir as the state-owned enterprises minister.

Meutya Hafid, a former reporter who will head up the newly renamed communications and digital ministry, said she would focus on data protection, online safety for children and make sure the Internet is accessible to all.

Investment Minister Rosan Roeslani said his focus is on expanding Jokowi's policy of increasing domestic resource processing to include fisheries and seaweed.

Prabowo's re-appointments show his intention to continue the policies of Jokowi, especially on the economy, said analyst Burhanuddin Muhtadi.

"Prabowo does not want to take further risks and that's why he chose key figures that served under Jokowi," he said, adding these appointments give Prabowo some political security.

Indonesia's new foreign minister is Sugiono, deputy of the parliamentary commission overseeing foreign policy.

Zulkifli Hasan, the minister overseeing food supply, said he would expand farming in Indonesia's easternmost Papua region to reach Prabowo's target of food self-sufficiency.

Prabowo's cabinet differs in some aspects from Jokowi's as some ministries have been broken up or renamed.

Education and culture ministries are separate, as well as environment and forestry.

Later in the week, the new president will take his ministers to a three-day retreat at a military academy in the mountains of Central Java where they will stay in tents.

Pakistan empowers parliament to pick country's top judge

Pakistan's government has passed constitutional amendments yesterday giving lawmakers more power to appoint top judges, who have issued decisions favouring opposition chief Imran Khan. Since February elections marred by rigging allegations, relations have soured between Islamabad and the top courts as rulings litigating results have backed the party of jailed ex-prime minister Khan. Under the judicial reforms, Pakistan's chief justice will now be selected by a parliamentary committee and have a fixed term of three years. New benches will also be formed of senior judges from across the country to weigh exclusively on constitutional issues. - AFP

Central Park Five sue Trump for defamation

The five black and Hispanic teenagers who were wrongfully convicted for the 1989 rape of a white jogger in New York's Central Park are suing Donald Trump for defamation over statements he made at last month's US presidential debate.

Known widely as the Central Park Five, the defendants spent between five and 13 years in prison before they were cleared in 2002 based on new DNA evidence and the confession of another person.

Trump, the Republican nominee for the White House, falsely said at the September 10 debate with Democrat Vice-President Kamala Harris that the Central Park Five had killed a person and pleaded

yesterday by Yusef Salaam, Raymond Santana, Kevin Richardson, Antron Brown and Korey Wise, called Trump's statements "demonstrably false".

The lawsuit, filed in federal court in Philadelphia

Salaam is now a member of the New York City Council.

A spokesperson for Trump's campaign called the

case "just another frivolous, election interference lawsuit, filed by desperate left-wing activists".

A lawyer for the plaintiffs, Shanin Specter, said in a statement that Trump's remarks "cast them in a harmful false light and intentionally inflicted emotional distress on them".

Specter denied any political motive in the lawsuit. "I'm not commenting on politics. We are seeking redress in a court of law," he said.

The plaintiffs are seeking unspecified monetary damages for reputational and emotional harms as well as punitive damages. Trump has drawn criticism before over his state-

ments about the Central Park Five. After the jogger's assault, he spoke out about the

case and took out a full-page ad in several New York newspapers calling for the reinstatement of the death penalty.

Trump in 2019 stood by his prior comments about the Central Park Five, and declined to apologise. -

World lags on 2030 nature goals

The world in 2022 reached its most ambitious deal ever to halt the destruction of nature by decade's end.

Two years later, countries are already behind on meeting their goals.

As nearly 200 nations meet for a two-week UN biodiversity summit, COP16, in Cali, Colombia, they will be under pressure to prove their support for the goals laid out in the Kunming-Montreal Global Biodiversity Framework agreement.

A top concern for countries and companies is how to pay for conservation, with the COP16 talks aiming to develop new initiatives that could generate revenues for nature.

"We have a problem here," said Gavin Edwards, director of the nonprofit Nature Positive.

"COP16 is an opportunity to re-energise and remind everybody of their commitments two years ago and start to course correct if we're going to get anywhere close to 2030 targets being achieved,"

The rate of nature destruction through activities like logging or overfishing has not let up, while governments miss deadlines on their biodiversity action plans and funding for conservation is billions of dollars away from meeting a 2025 goal.

The summit in Colombia, marking the 16th meeting of nations that signed the original 1992 Convention on Biodiversity, is set to be the largest biodiversity summit to date, with some 23.000 delegates registered to participate as well as a large exhibition area open to the public.

Whether the participation and pressure can push countries for bolder conservation actions remains to be seen.

The clearest sign of lagging efforts is the fact that most countries have yet to submit national conservation plans, known officially as National Biodiversity Strategies and Action Plans (NBSAPs), though they had agreed to

As of Friday, 31 out of 195 countries had filed a plan to the UN biodiversity secretariat.

do so by the start of COP16.

Richer nations have been quicker to file with many European nations,

Australia, Japan, China, South Korea and Canada having filed

The US attends the talks but never ratified the Convention on Biodiversity, so is not obligated to submit a plan.

Another 73 countries as of Friday had opted to only file a less ambitious submission that sets out their national targets, without details of how they would be achieved.

With so few plans filed, experts will likely struggle to gauge progress in meeting the agreement's hallmark "30 by 30" goal of preserving 30% of the land and sea by 2030. Colombia's Environment Minister Susana Muhamad, who also

serves as COP16's president, said that while the summit needs to assess the plans submitted so far, it must also look to address why so many others are late.

"It could be that the funds are not enough, for example, to be able to produce the plans," Muhamad told Reuters. Countries with newly elected governments also may still be getting up to speed, she said.

Beyond getting countries to commit to conservation policies and plans, a top priority for the COP16 summit is finding new funding sources for poorer nations to meet nature goals.

During the COP15 talks in 2022, negotiators set a goal for \$20bn annually by 2025 to help developing countries on biodiversity.

That is not much more than the \$15.4bn per year that was already flowing for nature by 2022, according to OECD data published in September. While that makes the 2025 target more achievable, it also means the target could have been more ambitious.

"If you're just looking at new money that's been announced since (COP15) to implement this framework, it's pretty thin," said Brian O'Donnell of the Campaign for Nature advocacy group.

Because there is a two-year lag in the data, countries will not learn how much is being spent on nature this year until after the

goal kicks in. - Reuters

Breast cancer therapy in the new era "In Qatar, the national

reast cancer is the most common cancer in women and the second most common cancer overall, impacting 2.1mn women each year. Recent developments in technologies have focused on a more precise approach for precision therapy.

Precision medicine is an approach to medical treatment that considers the individual differences in people's genes, environments, and lifestyles. This approach allows for more personalised and effective medical treatments, as it considers the unique characteristics of each patient's cancer rather than treating all patients with

the same therapy.

In an interview with Gulf Times, Dr Fatima M Qafoud, Acting Director at Qatar Biobank, pointed out the importance of early testing and precision health in the treatment of breast

Q. What are some common misconceptions about breast cancer that you encounter in your work?

A. One of the most common misconceptions is that breast cancer only affects older women or those with a family history of the disease. In reality, most women diagnosed with breast cancer have no family history, and breast cancer can affect younger women and men as well. Another misconception is the belief that if there are no symptoms, screening isn't necessary. Many early-stage breast cancers don't present symptoms, which is why regular screening is critical for early detection.

Q. What are the recommended guidelines for breast cancer screening, and why is early testing crucial?

A. In Qatar, the national Get Screened for Breast Cancer programme targets women aged 45 to 69. recommending mammograms every three years for those at average risk. Early testing is crucial because it allows us to detect breast cancer at a much earlier stage, often before physical symptoms develop. This early detection dramatically increases the likelihood of successful treatment, as breast cancer is more treatable when

The aim of the programme is to reduce breast cancer mortality in Qatar by identifying cases sooner and offering timely interventions.

Q. Can you explain what precision health means and how it applies to breast cancer screening and treatment?

A. Precision health is an individualised approach to healthcare that integrates a person's genetic profile,

treatment strategies. In breast cancer, this approach is particularly powerful, as it allows us to identify genetic markers such as BRCA1 and BRCA2 mutations, which significantly increase breast cancer risk. Beyond genetics, precision health enables the identification of population-specific biomarkers or treatment targets that are prevalent in certain ethnic groups, such as those found in Qatar's popula-

At Qatar Precision Health Institute, we support research to discover unique biomarkers and risk factors specific to women in Oatar and the broader Middle Eastern region related to breast cancer. This includes providing high quality data and biological samples to our researchers to enhance our understanding on how genetic, environmental and lifestyle factors contribute to breast cancer risk. By identifying these factors, we can develop evidence-based prevention programmes, enhance early detection, and develop personalised treatment strategies that are more effective for the local population. For example exploring the influence of vitamin D deficiency, which is prevalent in Oatar, and how it may interact with breast cancer risk and outcomes in our population.

This targeted approach helps us not only identify high-risk individuals for earlier screening but also customise

to guide prevention, screening, and cific biological makeup and overall health, leading to better outcomes and fewer side effects.

> Q. How does precision health improve early detection rates for breast cancer?

> A. Precision health improves early detection rates for breast cancer by leveraging advanced genetic screening and biomarker analysis to identify individuals at higher risk. Women with a genetic predisposition to breast cancer can be screened more frequently or begin screening at an earlier age, ensuring cancers are detected before they progress. Technologies such as AI-enhanced imaging also play a crucial role, identifying subtle abnormalities in mammograms earlier than

> traditional methods. This precision health process, where genetic susceptibility is identified at an early preclinical stage, to the implementation of precision prevention and precision medicine. Through precision prevention, we can tailor screening protocols to those at higher risk, while precision medicine enables more personalised treatments once cancers are detected. Together, these advances enhance early detection, leading to better survival rates and improved patient outcomes.

Q. What specific initiatives or research projects are currently underway at Qatar Foundation related to breast cancer?

A. Qatar Foundation (QF) is deeply committed to translating groundbreaking research into real-world clinical outcomes, especially in breast cancer. One of the key initiatives we're proud of is the collaboration between OF researchers at Qatar Computing Research Institute (OCRI) and Weill Cornell Medicine-Qatar, using the extensive OPHI-Oatar Biobank population cohort data to better understand the landscape of cancer in Qatar. This collaborative research has resulted in significant findings published in The Lancet, one of the world's leading medical journals.

The Qatar Precision Health Institute (QPHI) has played a pivotal role in disseminating these findings, particularly in identifying critical breast cancer genes within the local population. This work has created a pipeline that connects research directly to clinical practice, with QPHI working alongside Hamad Medical Corporation's

Cancer Hospital. A prime example of this impact is the establishment of the Breast Cancer Family High-Risk Clinic, where individuals with a higher genetic predisposition to breast cancer can receive personalised care and screening.

And this is just the beginning. Numerous other initiatives are already in the pipeline, aimed at further advancing precision health and breast cancer care in Qatar. By leveraging QF's research ecosystem, we are continuing to build on our successes, with a clear focus on improving patient outcomes and transforming healthcare in the re-

Q. How is Qatar Foundation collaborating with local or international organisations to enhance breast cancer awareness and research?

A. Qatar Foundation (QF) has created a robust ecosystem across the country, designed to spearhead precision health initiatives with a stable infrastructure that supports both research and clinical applications. This nationwide system allows QF to effectively implement large-scale health programmes with the support local stakeholders like Ministry of Public Health (MoPH), Sidra, Hamad Medical Corp (HMC), the Primary Health Care Corp (PHCC) and others.

On a global level, QF is committed to enhancing the representation of Qatar's population in international precision health efforts by actively participating in global consortia. These collaborations allow Qatar to contribute to and benefit from the latest advancements in precision health, ensuring that the unique genetic and environmental factors of its population are well represented in global research.

In addition to these efforts, Qatar Foundation recently hosted a breast cancer awareness event specifically for female contractors, reflecting its commitment to raising awareness across all sectors of society. The event featured educational talks, information booths, and medical consultations, giving attendees the opportunity to learn more about breast cancer and the importance of maintaining a healthy lifestyle. This initiative is part of QF's broader mission to not only foster cutting-edge research but also to ensure that critical health information reaches all members of the community.

Q. What key messages should the public understand about breast cancer and the importance of early intervention?

A. The key message is simple: early detection saves lives. Regular mammograms, particularly for women in the target age group of 45 to 69, can detect breast cancer long before symptoms appear. The national Get Screened for Breast Cancer programme ensures that asymptomatic women have access to routine screenings every three years. Early intervention not only increases the chances of successful treatment but also signifi-

cantly reduces the need for aggressive treatments. It's crucial for everyone, regardless of family history, to remain vigilant and proactive about their

Q. What advancements in precision health do you foresee impacting breast cancer outcomes in the coming years?

A. In the coming years, advancements in genomic testing and personalised treatment approaches will continue to transform breast cancer care. AI-powered tools will improve the accuracy of mammograms and other imaging technologies, allowing us to detect cancer even earlier. In addition, immunotherapies and targeted therapies based on an individual's genetic profile will become more widespread. leading to better treatment outcomes and fewer side effects. These innovations will enable us to detect, prevent. and treat breast cancer more effectively than ever before.

Q. Can you share a success story or a significant impact you've witnessed through your work?

A. One particularly impactful success story comes from our Qatar Biobank cohort. A woman participating in the cohort had a genetic marker associated with breast cancer identified through our precision health initiatives. As a result, she and her family were invited to the Breast Cancer Family High-Risk Clinic, where they received specialised screening and care. During this process, her teenage sister — who otherwise would not have been identified as high risk - was screened, and an early-stage breast cancer was detected.

Thanks to early intervention, her sister received timely treatment, and the family now benefits from ongoing monitoring and support. This story is a powerful example of how precision health and early detection can make a life-saving difference, not just for the individual but for entire families. Had this family not participated in the Qatar Biobank cohort, the teenage sister's cancer might not have been caught until much later, potentially with more severe outcomes.

It truly demonstrates the ripple effect of these initiatives, extending the benefits of early detection beyond just the individual to the larger commu-

QF launched several initiatives to emphasise the need for regional perspectives on global health and the importance of translating research into solutions with real-world impact.

The World Innovation Summit for Health (WISH), is an initiative of Qatar Foundation, will host its seventh edition of WISH Summit in Doha on 13 and 14 November 2024.

Over two days, more than 3,000 health policymakers, innovators, entrepreneurs, researchers, and practitioners will convene at Qatar National Convention Centre (QNCC) to look for innovative solutions to some of the world's most significant health challenges.

WISH will issue a cancer report highlighting cost-effective interventions for women's cancers in the Eastern Mediterranean Region.
