

CELEBRATING 50 YEARS OF FRIENDSHIP BETWEEN KOREA AND QATAR

his year heralds a significant time in the relationship between Korea and Qatar, distinguished by the 50th anniversary of their diplomatic relations. Over the past five decades, the two nations have forged a robust partnership characterized by shared prosperity. As we reflect this year, it's evident that the relationship between Korea and Qatar has developed to meet the changing dynamics of the global landscape.

Since establishing diplomatic ties in 1974, Korea and Qatar have developed strong cooperation, particularly in the energy and construction sectors. Qatar has become a vital energy supplier to Korea, accounts for over one-fifth of Korea's total LNG imports, underscoring Qatar's importance in Korea's energy security. On the construction and infrastructure front, Korean companies have participated in more than 130 projects in Qatar. A shining example is the National Museum of Qatar,

constructed by Hyundai E&C. This architectural marvel not only showcases cutting-edge construction techniques but also stands as a testament to the expertise and dedication of numerous Korean engineers and workers.

The bilateral relationship has continued to flourish, expanding beyond traditional sectors. Last year, President Yoon Suk Yeol's state visit to Qatar marked a new chapter in Korea-Qatar relations by elevating the two countries' partnership to "Comprehensive Strategic" one. This upgrade anticipates enhanced communication channels in diplomacy and national security, paving the way for closer and

more frequent consultations on policy matters of mutual interest.

Multiple arrangements were signed between Korean and Oatari stakeholders during the visit, solidifying commitments to broaden cooperation into new and diverse fields: defense, new two-way investments, smart and resilient agriculture, healthcare, maritime shipping, and artificial intelligence (Al).

This strengthened partnership aligns seamlessly with Korea's Global Pivotal State (GPS) vision, which aims to expand and advance Korea's diplomatic influence and contribute to the peace and prosperity of the international community. By working closely with many important partners like Qatar, Korea seeks to address global challenges and foster sustainable development. This collaboration is also expected to support Qatar's National Vision 2030, highlighting the synergy between the two nations' strategic objectives.

One of the critical areas where Korea and Qatar are poised to make significant contributions is in addressing issues at a global scale such as geopolitical risks, climate change, and the energy transition. Particularly, the world today faces the pressing need to move towards decarbonization. and both countries can play a more proactive leadership in energy transition and security. For example, Korea has declared its intention to become a major hydrogen buyer, investing in technologies and infrastructure to support a hydrogen-based economy. In a similar vein, Qatar is investing heavily in the production of blue ammonia. By combining their respective strengths and resources, Korea and Qatar can work together in the establishment of the global hydrogen market as early as possible. This partnership exemplifies how bilateral

Korea-Qatar 50th Anniversary Future Forum

50 YEARS AND BEYOND

n September 12, the Korean Embassy hosted the 50th Anniversary Future Forum under the theme "50 Years and Beyond" in Doha. This commemorative event brought together experts from both countries to reflect on half a century of bilateral relations and explore directions and avenues for future cooperation.

During his welcoming remarks, H.E. Hyunsoo Yun, the Korean Ambassador to Oatar, emphasized the importance of building upon past successes while tapping into new areas of mutual interest. He highlighted the importance of the elevation of the relationship of the two countries to a "Comprehensive Strategic Partnership" in the event of President Yoon's commemorative state visit last year. The Ambassador emphasized the significance of this elevation by mentioning that "this marks a new era, filled with potentials, ambitions, and the promise of lasting progress together."

In his congratulatory remarks, H.E. Eng. Ali bin Abdulatif Al Mesned, representing the Qatar Chamber of Commerce and Industry, envisioned "a future where we can identify and develop promising initiatives that not only enhance our economic landscapes but also foster sustainable growth and development for our peoples."

Session 1: Korea and Qatar - a 50-Year History of Successes and Challenges

This session featured presentations on the political and economic cooperation between Korea and Qatar over the past 50 years.

A prominent scholar from a policy research institution of Korea delivered a presentation titled "Korea-Qatar Cooperation in an Era of Geopolitical Upheaval." Analyzing the global landscape, the scholar noted that the liberal order is eroding. She emphasized that Korea and Qatar share vital interests and suggested that they could cooperate in the defense sector and humanitarian initiatives.

In the second presentation, another scholar reiterated the importance of the energy and construction sectors in developing bilateral relations. She emphasized security—especially food security and maritime security—as potential focal areas of mutual interest for the two countries.

During the ensuing panel discussion, panelists reflected on the past 50 years of Korea-Qatar relations and proposed strengthening areas beyond energy and construction for the next half-century. Specific sectors mentioned included renewable energy, regional security, and water treatment. One scholar in Oatar noted that Korea could support Qatar on the international stage by backing its role as a mediator and a proponent of globally recognized values such as human rights. Another scholar from Qatar's academic sector suggested peacekeeping, humanitarian assistance, food security as a possible area of cooperation between the two countries.

Session 2: Beyond 50 Years, Toward **Further Possibilities**

In this session, presenters shared insights on key areas for future cooperation between Korea and Qatar: smart agriculture, renewable energy, and healthcare.

An official from the Rural Development Administration of the Republic of Korea suggested that Korea's advanced agricultural technology could boost Qatar's agricultural productivity, ultimately contributing to food security. Another speaker from the energy research institution in Korea introduced Korea's Clean Hydrogen Certification Scheme. She highlighted the Korean government's proactive initiative in creating a global hydrogen market. A medical business expert from Korea presented a vision of a "virtuous cycle" of inbound and outbound medical cooperation between Korea and Qatar, which could strengthen ties between the two countries.

During the following panel discussions, participants agreed that the three areas of cooperation—agriculture, renewable energy, and healthcare—hold great potential for enhancing Korea-Qatar relations. A representative from international organization in Qatar, who specializes sustainable and environmentally friendly growth, pointed out that both countries have a mutual interest in tackling climate change. He emphasized that Qatar's focus on food security is a key national agenda amid global warming and that Korea can be a reliable partner in this area. Another expert from Qatar's agricultural sector emphasized that the success of Korea-Qatar cooperation lies in overcoming the heat and humidity to enhance agricultural productivity.

The forum served as a valuable platform, bringing together participants from government, academia, and the private sector to reflect on the 50 years of strong bilateral relationship between Korea and Qatar. It also offered an opportunity for attendees to contribute ideas on future areas of cooperation that would benefit not only the mutual interests of both nations but also the global community.

KOREA'S TRANSFORMATION TO A GLOBAL POWERHOUSE

Nollowing the Korean War that ended in 1953, Korea was one of the poorest countries in the world. So bleak was the outlook that Vengalil Menon, a member of the United Nations Korean Reconstruction Agency (UNKRA), remarked, "Expecting economic recovery in Korea is like hoping for a rose to bloom in a garbage bin." This statement might have described the situation of Korea then, but it has been proven flatly wrong.

Korea underwent an extraordinary transformation. Korea's rise began in the 1960s thanks to, among others, government-led

development policies. At that time, the nation's economy was primarily based on agriculture. While diversifying, the government focused on developing manufacturing sector and actively promoting exports to secure bigger market for Korean products. In the 1970s, Korea had expanded into heavy industries such as steel and petrochemicals. In the 1980s, the country's economy entered into a more sophisticated technology-based industry, making significant strides in the automotive, shipbuilding, and electronics sectors. Starting in the 1990s, Korea began investing heavily in

information and communication technology (ICT), biotechnology, and robotics, ensuring its position as a global leader in the 21st century.

In 2011, Korea's trade volume surpassed \$1 trillion for the first time, and by 2022, it became the 6th largest trading nation globally. This rapid economic ascent has earned global admiration, with many praising it as the "Miracle on the Han River." In 1996, the country joined the OECD, successfully transforming itself from an aid recipient to a donor country.

During this period, world-class companies such as POSCO, Samsung Electronics, SK Hynix, Hyundai Motor, and LG Electronics emerged not only establishing themselves as domestic powerhouses but also gaining global competitiveness" should be changed to "Over the course of Korea's miraculous rise, worldclass companies such as POSCO, Samsung Electronics, SK Hynix, Hyundai Motor, and LG Electronics established themselves as domestic powerhouses and at the same time, also excelled in global competitiveness.

Korea's journey from war-torn poverty to becoming a global economic powerhouse is nothing short of remarkable. Through a combination of visionary government policies and a thriving private sector, the nation has not only achieved unprecedented economic growth but has also established itself as a model for other developing countries. As Korea continues to invest in future industries like artificial intelligence (Al), green energy, and biotechnology, it will lead the world in innovation and sustainable development. The Miracle on the Han River is far from over. Korea's story will resonate with the rest of the world.

FORGING A NEW ERA OF **COMPREHENSIVE PARTNERSHIP**

KOREA AND QATAR'S EXPANDING COOPERATION

n October 24, 2023, President Yoon Suk Yeol made history as the first Korean president to visit Qatar as a state guest since the establishment of diplomatic ties in 1974. During his two-day stay, President Yoon met with His Highness the Amir Sheikh Tamim bin Hamad Al-Thani for a summit and attended key events like the "Doha Horticultural Expo 2023" and the Korea-Qatar Business Forum. This landmark visit elevated the two countries' relationship from a "Comprehensive Partnership" to a "Comprehensive Strategic Partnership". While energy and infrastructure had been the cornerstones of bilateral cooperation, the scope of collaboration has since expanded to include defense, investment, ICT, e-government, smart agriculture, and the management of airports and ports.

Fast forward a year after the summit, both Korea and Qatar have worked tirelessly to strengthen their economic ties in these new areas of cooperation.

Defense Cooperation: A Historic Joint Military Exercise

Korea and Qatar conducted their first joint army and navy exercise in Qatar this October, under the enhanced partnership of the two. This marks Korea's first-ever overseas deployment of its state-of-the-art heavy weaponry, the K2 Black Panther and K9 Thunder self-propelled howitzer which performed with impressive capabilities even in extreme weather conditions. For two-week long joint exercise, the two militaries enhanced their operational capabilities.

Driving Forward ICT and E-Government Cooperation

On the digital front, Qatar's Ministry of Communication and Information Technology has been actively working with Korea to boost cooperation in ICT and e-government systems. In March 2024, the Qatari Minister

met with Korea's Ministry of the Interior and Safety during a regional visit to Saudi Arabia to discuss collaboration in these areas. Building on this momentum, the Qatari minister made a follow-up visit to Korea in May, where they met with officials from Korea's Ministry of Science and Information Technology to discuss advancing Al and ICT partnerships. This series of engagements has set the stage for groundbreaking innovations in digital governance and technological exchange between the two nations.

Smart Agriculture: A Solution for Food Security

Recognizing the shared goals of Qatar's food security and Korea's agricultural innovation, the two countries have also ramped up cooperation in smart agriculture. In February 2024, a high-level meeting took place between Qatar's Ministry of Municipality and Korea's Ministry of Agriculture, Food and Rural Affairs

in Doha, establishing a joint committee to drive forward smart agricultural solutions. Most notably, Qatar's Hassad Food and Korea's Rural Development Administration launched a joint project earlier this year to develop techniques for cultivating crops during Qatar's harsh summer months, between July and September. This ambitious project seeks to tackle one of Qatar's biggest challenges: increasing local food production in an arid climate.

Aviation and Port Modernization on the Horizon

In the logistics sector, both countries are exploring partnerships in airport and port operations. Delegations from both Qatar and Korea have exchanged visits to discuss implementing automated systems at Hamad International Airport and Hamad Port. These discussions are expected to yield visible results as early as the end of this year, contributing to further modernization of Qatar's logistics hubs.

In just a year since the Comprehensive Strategic Partnership was established, Korea and Qatar have already begun to realize the potential of their expanded cooperation. As both nations continue to push boundaries, their partnership will serve as a model for other countries looking to navigate the complexities of global economic cooperation in the 21st century.

WHAT TO EXPECT OF FUTURE ENERGY COOPERATION: LNG AND BEYOND

n a world of increasing energy market uncertainty, Korea and .Qatar have maintained a strong partnership over the past 30 years, establishing themselves as each other's largest LNG trading partners. As of 2022, Korea imported 21% (9.7 million tons) of its LNG needs from Qatar, making the country a vital energy supplier. Since the start of their long-term supply agreement in 1995, Korea has consistently ranked among Qatar's top three LNG importers, further cementing their deep-rooted energy relationship.

A key pillar of their cooperation is the construction of LNG carriers. Out of the 128 new LNG carriers Qatar has ordered in the past three years, a staggering 104 in total are being built by Korea's HD Hyundai Heavy Industries, Hanwha Ocean, and Samsung Heavy Industries. These carriers are set to be delivered in phases starting later this year, showcasing the essential role Korea's shipbuilders play in supporting Qatar's global competitiveness in the LNG market. With Qatar's recent announcement to further develop the North Field West by 2030, the

demand for LNG carriers will only grow, paving the way for even more collaboration between the two nations.

Nevertheless, as both Korea and Qatar work to navigate the climate change issue, they recognize the need to expand their cooperation into new energy sectors.

Renewable energy and hydrogen have emerged as two of the most promising areas for future collaboration. Korea, despite its small landmass and limited capacity for renewable energy generation, has propelled ambitious initiatives. Thanks to a variety of strategic policies, the country has nearly tripled

its share of renewable energy production over the past five years, growing from 3.2% in 2017 to 9.0% in 2022. Meanwhile, Qatar has been equally passionate, announcing bold plans to expand solar power. Korea's extensive experience in implementing renewable energy policies could provide valuable insights as Qatar works to transition its energy mix and develop effective climate policies. One shining example of their collaboration is Samsung C&T's ongoing construction of an 875 MW solar power plant in Qatar — a project that could open the door for further Korean participation in future solar developments.

Hydrogen is another area where the two nations are wellpositioned to collaborate. In July 2022, Qatar launched a project to produce 1.2 million tons of blue ammonia annually, marking its entry as a key supplier in the growing hydrogen economy. Korea, on the other hand, views hydrogen as both a critical tool for reducing greenhouse gas emissions and a driving force for new growth. In 2019, the country unveiled its Hydrogen Economy Roadmap, outlining plans to develop hydrogen as a core part of its energy strategy and a major market player. As a potentially significant hydrogen consumer, Korea is rapidly building the technological infrastructure and market demand needed to sustain its ambitions.

This complementary dynamic — Qatar as a key supplier and Korea as a major consumer—creates an ideal foundation for deeper hydrogen collaboration. Together, the two countries could not only bolster their own energy futures but also play a leading role in shaping the global hydrogen market.

With energy challenges mounting, Korea and Qatar's long-standing partnership is evolving in exciting new directions. As they continue to leverage their respective strengths, their cooperation in LNG, renewables, and hydrogen promises to be a model for sustainable energy development in the years to come.

KOREA'S BUILDING LEGACY IN QATAR

ince their first major project in 1976, when Korean companies began constructing Qatar's steel mill, they have successfully completed 137 construction and infrastructure projects in Qatar to date, valued at an impressive \$28.7 billion. These projects have not only contributed to Qatar's skyline but have also laid the foundation for the country's economic powerhouses, particularly in the energy and petrochemical sectors. Korean engineering and construction expertise have played some crucial role in shaping some of Qatar's most iconic landmarks.

One of the earliest landmark buildings constructed by a Korean company was the Sheraton Hotel, which opened in 1979 as Qatar's first five-star hotel. This project set the stage for future collaborations. Korean

Beyond iconic buildings and energy projects, Korean companies have contributed heavily to infrastructure development that keeps Qatar running smoothly. From Facility D, a desalination and combined-cycle power plant critical to Qatar's water industry, to the impressive Doha Metro system that was completed just in time for the 2022 World Cup, Korea's footprint is everywhere. They've also built key projects such as the Lusail Expressway and Hamad General Hospital, improving transportation and healthcare access for millions of Qataris and visitors alike

While Qatar's construction market has been relatively quiet following the completion of major World Cup projects, analysts expect it to pick up momentum in the second half of this year. The continued implementation

of Qatar National Vision 2030, an ambitious strategy aimed at diversifying the economy and improving the quality of life, is expected to drive an estimated 17% growth in the construction sector.

Moreover, in the energy sector, Qatar has announced plans for a minimum of 2 GW of additional solar power plants and aims to double its urea production, opening the door for further participation by Korean companies. As Qatar continues to diversify its energy sources and invest in green technologies, Korean firms remain key partners in these endeavours.

For nearly five decades, Korea's engineering and construction companies have been integral to Qatar's growth, helping to build everything from iconic landmarks to vital energy infrastructure. With more projects on the horizon, particularly in renewable energy and infrastructure, the next chapter in this partnership promises to be just as exciting as

builders have since taken on even more ambitious projects, including the National Museum of Qatar, often hailed as one of the most beautiful museums in the world. Inspired by the desert rose, this stunning piece of architecture has become a symbol of Qatar's cultural identity. Another notable project is the Lusail Tower, a prominent feature of the Lusail district, which showcases the prowess of Korea's construction companies.

In the energy sector, Korea's involvement is equally significant. Samsung C&T and HD Hyundai Heavy Industries have been key players in the expansion of Qatar's North Field, the world's largest natural gas field. Their work includes the construction of production facilities, vital to boosting Qatar's LNG exports. Additionally, Korean companies have been instrumental in building critical infrastructure such as the Ras Laffan Ethylene Plant, the 875 MW solar power plant, and offshore oil platforms, further contributing to Qatar's position as a global energy leader.

KOREA'S LEAD AND QATAR'S VISION WHAT TO MAKE OF THE EVOLVING ICT LANDSCAPE

orea is a recognized global leader in the ICT industry, a position it has solidified over decades of innovation. Since the world's first commercial use of CDMA in 1996, to launching LTE-A in 2013, and introducing 5G in 2019, Korea has consistently led the charge in mobile communication technologies. With cutting-edge technology and widespread adoption, Korea has earned its place as a global ICT powerhouse.

Beyond these, Korea ranks 4th globally in ICT exports (UNCTAD, 2020), 2nd in E-Commerce share (WIPO, 2021), and 3rd in Cyber Security (ITU, 2020), following the United States and the


United Kingdom. Even in emerging fields like government Al readiness, Korea holds a competitive 10th place (Oxford Insights, 2021). It's clear that Korea remains at the forefront of global ICT across all dimensions.

Another area of cooperation with promising prospects between Korea and Qatar is Al technology, as the global need for collaborative frameworks in Al grows more pressing. By sharing expertise, the two nations can apply Al to policy-making, investment, economic development, employment, and education. Korea, a global leader in ICT and Al innovation, can offer valuable insights, while Qatar, under its Qatar National Vision 2030, seeks to lead in digital transformation. Together, they could also explore Al applications in smart cities, public services, and infrastructure planning, enhancing both countries' technological ecosystems. TASTE OF KOREA

orean cuisine stands out for its thoughtful harmony of flavours, textures, and health-conscious ingredients, all deeply rooted in centuriesold traditions. What makes it so compelling is its balance between the spicy, savory, and tangy, with dishes offering a punch of flavour without overwhelming the palate. Each meal emphasizes fresh, seasonal ingredients, often prepared in ways that promote longevity and well-being.

Bibimbap consists of steamed rice, various vegetables, meat and gochujang, which are mixed together and eaten. Tteokbokki, a delicacy made with rice cakes, various vegetables and gochujang.

Korean Dishes - Old and New

Traditional Korean dishes have deep roots but still loved by Koreans to date. Kimchi, a fermented, spiced vegetable side dish consumed by all Korean families, have a tangy flavour that characterizes Korean meals. Bibimbap is a vibrant rice dish topped with assorted vegetables, sliced meat, a fried egg, and gochujang (Korean chili paste), all mixed together for a balanced flavor and texture experience. Bulgogi is a thinly sliced beef marinated in a blend of soy sauce, sugar, garlic, and sesame oil, then grilled or stir-fried, offering a savory and slightly sweet taste.

In recent years, Korean cuisine has evolved, embracing modern twists on classic dishes. Korean-style fried Chicken, famous for its double-frying technique is often served with spicy or sweet sauce, is loved by Koreans and have become popular through K-dramas. Tteokbokki, a spicy rice cake dish, has become a popular comfort food (especially for teenage girls), blending the heat of gochujang with taste of savory sweetness. Bingsu, a shaved ice dessert topped with sweet red beans, fruits, condensed milk, or matcha (there are limitless variation on what you can add), is a loved dessert.

JEJU HAENYEO: WOMEN OF THE SEA

he haenyeo of Jeju Island are a remarkable community of women who have practiced a unique form of underwater diving for centuries. Known as "sea women," these divers collect marine products such as shellfish and seaweed by free-diving — without oxygen tanks — up to depths of 20 metres. Their incredible breath control, endurance, and skill have made them central to Jeju's cultural heritage. The practice, known as muljil, is not merely a profession but a reflection of their close bond with the ocean and their commitment to sustainability.

The haenyeo culture dates back to the 17th century, passed down from generation to generation. In recognition of its cultural significance, UNESCO listed Jeju's haenyeo on the Representative List of Intangible Cultural Heritage of Humanity in 2016. This acknowledgment not only highlights the haenyeo's impressive diving techniques but also their values of community, respect for nature, and sustainable harvesting.

Jeju Island's isolation from mainland Korea has allowed its unique culture, including the haenyeo tradition, to flourish. Visitors to the island are not only drawn by its breathtaking volcanic landscapes — many of which are UNESCO World Heritage sites — but also by the opportunity to witness the haenyeo in action. These women play an important role in preserving Jeju's identity while offering tourists a glimpse into a rare and ancient practice.

One of the key aspects of haenyeo diving is its sustainability. Muljil is about balance: taking only what is needed and returning smaller or younger marine creatures to the sea. This ecoconscious approach has allowed the haenyeo to maintain their livelihoods while ensuring the

long-term health of Jeju's marine ecosystems. Over the centuries, this respect for the ocean has been at the core of their survival and success.

The number of haenyeo has been steadily declining, with over 60% of the current divers now aged 70 or older. In response, the Jeju government has introduced various policies to sustain this important tradition. These include supporting haenyeo schools, helping aspiring divers join local fishing communities, and providing financial aid to encourage new members to continue this ancient practice. Despite the challenges, haenyeo remain deeply committed to their professions, passing their skills on to younger generations, who view the ocean as both their livelihood and their legacy.

The haenyeo are often compared to Qatari pearl divers due to the similarities in their

techniques and their deep connection to the sea. Both groups dive without modern equipment and rely solely on their breath-holding abilities to collect marine treasures — seafood for the haenyeo and pearls for the Qatari divers. This shared dedication to sustainable practices and their centuries-old traditions link these two communities across cultures and oceans.

THE LEGACY OF KOREA'S UNIQUE SCRIPT

very year on October 9th, Koreans celebrate their special national holiday of Hangeul Proclamation Day, a day dedicated to the pride of their unique alphabet, Hangeul. Often translated as the "Korean alphabet," Hangeul is more than a linguistic tool; it's a cultural treasure deeply embedded in the identity of the Korean people.

The Birth of Hangeul

This year marks the 578th anniversary of Hangeul's proclamation. Compared to other alphabets, Hangeul is relatively new, yet it stands out as one of the few scripts in the world with a known inventor—King Sejong the Great—and a recorded history of its creation. During the Joseon Dynasty (1392-1910), the Korean people used Classical Chinese as the official writing system. However, this posed two major issues: the script did not align with the Korean language's phonetics, and it was difficult to learn, creating a literacy gap between the elite and the common people. Determined to address these issues. King Sejong initiated the creation of a new script that would match the phonetics of the Korean language and be easy to learn. Despite opposition from the royal court's elites, who feared losing their intellectual monopoly, King Sejong pressed on. In 1446, he proclaimed the "Hunminjeongeum," or "The Correct Sounds for the Instruction of the People," introducing Hangeul to the world.

The Genius of Hangeul: A Script Ahead of Its Time

What makes Hangeul remarkable is its logical design. Each letter reflects the sound it represents, with consonants mimicking the shape of the mouth and tongue during pronunciation, and vowels inspired by the principles of heaven, earth, and human. This design is so intuitive that even today, linguists marvel at its simplicity and effectiveness. Hangeul's phonetic nature means that words are written exactly as they sound, making it incredibly easy to learn. It's often said that a person can grasp the basics of Hangeul in just a few minutes. Each syllable in Korean is an independent unit of sound, composed of at least one consonant and one vowel. For example, the word "Qatar" is written as, "카타르" with each syllable (카/타/르) reflecting its phonetic structure.

The Legacy of Hangeul in Modern Korea

Today, Hangeul is more than just an alphabet; it's a symbol of resilience and cultural pride. Throughout Korea's tumultuous history, particularly during the Japanese colonial

period, Hangeul became a tool for preserving Korean identity. While attempts were made to suppress the language, the script endured, carrying with it the hopes and history of the Korean people. In modern Korea, Hangeul is omnipresent—from literature to digital communication. It's a living script,

continuously evolving with the times. Hangeul's adaptability has ensured its place in everyday life, and it remains central to the hearts of Koreans worldwide. UNESCO recognized Hangeul's significance by including the "Hunminjeongeum" in its Memory of the World Register, acknowledging its global impact.

The script's simplicity enables intuitive input methods, enhancing the user experience with features like predictive text and autocorrect. As a result, Hangeul seamlessly integrates into digital communication, proving itself well-suited for modern technology. This efficiency is one reason why Koreans are naturally fast at online chatting.

From an unassuming manufacturer of bicycles in the 1940's to a global automotive giant aspiring to be the leading sustainable mobility provider in the future, Kia has had its fair share of success stories along the way.

Part of the story circles to Qatar, where Kia first exported its vehicles, through an initial batch of ten Brisa pick-up truck units in 1975. A decade later in 1986, the official dealership

rights was awarded to Al-Attiya Motors and Trading Co. (AMTC), who would invest in the infrastructure, after-sales support as well as necessary sales and marketing operation to grow the brand.

There was no greater showcase for that growth than in Kia's presence as an official partner for the historic FIFA World Cup held in 2022. Kia's contribution extended far beyond marketing rights as it provided more than 300

vehicles for the tournament's operation, 80 of which were EV's and PHEV's.

Owing to its status as the oldest Kia distributor globally, outside of Korea, AMTC was feted with the distinguished Honorary Distributor award was presented to Mr. Abdul Aziz bin Mohhamad Al-Attiya, AMTC Chairman, during the 2023 Kia Global Distributor Convention in Seoul.

AMTC: A partner in progress

The tremendous growth seen with the Kia brand reflected not only in the global level but in Qatar as well. Over the past decade, AMTC was able to achieve at least a top five (5) rank in market share, rising to as high as 3rd on others.

Towards the end of 2022 saw the culmination of a project more than a decade in the making for Qatar – the FIFA World Cup™, and AMTC was there to ensure that Kia's presence would be felt by providing not support for implementing marketing rights but logistically as well. More than three hundred (300) vehicles for FIFA and Kia's were prepared extensively from inspection to branding. Nearly a hundred of these vehicles were of eco-friendly models for which some was seen in the local and regional markets for the first time – the EV6, Niro PHEV and Sorento PHEV models.

Among the highlights of the whole tournament was hosting the Kia leadership team led by its President, Mr. Ho-Sung Song during the inauguration of the revamped Kia City facility in December 2022. It was a period that saw AMTC's Chairman and his management team lead the way in receiving waves of high-profile guests and providing support as needed.

In recognition of the presence and contribution of AMTC to the Kia brand, the accolade of Honorary Distributor was awarded to AMTC during the 2023 Global Distributor Convention in Korea. No less than Eui-sun Chung, Chairman of the Hyundai Motor Group (HMG), presented the award to Abdul Aziz Al-Attiya, Chairman of AMTC.

With the global move towards sustainability, Kia had initiated another ambitious project with its lofty Plan 'S" strategy. Three key pillars support this corporate vision – 'people', 'planet' and 'profit'. Under these pillars, Kia will strive to enhance customer value and nurture talents, reduce carbon emissions in consideration for the environment, and generate profits while working as a responsible corporate citizen.

Cognizant of this direction, AMTC is forging ahead as it has started infrastructure investments in the full transformation of all facilities into the new SI and EV charging, maintenance and repair and parts storage. The AMTC team is also moving ahead with intensive training for its customer-facing teams to help consumers understand EV's and their ownership benefits and requirements.

No matter how daunting or challenging the times ahead may be, the local market can be assured that AMTC will continue to remain steadfast in the time-tested principles and slogan imparted by its founder. To grow surely and steadily while providing unparalleled business integrity and transparency.
