




PM meets Jordan's deputy premier

Ministry of Environment launches 2024-30 strategy

Under the patronage of HE the Prime Minister and Minister of Foreign Affairs Sheikh Mohammed bin Abdulrahman bin Jassim al-Thani, the Ministry of Environment and Climate Change yesterday launched its 2024-2030 strategy, which was prepared under the slogan "Together towards a sustainable environment for a better future". The new strategy was launched in the presence of a number of Sheikhs, Ministers and officials in entities related to environmental work.

In his speech on this occasion, HE the Minister of Environment and Climate Change Dr Abdullah bin Abdulaziz bin Turki al-Subaie, said that the launch of the strategy represents a pivotal step towards the commitment to achieving Qatar National Vision 2030, especially since the world today faces unprecedented environmental challenges, which makes the ministry's role essential in leading the sustainability sector within the third national development strategy.

He added that within the framework of a comprehensive and sustainable approach to addressing contemporary environmental issues, and benefiting from previous lessons, the state has set a set of targets that reflect its vision for a sustainable environmental future, primarily enhancing sustainability practices and cut 25% of greenhouse gas emissions by 2030, restoring 30% of the area of environmentally affected natural resources, protecting 30% of island and coastal areas, and preserving 17 endemic and endangered species.

His Excellency explained that achieving these goals is part of the ministry's comprehensive efforts to preserve biodiversity, so more than 30 initiatives and more than 100 projects have been developed to achieve the desired goals and sustain them in the long term, expressing in this context his thanks and appreciation to the partners for their contributions and co-operation during the previous stages, and his aspiration for this co-operation to continue in the next stage, reflecting the



joint commitment to achieving national goals.

He also pointed out that the ministry's strategic vision aims to achieve a sustainable and balanced environment with development, and capable of adapting to climate change, by focusing on protecting the environment and preserving natural resources through joint institutional and community co-operation, supporting an effective regulatory framework, and enhancing public environmental awareness relying on four main axes.

The first axis, he explained, is "Environmental Sustainability and Climate Change", which is the core of the ministry's work through protecting the environment and natural reserves; comprehensive management of hazardous radioactive and chemical materials; and combating climate change, while promoting environmental sustainability practices that preserve natural resources for future generations.

The second axis, "Innovation and Digital Transformation", aims to enhance research and development, and find innovative solutions that increase the efficiency of the Ministry's activities that face environmental challenges, with a focus on digital transformation to support the sustainability of environmental activities, His Excellency said.

The third axis, "Governance", focuses on strengthening environmental legislation and

policies, and building modern legal frameworks that ensure commitment to implementing standards while accurately and effectively following up on project implementation and ensuring accountability and responsibility for the environment, said HE the Minister.

The fourth axis, "Sustainable Institutional Development," seeks to enhance institutional capabilities, community co-operation, and raise environmental awareness to ensure effective participation in achieving national goals, he added.

HE the Minister of Environment and Climate Change said that launching this strategy is the beginning of a new journey towards achieving ambitious goals, protecting the environment and promoting sustainability, all of which are responsibilities that fall on everyone's shoulders, and can only be achieved through joint work and strong commitment.

The vision of the Ministry of Environment and Climate Change's strategy (2024-2030) is to provide a sustainable environment that is balanced with development, capable of adapting to climate change, and working to deliver a message of protecting the environment and preserving its natural resources through joint institutional and community co-operation and with the support of an effective regulatory framework, and enhancing public environmental awareness. Qatar to host OIC anti-corruption law enforcement meeting on Nov 26

Under the patronage of HE the Prime Minister and Minister of Foreign Affairs Sheikh Mohammed bin Abdulrahman bin Jassim al-Thani, Qatar will host the Second Ministerial Meeting of Anti-Corruption Law Enforcement Authorities of the Member States of the Organisation of Islamic Co-operation (OIC).

The event, organised by the Administrative Control and Transparency Authority (ACTA), will take place on Nov 26-27 in Doha.

During a press conference held yesterday, Abdul Wahab Saleh al-Kuwaiti, the official spokesperson for the ministerial meeting, stated that combating corruption is no longer just a procedural task but a shared responsibility requiring co-operation and solidarity from all, including government officials, media representatives, and members of civil society.

He added that the meeting is evidence of the participants' strong commitment to combating corruption and promoting integrity and transparency, supporting the joint efforts to entrench principles of accountability and justice in the institutions and societies.

Al-Kuwaiti expressed his hope that the upcoming ministerial meeting would serve as an effective step toward achieving shared goals and exchanging expertise and practices that advance anti-corruption efforts in Islamic countries for the benefit of their peoples and nations.

He pointed out that the meeting, held every two years, aims to enhance the exchange of information and investigations among law enforcement authorities with



efficiency and speed. This collaboration facilitates the prevention, detection, investigation, and prosecution of crimes covered by the Makkah Al-Mukarramah Convention and contributes to the recovery and restitution of stolen assets. The meeting also seeks to bolster technical assistance, training, and expertise sharing between participating states to improve the effectiveness of their anti-corruption efforts.

Al-Kuwaiti added that the meeting of anti-corruption law enforcement agencies in OIC member states is the second-largest international gathering in this field. It brings together heads of anti-corruption enforcement authorities from 56 countries, alongside key national entities, including the Ministry of Interior, the Public Prosecution, and the Ministry of Justice, along with the UN Office on Drugs and Crime (UNODC) and the International Criminal Police Organisation (Interpol).

The meeting is also attended by OIC representatives, the Egmont Group, the International Anti-Corruption Academy, the World Bank, the Arab League, the GCC General Secretariat, Transparency International, the African Union, the European Union, and the GLOBE Network.

ACTA Director of Public Relations and Communications Eid Saeed al-Hajri said that Qatar has taken comprehensive steps for the successful organisation of the event, both logically and in terms of media coverage. A central committee and task forces have been formed, bringing together multiple national entities, including the Ministry of Interior, Ministry of Foreign Affairs, Lekhwiya Internal Security Force, Ministry of Public Health, Vodafone, the visitors' entry committee (Hayya), Qatar Airways, the Government Communications Office, Qatar News Agency, and Qatar Tourism.

Al-Hajri revealed that Qatar and Saudi Arabia will sign the Makkah Al-Mukarramah Convention during the event, signalling the intention of the member states to protect integrity and combat corruption in all its forms and manifestations, and the importance of seeking to establish effective practices to combat corruption in all forms.

ACTA Director of Public Relations and Communications also announced that Qatar would sign a memorandum of understanding with Saudi Arabia and Jordan in the area of enhancing integrity and combating corruption. (QNA)

GSC conference discusses transformations reshaping Gulf and Middle East

The Gulf Studies Center (GSC) at the College of Arts and Sciences, Qatar University (QU), in collaboration with Waseda University in Japan, hosted the 9th Annual International Interdisciplinary Conference under the theme "The Gulf in the Emerging Regional (Dis)Order." The conference featured expert-led sessions exploring topics such as energy transitions, geopolitical challenges, and security dynamics. Attendees also discussed policy recommendations and strategies for effectively responding to the emerging regional order.

Over two days, the conference will explore several critical



topics. These include theoretical perspectives on the chaos of the emerging regional order, the Gulf's role within the broader international system, ongoing and emerging conflicts in the Middle East and their impact on the Gulf region, and the interplay between the Indo-Pacific and Middle East in shaping regional order and chaos. Discussions will also delve into the role of governmental and non-governmental actors in Gulf international relations and examine policymaking within the emerging regional order. (QNA)

Climate change awareness video contest for students announced

The Ministry of Environment and Climate Change (MoECC) has announced the launch of an innovative awareness competition for high school and university students.

Entries should be in the form of videos in Arabic or English. The content must be original and address the following topics: Reducing plastic consumption, protection of natural resources, recycling, planting trees and afforestation, and renewable energy.

The content of the video should focus on raising awareness of the impacts of climate change and the possible solution for the involved issues.

The video should be at least HD quality (720p), may be shot using smart phones or professional cameras, must comply with the sustainability regulations and the related environmental laws and should not contain any offensive or inappropriate material.

Entries will be accepted from individuals or teams of up to three students. However, no professional film makers will be allowed in this competition.

The whole video must be completely produced by the participants. In case of using external content, it must be licensed and free of intellectual property rights. Participants have the intellectual property rights to their videos but they will grant the organising entity the use of the submitted videos, uploaded on YouTube, Google Drive, or the other accepted platforms. Each participant has the right to submit only one video. To participate, the video link has to be sent by e-mail to prd@mecc.gov.qa. The competition will have prizes worth QR30,000.

Shura Council participates in Baku climate conference

The Shura Council participated in the 29th session of the Conference of the Parties (COP29) to the UN Framework Convention on Climate Change which concluded yesterday in Baku, Azerbaijan.

Shura Council members Nasser bin Mohammed al-Nuaimi and Nasser bin Mutarrif al-Humaidi represented the Shura Council in the two-day conference.

In his opening remarks before the first session titled: "Making climate commitments a reality: parliaments' role in raising

mitigation ambition and implementing nationally determined contributions", al-Nuaimi shed light on Qatar's role in backing climate efforts through executing clear-eyed policies based on the Qatar National Vision 2030, and the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs).

He noted that the ambitious projects Qatar has launched in clean energy, highlighting that these projects are the largest renewable energy initiatives in the region, which help reduce dependence on fossil fuels and significantly cut carbon emissions, underscoring the State's unwavering efforts in advancing carbon capture and storage technologies.

He noted that Qatar aims to capture 5mn tonnes of carbon emissions annually by 2030, as these initiatives are part of the country's commitment to fulfilling its international obligations under the Paris Agreement.

In another session that discussed the topic of addressing climate vulnerability, and promoting an inclusive and equitable approach to climate action, al-Humaidi affirmed the importance of pursuing an overall approach that ensures the engagement of all nations, especially those which are more vulnerable to climate change effects, such as small island states, mountainous countries, and landlocked nations.

He stressed that climate challenges require a comprehensive international response that considers the needs of these countries, citing the Qatar National Environment and Climate Change Strategy 2021-2030, which aims to enhance energy efficiency and increase reliance on renewable energy sources, such as solar and wind energy.

He noted that the Al Daayen solar power plant project, which intends to produce 500 megawatts by 2025, thereby contributing to reducing dependence on traditional energy sources, emphasizing Qatar's role in supporting developing countries.

He stressed Qatar's active engagement in supporting the



Green Climate Fund and renewable energy projects in Africa, as these projects helped improve the living conditions in remote communities suffering from resource scarcity.

The participants discussed the significance of promoting climate justice by providing support to the most affected countries and communities, and ensuring the implementation of overarching and enduring solutions.

Through this collaboration, Gord and JMIC will help shape the future of sustainable event management, enabling organisers worldwide to align their activities with the climate goals of the Paris Agreement.

In the realm of sustainable energy, Gord has signed an MoU with the Regional Centre for Renewable Energy and Energy Efficiency. Qatar strongly condemns UNRWA school bombing in Gaza

Qatar strongly condemned yesterday the Israeli occupation's bombing of a school affiliated with the UN Relief and Works Agency for Palestine Refugees (UNRWA), which shelters displaced persons in the Al Shati camp in the Gaza Strip, and led to several deaths and injuries, considering it a continuation of the occupation's policies targeting unarmed civilians, civilian infrastructure and a blatant violation of the principles

of international law and international humanitarian law. In a statement, the Ministry of Foreign Affairs warned of the serious repercussions of the occupation's attempts to obstruct the activities of UNRWA, including education services, after the Israeli Knesset passed draft laws banning its activities in the occupied Palestinian territories, and its earlier approval of a draft law classifying it as a terrorist organisation. Renewable energy is not sustainable without justice: GU-Q professor

An academic has highlighted that the energy policy is really about people and it is not just a material to be governed, as it is a political relationship with the people who extract it.

Dr Trish Kahle, an assistant professor at Georgetown University in Qatar (GU-Q) said: "How energy is governed in a country is the key to understanding its political system and agenda" while launching her first book *Energy Citizenship: Coal and Democracy in the American Century*.

Recently published by Columbia University Press Dr Kahle's book highlights that energy and its governance have a profound impact on society as the foundation of political economy.

Dr Kahle's book delves into the human side of energy, offering a new perspective on the history of coal miners in America and the imprints they have left on the country's laws and political imagination.

Yet her research is not confined to American history alone, it also addresses broader global trends affecting governance and injustice worldwide.

"Labour injustice and environmental destruction associated with extractive mining has a long life, and can undercut a government's aspirational claims to democracy, and people's ability to participate in it, even if they receive financial benefits," noted the academic.

tive, Dr Kahle, Dr Firat Oruc, and Dr Victoria Googasian.

In her book Dr Kahle examines the struggles of coal miners and the rights they fought to secure, from the Progressive Era in the 1880s through president Reagan's election in 1980. She also emphasises the core contradictions between the mines as an engine of democratic politics, and a source of violence, oppression, and environmental destruction. The result is a strong case to rethink energy production in terms of its human costs and benefits, rather than solely thinking of the environmental costs and benefits. Whether the energy raw materials are used at home or abroad, considerations for energy labourers need to be at the heart of energy policy.

"The message from this particular history has lots of resonance with today's push to decarbonise energy systems," advised Dr Kahle, who while writing the book has also concurrently read accounts of industries driving the renewables industry such as cobalt mines in the Congo, and lithium mines in Latin America.

"I'm seeing this same story playing out again, but there is still time to make a difference. We have to realise that renewables are not inherently more just simply because they are not fossil fuels. Decarbonisation is not energy justice if you are perpetuating the same forms of extractivism and global inequality," she added.



Session spotlights empowering of women in digital era



NHRC's efforts and initiative, alongside its partners, describing it as leading in organising the session, adding that such an initiative aims to achieve peace and development by fostering women's engagement in decision-making processes.

Dr al-Sulaiti affirmed that there is no doubt that Qatar's selection to launch this event internationally is a testament to the world's trust in Qatar, as well as the region, and the Arab world, thereby underscoring Qatar's commitment to achieving international peace and security, while also demonstrating the country's dedication to supporting women and enhancing their role in various developmental fields.

She emphasised the importance of women's engagement in decision-making processes to shape a better future for the world, and for the region in particular, calling for more partnerships between various institutions to launch academic initiatives and implement diverse training programmes to enhance the capabilities and potential of women and girls in decision-making processes.

Additionally, Dr al-Sulaiti noted the marginalisation and discrimination that women face despite their role in any society, highlighting that women face myriad challenges that squarely undermine their ambitions and hinder their ability to contribute to development fields, in addition to the heavy burden they bear in wars, conflict zones, and disaster-stricken areas.

The Secretary-General of ANNHRIs Sultan bin Hassan al-Jamali underscored the duty of national institutions to bolster the role of women and their rights through awareness, education, training, reviewing laws and policies, and proposing amendments. This includes adopting laws and policies that promote women's rights and ensure their fair representation in political institutions, as well as monitoring and opposing hate speech and stereotypes they face.

UN Assistant Secretary-General for Africa Martha Pobee said the rapid technological advancements in recent years have created opportunities and challenges to foster the overall democratic processes, in addition to addressing the digital divide both within and among nations, highlighting that if this gap is not properly addressed, new technological advancements could perpetuate and amplify inequality, discrimination, misinformation, and violence against women.

For her part, representative of the German Agency for International Co-operation (GIZ), Shatha Alawneh, affirmed that women in many parts of the world, including Arab countries, face daunting challenges and discrimination, especially in adapting to the digital age and thriving within it, highlighting that these challenges range from barriers to accessing digital knowledge to issues of protection in the digital space.

Dr al-Sulaiti cited the wanton aggression led by the Israeli occupation army against the Gaza Strip and the other occupied Palestinian territories, which has been extended since last September to include Lebanon. She emphasised that the Israeli occupation army continues to disregard the international community and persists in perpetrating genocide, ethnic cleansing, and forced displacement against the Palestinian people, despite repeated calls from the international community to take responsibility and put an end to this barbaric war. In her opening remarks, HE the Chairperson of NHRC Maryam bint Abdullah al-Attiyah, who is also the Chairperson of ANNHRIs, affirmed that achieving the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) is closely intertwined with the empowerment of women and girls digitally, adding that reaching a more sustainable and equitable world requires ensuring the active engagement of women in policy-making and decision-making processes.

She highlighted that there is a clear nexus between the empowerment and leadership of women in the digital age and the implementation of the Security Council Resolution 1325 and other related resolutions, noting that the role of women in conflict prevention, peace-building, and their engagement in relief, recovery, and reconstruction efforts has become a critical and foremost issue, given the devastating wars that are engulfing the world, where women are paying a heavy price. She underlined those armed conflicts, in general, exacerbate the marginalisation of women in all areas, emphasising the importance of countries' unwavering commitment today to promoting women and girls' access to digital technology and enabling them to benefit from it in areas such as strengthening leadership capacities, accessing information, and creating platforms for interaction, networking, and exchanging experiences among themselves.

HE al-Attiyah highlighted that there is a need to protect women and girls from all forms of digital violence and from stereotyping and biases on digital platforms, underscoring the multiple roles played by national human rights institutions (NHRIs), particularly through their monitoring of legislation and various related measures and practices, providing their perspectives on these issues, and conducting productive dialogues among all stakeholders and official bodies on emerging human rights matters.

Pope calls for Gaza 'genocide' probe

Pope Francis for the first time tackled claims of Israel's ongoing "genocide" of Palestinians in Gaza in extracts from a forthcoming book published yesterday, urging further investigation into whether Israel's actions meet the definition.

Titled *Hope Never Disappoints. Pilgrims Towards a Better World*, the book includes his latest and most forthright intervention into the more than year-long war sparked by Hamas' October 2023 storming of Israel.

"According to some experts, what is happening in Gaza has the characteristics of genocide," the pontiff wrote in extracts published on the front of Italy's *La Stampa* daily yesterday.

"It should be studied carefully to determine whether (the situation) corresponds to the technical definition formulated by jurists and international bodies," he added.

The Argentine pontiff has frequently deplored the number of victims of Israel's operations in Gaza, with the territory's Hamas-run health ministry putting the toll at least 43,846 people,

most of them civilians.

But his call for a probe marks the first time he has publicly used the term genocide - without endorsing it - in the context of Israeli military operations in the Palestinian territory.

On the Pope's account on X yesterday, he wrote: "Let us #PrayTogether for peace: in martyred Ukraine, in Palestine, Israel, Lebanon, Myanmar, and Sudan.

"War dehumanizes, leading us to tolerate unacceptable crimes. May leaders listen to the cry of

the people who long for peace."

The new book by the Pope comes out tomorrow in Italy, Spain and Latin America, with other releases elsewhere due later.

On Thursday, a United Nations Special Committee judged Israel's conduct of warfare in Gaza "consistent with the characteristics of genocide", accusing the country of "using starvation as a method of war".

Its conclusions have already been condemned by Israel's key backer the United States.

Illegal miners battling to survive SA standoff

Hundreds of clandestine miners at a disused South African shaft are struggling to survive in grim conditions because of a police operation to force them out, one of the men who escaped said yesterday, AFP reported from Stilfontein. For nearly two weeks police have been stationed outside the abandoned gold mine at Stilfontein, about 150 kilometres southwest of Johannesburg, intermittently blocking locals from sending down food and water, and arresting undocumented migrants who surface. "There's nothing left for

someone to eat, to drink or anything that can make a human being survive. There is nothing left underground for now," said Ayanda Ndabeni, who was hoisted out of the shaft by rope on Friday. "This operation of the police stopped everything, we suffered underground. Some of us, they died. Some of us are sick, critical." One decomposed body was brought out last week and there are fears there may be more. A local who works with the miners has claimed to have been told there were around 4,000 people underground.

Iraq blast kills three security personnel

A blast from an explosive device yesterday killed three members of Iraq's security forces and wounded three others in the northern province of Saladin, officials said.

There was no immediate claim of responsibility for the attack in Tuz Khurmatu, which borders a province plagued by sporadic militant attacks.

Iraq declared victory over the Islamic State group in late 2017,

but its militants remain active in the country, particularly in rural areas. Yesterday's blast killed an army regiment commander, another officer and a security service member, said Zulfiqar al-Bayati, mayor of Tuz Khurmatu.

A security official confirmed the death toll to AFP, adding the victims had been in a vehicle when the explosion occurred.

Those killed were members of the Peshmerga forces of the autonomous northern region of Kurdistan, while the wounded were members from the Iraqi army. The Iraqi defence ministry

paid tribute to the three soldiers who "fell as martyrs...while carrying out their duty". The Islamic State group overran large swathes of Iraq and neighbouring Syria in 2014, proclaiming its "caliphate" and launching a reign of terror.

It was defeated in Iraq in 2017 by Iraqi forces backed by a US-led military coalition, and in 2019 lost the last territory it held in Syria to US-backed Kurdish forces. A report by United Nations experts published in July estimated there were around 1,500-3,000 militants remaining in Iraq and Syria.

Senegal heads to polls as new leaders eye parliamentary win

Senegal yesterday voted in parliamentary elections, with the new leaders aiming for a resounding majority to see through the promise of ambitious reform that swept them to power eight months ago.

President Bassirou Diomaye Faye secured victory in March pledging economic transformation, social justice and a fight against corruption - raising hopes among a largely youthful population facing high inflation and widespread unemployment.

But an opposition-led parliament hampered the government's first months in power, leading Faye to dissolve the chamber in September and call snap elections as soon as the constitution allowed him to do so.

"I hope that (the ruling party) Pastef will win the elections to gain a majority so that they can better carry out their mandate," said 56-year-old voter Pascal Goudiaby in the capital Dakar.

"The priority is unemployment, young people are facing so much unemployment," he added.

Faye appointed his firebrand mentor Ousmane Sonko as prime minister, after Sonko's own bid to run for president was blocked following a three-year deadly standoff with the former authorities.

The pair promised a leftist pan-African agenda - vowing to diversify political and economic partnerships, review hydrocarbon and fishing contracts and re-establish Senegal's sovereignty, which they claimed had been sold abroad.

Mademba Ndiaye, a 20-year-old student, was voting for the first time in Dakar.

"It's one of the only ways we can really have an impact on society, and I think that if we don't vote, we couldn't really complain about what happens in society afterwards," he said.

The west African country's roughly 7.3mm registered voters

will elect 165 MPs for five-year terms.

Analysts say Senegalese voters have historically confirmed their presidential choice during parliamentary elections, and the Pastef party is the favourite to win.

"I think that whoever you gave your confidence to in the presidential election, you need to renew your confidence in him so that he can achieve what he started," said 56-year-old voter Toure Aby.

"We want life to be less expensive for the Senegalese," she added. "Everything's expensive: water, electricity, food."

Voters are continuing a long democratic tradition in Senegal, widely seen as a stable outlier in a coup-plagued region.

President Faye praised Senegalese democracy and called for a peaceful vote as he cast his ballot in his family's village of Ndiagnao. There will always be winners and losers, but "in the end, it is the people of Senegal who will win", he told journalists in a video aired by public broadcaster RTS.

Former prime minister Sonko also urged calm as he voted in the southern city of Ziguinchor.

"Democracy is expressed in peace and stability, and I believe that in a democracy there is no room for violence," he said.

Sonko spent three weeks on the campaign trail promising projects and regional investment. Reminiscent of his years as a fiery opposition leader, he

had called for vengeance after attacks against his supporters, but later urged restraint.

Despite the heated tone, clashes were sporadic in the run-up to the vote.

Though some agreements have been reached between coalitions, the opposition remains fragmented.

Former president Macky Sall is leading an opposition grouping from abroad.

He left power in April after triggering one of the worst crises in decades with a last-minute postponement of the presidential election.

Former prime minister and presidential runner-up Amadou Ba and Dakar mayor Barthelemy Dias are also heading coalitions.

The opposition has accused the new government of inaction, amateurism and a desire to settle scores with the previous administration. Unemployment stands at more than 20% and scores continue to risk their lives every month attempting to reach Europe by boat.

The government said an audit of public finances revealed a wider budget deficit than previously announced.

Beirut businesses struggle to stay afloat under Israeli raids

Lina al-Khalil has fled her south Beirut home to escape escalating Israeli attacks on Hezbollah, but she still returns daily to the bombarded area to keep the family business running.

"It's more important than my house," said the pharmacist, in her 50s, of the business she inherited from her father in Haret Hreik, a southern suburb of the Lebanese capital where Hezbollah fighters hold sway.

Whenever the Israeli military issues a warning to evacuate before a strike - a near-daily occurrence for nearly two months - she closes down the shop and rushes out.

Despite the ever-present fear and the steep decline in business activity, Khalil does what she can to keep her business afloat, like many other shopkeepers in Beirut's southern suburbs.

The vast majority of the area's estimated 600,000-800,000 residents have fled, seeking refuge elsewhere.

"With the drop in customers, the financial impact has been severe," Khalil told AFP, adding that she has had to halve the salaries of her employees due to the pinch.

Khalil has moved most of the

With their future shrouded in uncertainty, "we're trying to clear our stocks," he said.

"We don't know whether to import new products or save our cash."

Mahdi added that he had to make some of his 70 employees redundant and dock pay from the rest.

In the southern suburbs, an Israeli strike turned the cafe Abdel Rahman Zahr El-Din had opened five years ago into a pile of rubble.

He said he must salvage what he can, now that he has lost his only way to make ends meet.

"There's nothing left but stones," he said as he inspected the upper floor, emerging with a small table in his hand, unharmed but covered in grey dust.

Japanese troops to train with Australia, US armies in Darwin

Japanese troops will begin regular deployments in northern Australia as part of military co-operation with Australia and the US, Australia's Defence Minister Richard Marles said. Around 2,000 US Marines are already hosted in Darwin for six months of the year amid growing concern among Washington and its allies about China's growing military power in the Indo-Pacific region. "Today we are announcing that there will be regular deployments of Japan's amphibious Rapid Deployment Brigade to Australia," Marles said in Darwin, alongside US Defence Secretary Lloyd Austin and Japanese Defence Minister Gen Nakatani.

1,500 killed in protests against Hasina: Yunus

About 1,500 people died in protests that brought down Bangladeshi prime minister Sheikh Hasina this year, and as many as 3,500 may have been forcibly abducted during her 15-year rule, interim leader Muhammad Yunus said yesterday. The estimate by the economist and Nobel peace laureate, who is due to organise elections, is higher than the previous official count of about 1,000 deaths in the student-led demonstrations, which drew a ferocious crackdown. "Every day, new names are being added to the list of martyrs," Yunus said in an address to the nation marking 100 days of the interim government, pledging to prosecute those responsible for the violence.

Tata 'seals deal' with Pegatron for iPhone plant in Tamil Nadu

Tata Electronics has agreed to buy a majority stake in Taiwanese contract manufacturer Pegatron's only iPhone plant in India, forming a new joint venture that strengthens Tata's position as an Apple supplier. Under the deal, Tata will hold 60% and run daily operations under the joint venture, while Pegatron will hold the rest and provide technical support, said two sources. The sources did not elaborate on the financials of the deal. Apple is increasingly looking to diversify its supply chain beyond China amid geopolitical tensions between Beijing and Washington. For India's Tata, the Chennai Pegatron plant will bolster its iPhone manufacturing plans.

Glastonbury 2025 tickets sell out in 35 minutes

Tickets for next year's Glastonbury Festival sold out within 35 minutes yesterday, with more than 200,000 people expected to attend the world-renowned musical celebration in rural southwest England. Sales opened at 9am and event organisers posted on the social media platform X at 9.35am that "Tickets for Glastonbury 2025 have now sold out". "Thanks to everyone who bought one and sorry to those who missed out, on a morning when demand was much higher than supply," they added. Talks are reportedly under way to secure acts for next year's festival, which will run from June 25-29.

23 arrested in Manipur after violent protests

Police arrested 23 people yesterday in the north-eastern Indian state of Manipur for ransacking and setting fire to the homes of lawmakers and ministers, while hundreds of protesters demonstrated against recent violent killings in defiance of a curfew.

The violence, marking the second straight day of unrest in the area, has led to a tense standoff in Imphal, the state capital.

"The situation is relatively calm today but unpredictable," a senior state police official said, adding the situation was being closely monitored.

Since May 2023, inter-communal clashes between the Meitei and Kuki communities have resulted in at least 250 deaths and displaced 60,000 people in the region.

As a result Manipur has become divided into two ethnic enclaves: the Meitei controlled valley, and the Kuki-dominated hills, separated by a stretch of no-man's land monitored by federal forces.

Tensions flared last week when a 31-year-old woman from the Kuki tribal community was burned alive. Kuki groups have blamed Meitei militants for the act.

Citing a failure by state Chief Minister N Biren Singh to resolve the crisis, the National People's Party, an ally of the ruling BJP with seven lawmakers in

the 60-member state assembly, announced yesterday its withdrawal of support from the state government.

The 23 arrests followed Saturday's violence, which involved what a police statement said was the "ransacking and arson" of the houses of several state lawmakers and ministers.

"Police resorted to firing tear gas shells to disperse the mob. Eight persons have been injured in the process," the statement said, adding additional security forces were deployed.

An indefinite curfew was imposed on Saturday and internet and mobile services were suspended after protesters tried to storm the residences of several lawmakers including Chief Minister Singh.

Protesters are demanding accountability for the deadly violence, that has, in the latest incident, claimed the lives of at least two women and two children.

Conservation urgency grows amid 77% elephant decline in 50 years

A huge drop in the population of African elephants in a half century, as revealed by researchers recently, should worry not only conservationists but also anyone with a passion for nature. African elephants are Earth's largest land animals, remarkable mammals that are very intelligent and highly social. Fresh evidence of the peril they are facing has come in a study that documents alarming population declines at numerous sites across the continent, Reuters reported.

Researchers unveiled last week what they called the most comprehensive assessment of the status of the two African elephant species - the savanna elephant and forest elephant - using data on population surveys conducted at 475 sites in 37 countries from 1964 through 2016. The savanna elephant populations fell by about 70% on average at the surveyed sites and the forest elephant populations dropped by about 90% on average at the surveyed sites, with poaching and habitat loss the main drivers. All told, there was a 77% population decrease on average at the various surveyed sites, spanning both species.

Elephants vanished at some sites while their populations increased in other places thanks to conservation efforts. "A lot of the lost populations won't come back, and many low-density populations face continued pressures. We likely will lose more populations going forward," said George Wittemyer, a Colorado State University professor of wildlife conservation and chair of the scientific board of the conservation group Save the Elephants, who helped lead the study published in the journal *Proceedings of the National Academy of Sciences*.

Poaching and habitat loss due to agricultural expansion are among the main threats. The forest elephant population is estimated to be about a third that of savanna elephants. Poaching has affected forest elephants disproportionately and has ravaged populations of both species in northern and eastern Africa.

"We have lost a number of elephant populations

across many countries, but the northern Sahel region of Africa - for example in Mali, Chad and Nigeria - has been particularly hard hit. High pressure and limited protection have culminated in populations being extirpated," Wittemyer said.

But in southern Africa, elephant populations rose at 42% of the surveyed sites, with strong growth in populations in Botswana, Zimbabwe and Namibia. "For populations showing positive trends, we have had active stewardship and management by the governments or outside groups that have taken on a management role," Wittemyer said.

The study did not track a continent-wide population tally because the various surveys employed different methodologies over different time frames to estimate local elephant population density, making a unified head count impossible. Instead, it assessed population trends at each of the surveyed sites. A population estimate by conservationists conducted separately from this study put the two species combined at between 415,000 and 540,000 elephants as of 2016, the last year of the study period. It remains the most recent comprehensive continent-wide estimate.

"The loss of large mammals is a significant ecological issue for Africa and the planet," said conservation ecologist and study co-author Dave Balfour, a research associate in the Centre for African Conservation Ecology at Nelson Mandela University in South Africa.

The world's third extant elephant species, the slightly smaller Asian elephant, faces its own population crisis, with similar factors at play as in Africa.

Of African elephants, Wittemyer said: "While the trends are not good, it is important to recognise the successes we have had and continue to have. Learning how and where we can be successful in conserving elephants is as important as recognising the severity of the decline they have experienced. Not only one of the most sentient and intelligent species we share the planet with, but also an incredibly important part of ecosystems in Africa that structures the balance between forest and grasslands, serves as a critical disperser of seeds, and is a species on which a multitude of other species depend on for survival."

How Democrats lost the plot this year

The real story is that one side voted at peak strength, and the other did not

As of this writing, Donald Trump has received about 75.1mn votes in the US presidential election, and Kamala Harris about 71.8mn. Though the numbers will continue to rise as absentee and mail-in ballots are counted, Trump's final tally will be only slightly higher than his 2020 total of 74.2mn votes. For Harris, though, we will see a disastrous decline from the 81.2mn votes that Joe Biden received, and this despite the fact that the voting-eligible population has increased by four million.

In other words, Trump gained almost no support in his four-year campaign for redemption. If all the voters were the same, one could even say that he merely got his 2020 supporters to vote for him again. In fact, about 13mn people (most of them eligible voters) have died, and about 17mn have become voter-eligible, implying that Trump replaced his losses about one-for-one, while a decline in turnout cost the Democrats nearly 10mn votes.

These numbers cast grave doubt on explanations of the result that focus on economic conditions, and still more on the impact of advertising and get-out-the-vote campaigns. Advertising, rallies, and the "ground game" were heavily concentrated in the swing states, yet the results there mirrored those across the whole country - including in states such as Massachusetts and Texas, where the outcome was never in doubt. The biggest proportional shifts toward Trump were in New York, New Jersey, Florida, and California. So much for the billion dollars that the Democrats spent on campaigning. Four years ago, Biden did better from his basement.

The results also deflate analyses based on the "American voter". Racism, sexism, and anger over the economy, migration, or reproductive rights (the Democratic "hope" issue this year) no doubt exist. But they do not appear to have affected the results any more (or less) than in past years. Those who went to

the polls appear to have voted as they did last time. There are always a few "swing voters," but there is a reason reporters seek them out in the way that anthropologists once sought out cannibals: they are rare.

The real story is that one side voted at peak strength, and the other did not.

There are no reliable data on the ideological motives of non-voters. But exit polls do indicate that the shift in the mix of voters was greater at lower income levels; the share of voters with annual incomes below \$50,000 who voted for Biden was greater than for Harris. Among Hispanics, notably relatively low-income voters along the Texas border (in very small counties, to be sure), the shift toward Trump was dramatic.

After we have ruled out the implausible, at least three reasonable conjectures remain. The first concerns the conditions of voting. In 2020, owing to the pandemic, voting was more accessible than ever before. Millions cast their ballots through early voting, vote-by-mail, drive-through collection points, 24-hour voting, and other convenient methods, and turnout (as a proportion of the eligible electorate) was the highest it had been since 1900 - long before the civil-rights era, and two decades before the enfranchisement of women.

In 2024, some - though not all - of these expedients no longer existed, after already declining in 2022. It is standard in America to use the structure of voting to help determine the outcome: long lines at the polls discourage turnout, especially among working people with limited time.

A second plausible explanation concerns voter registration. Students and low-income minority citizens move more frequently and usually must re-register every time their address changes. It is highly probable that this burden falls more heavily on Democrats.

The third hypothesis turns on the long-standing divisions within the Democratic Party, which is about 70-80% centrist and 20-30% "left"; but completely controlled by its centrist majority. This has been the case ever since George McGovern's defeat in 1972,

but the control now extends to the point of candidate selection for congressional seats and national-party funding for federal campaigns.

The Clintons and Obamas are currently the de facto heads of the centrist faction, and Biden and Harris were their appointees. Bernie Sanders carried the torch of the left in 2016 and 2020 but threw his support behind Biden in exchange for concessions on policy.

In 2024, there was no Democratic left, because there was no real primary or contest of any kind, only a last-minute closed-door candidate replacement. Some of the left's remnants - Robert F Kennedy, Jr (denied access to the Democratic primary ballot) and Tulsi Gabbard - went over to Trump's camp. The actual left in 2024 was a movement called "Palestine". It had no home in either party.

The Democratic leadership engineered this situation and must therefore desire it. Win or lose, it remains in control of a vast shadow apparatus: consultants, pollsters, lobbyists, fundraisers, key positions on Capitol Hill. Any concessions to new forces within the party would undermine this control, whereas losses to Republicans do not. The Democratic leadership would far rather lose an election or two - or even become a permanent minority party - than open the party to people it cannot control.

The 2024 election was, therefore, a suicide. The Democratic leadership was, at best, indifferent to the erosion of voting access, negligent in retaining 2020's new voters, and proactive in ensuring the abstention of what little remains of its "left" wing. It tried to cover this up, as usual, with celebrity endorsements and identity politics. As usual, it did not work. But the party's mandarins and their apparatchiks will be around next time to try again. - Project Syndicate

Xi ready for 'smooth transition' to Trump

Chinese President Xi Jinping said he was ready to work with Donald Trump's new administration for a "smooth transition" in bilateral ties, as he met outgoing President Joe Biden for the last time.

The leaders of the world's two largest economies met on the sidelines of an Asia-Pacific summit in Lima overshadowed by concerns of new trade wars and diplomatic tensions when Trump returns to the White House in January.

After shaking hands to begin their meeting at the Chinese leader's hotel in the Peruvian capital, Xi noted that Beijing's goals for stable ties with Washington remained unchanged.

"China is ready to work with the new US administration to maintain communication, expand cooperation and manage differences, so as to strive for a smooth transition of the China-US relationship," he said in translated comments.

Xi and Biden have led efforts to ease tensions over issues from trade to Taiwan, and Saturday's face-to-face was their second meeting since a landmark ice-breaking summit in California last year – their third overall.

Biden said he was "very proud

of the progress we both made together."

"Our two countries cannot let any of this competition veer into conflict. That's our responsibility and over the last four years I think we've proven it's possible to have this relationship," Biden said.

Trump's impending return to the Oval Office, with several China hawks in his top team, has stirred fears that tensions could return.

In his first White House term, Trump engaged in a bruising trade war with China, imposing tariffs on imports that saw retaliation from Beijing.

Trump has once again signalled a confrontational approach, threatening during the campaign against Democrat Kamala Harris to impose tariffs of up to 60% on imports of Chinese goods.

But in pointed comments, Xi said that China and the United States should "inject more certainty and positive energy into the turbulent world." The White House said Biden had raised several key points of tension, including self-governed Taiwan – which China claims as part of its territory and has repeatedly threatened.

Biden expressed "deep concern" over Beijing's support of Russia's defence industry as Moscow invades Ukraine, and condemned the deployment of thousands of troops to Russia by China's ally North Korea, the

White House said in a readout of the meeting.

But it was the transfer of power in Washington that hung heaviest over the meeting, with Biden and Xi both seeking to calm potentially choppy waters.

US National Security Advisor Jake Sullivan told reporters Biden had reinforced that it was a "time of transition" where "stability in the US-China relationship is essential."

Sullivan added however that Biden was "not a conduit" for any backchannel messages from Xi to Trump about the shape of future relations. With Biden making his swan song on the international stage, Sullivan said the president had also taken time for some informal chat with Xi.

The highly anticipated meeting came after a two-day summit of the 21-member Asia-Pacific Economic Cooperation (APEC) grouping that Xi and Biden had both attended. Before their encounter, the men had taken part in a closed-door "retreat" with other APEC leaders from countries including Canada, Chile, Singapore, Australia, Malaysia and Japan.

Russia was represented by a deputy prime minister.

Billionaire Trump's comeback cast a cloud of uncertainty over the meeting – and will do the same over a meeting of G20 leaders in Rio de Janeiro next week.

Biden in historic Amazon trip to cement legacy

US President Joe Biden began an historic trip to the Amazon rainforest yesterday to promote his record on fighting climate change amid fears Donald Trump will tear up his environmental policies.

Biden landed in the Brazilian city of Manaus, in the heart of the world's largest jungle, on the penultimate leg of a valedictory South American tour before handing the keys of the White House to Trump in January. The 81-year-old is the first sitting US president to visit the Amazon. Dressed casually in a blue shirt and pants, Biden chatted on the tarmac with local dignitaries, including Brazilian Nobel-winning climate scientist Carlos Nobre before boarding a helicopter to fly over the rainforest.

Biden, who was accompanied by Secretary of State Antony Blinken and his daughter Ashley and granddaughter Natalie, will also visit a museum and meet Indigenous and local leaders working to protect the Amazon. Ahead of his visit, part of the Democrat's attempt to cement his legacy in his last weeks in office, the White House announced that the US had hit its target of increasing bilateral climate financing to \$11bn a year. It said that the figure reached this year was six times what the US was providing at the start of Biden's term in 2021.

The money, which helps developing countries adapt to climate change, has made "the United States the largest bilateral provider of climate finance in the world," the White House said.

"The fight against climate change has been a defining cause of President Biden's leadership and presidency," it added. Biden arrived in Brazil from Peru, where he attended his last summit with Asia-Pacific leaders. He has cut a diminished figure on his tour. All eyes in Lima were on Chinese President Xi Jinping who was received with greater fanfare. At a meeting with Biden, the Chinese leader was already looking to the new Trump era, saying he was ready to work with the "America First" leader and hoped for a "smooth transition" in relations. Trump has pledged to reverse Biden's climate policies

and could again pull the United States, the world's second-biggest polluter, out of the landmark 2015 Paris Agreement on combatting carbon emissions, as he did during his first term.

On Saturday, he nominated a fracking magnate and noted climate change sceptic, Chris Wright, as his energy secretary. Trump's return to power looms large over a G20 meeting of the world's biggest economies starting today in Rio as well as over stalled UN climate talks in Azerbaijan. The Amazon, spanning nine countries, is crucial to the fight against climate change due to its ability to absorb planet-warming carbon dioxide from the atmosphere.

But it is also one of the areas most vulnerable to climate change and environmental degradation.

This year it experienced the worst

wildfires in nearly two decades, fuelled by a severe drought blamed in part by climate experts on global warming.

A recent study showed that the Amazon rainforest had lost an area about the size of Germany and France combined to deforestation in four decades. Brazil's President Luiz Inacio Lula da Silva has pledged to put a stop to illegal Amazon deforestation by 2030.

Experts have warned that a second Trump presidency could undo progress on the transition to green energy made under Biden, giving heavy polluters like China and India an excuse to scale back their own efforts.

During his campaign, Trump pledged to "drill, baby, drill" and increase fossil fuel extraction. He even brushed off climate change just days before the vote.

Russia pounds Ukraine power grid

Russia unleashed its largest air strike on Ukraine in almost three months yesterday, launching 120 missiles and 90 drones that killed at least seven people and caused severe damage to the power system, officials said.

Ukrainians had been bracing for weeks for a renewed Russian attack on an already hobbled energy system, fearing long winter blackouts and mounting psychological pressure almost 1,000 days after Russia launched its full-scale invasion.

The strikes, which caused numerous power cuts, came at a time when the impending US presidency of Donald Trump, who has pledged to end the war without saying how, has raised the prospect of a push for negotiations.

Air defences could be heard engaging drones over the capital Kyiv in the night, and a series of powerful blasts boomed across the city centre during the missile attack. Residents huddled in underground metro stations, wrapped in winter coats.

"Severe damage to Ukraine's energy system, including to DTEK power stations. These attacks

again highlight Ukraine's need for additional air defence systems from our allies," said Maxim Timchenko, CEO of DTEK, Ukraine's largest private power company.

The extent of the damage was hard to assess. After repeated Russian attacks on the power grid, officials reveal little detailed information about the outcome of strikes and the state of the network.

Officials confirmed damage to "critical infrastructure" or power cuts in regions from Volyn, Rivne, Lviv in the west to Dnipropetrovsk and Zaporizhzhia in the southeast.

DTEK imposed emergency power cuts in the southern Odessa region, but had lifted them in three other regions by late morning.

Emergency work was ongoing in the Odesa, Rivne and Volyn regions, national grid operator Ukrenergo said.

Russia's defence ministry said it had launched a massive strike on energy facilities that supply Ukraine's military-industrial complex.

Biden lifts ban on Ukraine using US arms to strike inside Russia

President Joe Biden's administration has lifted restrictions that had blocked Ukraine from using US-provided weapons to strike deep into Russian territory, said three sources familiar with the matter, in a significant change to US policy in the Ukraine-Russia conflict.

Ukraine plans to conduct its first long-range attacks in the coming days, the sources said, without revealing details due to operational security concerns.

The White House declined to comment.

The move by the United States, which comes just over two months before President-elect Donald Trump takes office

on January 20, comes after months of requests by Ukrainian President Volodymyr Zelensky to allow Ukraine's military to use US weapons to hit Russian military targets far from its border. The change follows Russia's deployment of North Korean ground troops to supplement its own forces, a development that has caused alarm in Washington and Kyiv.

The first deep strikes are likely to be carried out using ATACMS rockets, which have a range of up to 190 miles, according to the sources.

While some US officials have expressed scepticism that allowing long-range strikes will change the war's overall

trajectory, the decision could help Ukraine at a moment when Russian forces are making gains and possibly put Kyiv in a better negotiating position when and if ceasefire talks happen. It is not clear if Trump will reverse Biden's decision when he takes office. Trump has long criticised the scale of US financial and military aid to Ukraine and has vowed to end the war quickly, without explaining how.

Still, some congressional

Republicans have urged Biden to loosen the rules on how Ukraine can use US-provided weapons. Russia has warned that it would see a move to loosen the limits on Ukraine's use of US weapons as a major escalation.

Ukrainians had been bracing for weeks for a renewed Russian attack on an already hobbled energy system, fearing long winter blackouts and mounting psychological pressure almost 1,000 days after Russia launched its full-scale invasion.

The strikes, which caused numerous power cuts, came at a time when the impending US presidency of Donald Trump, who has pledged to end the war without saying how, has raised the prospect of a push for negotiations.

Air defences could be heard engaging drones over the capital Kyiv in the night, and a series of powerful blasts boomed across the city centre during the missile attack. Residents huddled in underground metro stations, wrapped in winter coats.

"Severe damage to Ukraine's energy system, including to DTEK power stations. These attacks

again highlight Ukraine's need for additional air defence systems from our allies," said Maxim Timchenko, CEO of DTEK, Ukraine's largest private power company.

The extent of the damage was hard to assess. After repeated Russian attacks on the power grid, officials reveal little detailed information about the outcome of strikes and the state of the network.

Officials confirmed damage to "critical infrastructure" or power cuts in regions from Volyn, Rivne, Lviv in the west to Dnipropetrovsk and Zaporizhzhia in the southeast.

DTEK imposed emergency

power cuts in the southern Odessa region, but had lifted them in three other regions by late morning.

Emergency work was ongoing in the Odesa, Rivne and Volyn regions, national grid operator Ukrenergo said.

Russia's defence ministry said it had launched a massive strike on energy facilities that supply Ukraine's military-industrial complex.

Navalny widow leads opposition march against Putin in Berlin

Around 1,500 supporters of Russia's exiled opposition marched yesterday through central Berlin – led by Yulia Navalnaya and chanting "No to war!" and "No to Putin" – in a demonstration against Moscow's invasion of Ukraine. Organisers had called on supporters to take to the streets of the German capital to denounce the war, as well as show solidarity with political prisoners in Russia. The war in Ukraine has turned Berlin into a refuge for many anti-Kremlin Russians and Ukrainian refugees. The march saw a smaller turnout than expected and was seen as a credibility test for the movement – weakened by years of repression and thrown into disarray since the death of its main leader Alexei Navalny in prison earlier this year.

Unable to protest at home, the opposition wants to mobilise some of the hundreds of thousands of Russians who left their country since the Kremlin launched the 2022 invasion. President Vladimir Putin has been in power for almost 25 years in Russia, and all of his significant political opponents are now dead, jailed or in exile. "Putin is a murderer," Yulia Navalnaya, who has taken the helm of the movement since the death of her husband, told crowds. She organised the march with two other oppositionists: long-time anti-Putin campaigner and former Moscow city councillor Ilya Yashin and activist Vladimir Kara-Murza – both recently freed from prison. Organisers said they wanted to show that not all Russians support the Kremlin's invasion.

Organisers estimated the turnout to be at 2,000 people. "I am very happy that everyone saw that there are many

Russians that do not support Putin's politics," Yashin told AFP, adding: "It is an act of solidarity with those who stayed in Russia.

We want to tell them: 'Guys, don't give up, we will continue the fight.' Both Yashin and Kara-Murza were freed from prison – where they served sentences for denouncing the Ukraine invasion – after a prisoner swap with the West this summer. The opposition says it has three main demands: the "immediate withdrawal" of troops from Ukraine, the trial of Putin as a "war criminal" and the liberation of all political prisoners in Russia. Russian student Polina Zelenskaya travelled to Berlin from Estonia for the march to show that "not all Russians are for Putin, like the world may think." She dreams of a Russia where people are "not afraid to speak their minds" and where "power is not in (the hands) of one person." There were some well known

activists and campaigners in the crowd. Oleg Orlov, a veteran dissident who was freed in the same swap as Yashin and Kara-Murza, said Kremlin opponents currently have two reasons for "pain": "The war and political prisoners. It is constant pain." The event is also seen as a check-up for the movement, weakened by years of repression and suffering a huge blow with the death of Navalny. Since his death, various factions have been tearing each other apart in bitter conflicts. Navalny's team has accused the camp led by ex-oligarch Mikhail Khodorkovsky of ordering a hammer attack on one of its members. Another faction accused Navalny's anti-corruption fund of covering up the machinations of a shady banker.

Doha Port welcomes maiden voyage of MSC Euribia




Brief History of a Family
