# Qatar's GDP growth to average 4.1% between 2025-2029: Al-Kuwari

•Medium-term outlook bolstered mainly by huge expansion of Qatar's LNG production, says HE the Minister of Finance

atar's GDP growth is expected to average 4.1% between 2025 and 2029, HE the Minister of Finance Ali bin Ahmed al-Kuwari said yesterday.

The medium-term outlook is bolstered mainly by the huge expansion of Qatar's LNG production at the North Field, HE al-Kuwari said at a press conference in Doha.

Next year, Qatar's economy is expected to grow at 2.4%, he said. The GDP growth expected in 2026 is 5.2% and 7.9% in 2027, 3.5% in 2028 and 1.6% in 2029. This year, the GDP is expected

#### Qatar slams Israeli plan for settlement expansion in Golan Heights

Director of the NHRC Programmes and Education Department, Hamad al-Hajri, said the awareness of human rights in early ages fundamentally contributes to preventing human rights violations over the long haul, and represents a major investment in pursuit of promoting a community where justice prevails, and human rights of all people are respected and appreciated. He added that knowledge of rights and duties is the way to advance individuals and communities and lay the groundwork for freedom and peace, highlighting that there would be no communities without advancing the individuals and no advancement without raising the awareness of their rights. Therefore, NHRC is always committed to advancing future generations to be a beneficial driver in building a community where everyone enjoys dignity and humanity, he underlined, highlighting that NHRC is committed to spreading awareness of human rights among students in primary, intermediate, and secondary schools, and for both boys and girls, as part of enhancing their knowledge of their rights and duties toward their families, homeland

and the entire world. Al-Hajri stressed that such a knowledge is the source of altering the behaviour and improving it, highlighting that spreading awareness and education among those students comes as part of NHRC's interest in the fact that they constitute the foremost educational inputs. He emphasised that advancing their capabilities represents a core objective that affects their proclivities in the future. The training package for students included a detailed explanation of the fundamental human rights instruments, along with human duties and responsibilities, in addition to reviewing the characteristics of human rights, human rights generations, as well as principles and sources of these rights, in addition to the UN human rights criteria and illustrating the difference between human rights declarations and conventions, highlighted al-Hajri. He added that the package focused on the inclusiveness of human rights, including all civil, political, economic, social, and cultural rights, their integration and interconnection, as well as their indivisibility, noting that the event included a paper on protecting children in a safe and secure digital environment, given the digital transformation that led to the engagement of vast majority of world population in digital environment, leading to their interaction with various aspects. # Sidra Medicine performs Qatar's first C-section in angiography suite

**S** idra Medicine, a member of Qatar Foundation, has become the first hospital in the region to successfully perform a high-risk caesarean section (Csection) in its state-of-the-art angiography suite.

The procedure, a collaboration between the hospital's Interventional Radiology (IR) and Obstetrics teams, marks a significant advancement in maternal care for high-risk pregnancies.

The angiography suite – a highly specialised operating room equipped with advanced imaging technology – provides the ideal environment for procedures requiring precise image guidance. For patients at high risk of bleeding during delivery, performing the C-section in this setting allows for immediate access to critical interventions like endovascular embolisation.

Prof Johnny Awwad, chair of Women's Services at Sidra Medicine, said: "Traditionally, IR teams have provided backup support for high-risk deliveries performed in the obstetrics operating rooms (OR). However, patient transfer

times from the obstetrics OR to the IR suite are lengthy, especially when patients are unstable and we have to factor several safety protocols. This multidisciplinary collaboration between obstetrics and IR, is what makes a difference in successfully managing high-risk pregnancies."

Performing C-sections for high-risk patients directly in the angiography suite, can significantly reduce transfer times from the obstetrics waiting room to the IR from approximately 60 minutes to zero. This approach will allow for faster intervention if bleeding occurs.

Dr Walid Mubarak, Interventional Radiology Attending Physician and Clinical Lead at Sidra Medicine, said: "For women at high risk of postpartum haemorrhage, this technique can be lifesaving. The angiography suite allows us to instantly access cutting-edge technology and perform minimally invasive procedures. We can quickly navigate the patient's blood vessels with tiny catheters and precisely deliver embolic agents to stop bleeding."

Qatar has set an oil price of \$60 per barrel in preparing the budget, he noted. HE al-Kuwari said, "Qatar continues to adopt a

conservative approach in estimating oil and gas revenues, with an average oil price of \$60 per barrel. This approach aims to enhance financial flexibility and ensure spending stability."

The minister noted that Oatar's total expected revenues for the 2025 fiscal year budget are estimated at QR197bn, reflecting a 2.5% decrease compared to the 2024 budget revenues. He stated, "The anticipated oil and gas revenues for 2025 are QR154bn, down from QR159bn in the 2024 budget, marking a 3.1% decrease. Non-oil revenues for 2025 are estimated at QR43bn, which remains

unchanged from 2024 levels." Two key sectors - education and health have been allocated a significant outlay they deserve - QR41.4bn, which accounts for 20% of the total budget. QR21.9bn has been set apart for Municipality and Environment, OR3.6bn for tourism and culture. OR6.6bn for sports. OR3.9bn for transportation and OR3bn for communications.

These sectors, he said, have been allocated significant resources to support economic diversification and sustainable development efforts. They play a vital role in shaping a knowledge-driven, innovative economy. Allocations for salaries and wages are set to rise by 5.5% in 2025 compared to 2024, totalling QR67.5bn. On the anticipated deficit of QR13.2bn in the next year's budget, HE al-Kuwari clarified it is "theoretical deficit"

"Qatar has set an oil price of \$60 per barrel in preparing the budget. This is a very conservative price. If there is a surplus, it will be used to repay debt, strengthen Qatar's foreign exchange reserves and also channelled into the sovereign wealth fund," he said. He said a "dedicated fund" will be set up by the Ministry of Finance to ensure the economy did not suffer even if the energy prices plummet. "While there are goods days, there will be bad days

too. We need to be prepared for such situations," the minister emphasised. The Finance Minister said Qatar recently listed green bonds on the London Stock Exchange.

The first issue of its kind issued by the Ministry of Finance in Qatar is aimed at financing environmentally friendly projects.



This is particularly evident, he said, across critical sectors such as telecommunications, security, as well as in the oil and gas, aviation, maritime navigation, and other essential industries.

Speaking to the Qatar News Agency (QNA), al-Muslemani underlined that the CRA enhances its position as the responsible entity for this resource by issuing regulations and regulatory tools, granting licences, permits, and approvals for the optimal use of the radio spectrum.

He emphasised that the CRA has worked tirelessly to monitor and oversee the use of the spectrum, ensuring its optimal utilisation, underscoring its crucial and central role in maintaining the sustainability and security of communications in Qatar.

Al-Muslemani said that the CRA has cemented its reputation with achievements in meeting the requirements of major local and international events hosted by the country, including the landmark event, the FIFA World Cup Qatar 2022, in addition to playing a key role during these events, ensuring the frequency plans and management were in place to enable all stakeholders to use and operate various radio applications, equipment, and broadcasting systems as required, without interruption due to any radio interference.

of agreements with countries such as Turkiye, Morocco, the Gambia, Somalia, Korea and Romania.

Al-Muslemani added that over the past 10 years, the CRA has played a pivotal role in ensuring the effectiveness and efficiency of telecommunications networks and services in Qatar, particularly through the management of numbering, the cornerstone of building a communications system that meets users' needs and supports economic growth.

He stated that the CRA issued the national numbering plan, along with other relevant regulations, and worked on the allocation and distribution of numbers used in all telecommunications services or for any other numbering-related purposes, in addition to allocating about 11mn mobile phone numbers and around 2mn landline numbers to the telecommunications companies.

Additionally, it supported innovation and development in the telecommunications sector, allocating 300.000 numbers for Internet of Things (IoT) and machine-to-machine (M2M) applications.

Over the past decade, al-Muslemani said, the CRA has dedicated its resources to advancing the digital community in the country and worked on expanding Qatar's digital presence on the global stage, strengthening the foundations of digital infrastructure, and cybersecurity levels.



## Processed foods linked to colorectal cancer via inflammation

Colorectal cancer, the third most common cancer type worldwide, is fuelled by ultra-processed foods and unhealthy oils, according to researchers at USF Health and Tampa General Hospital Cancer Institute who have uncovered a potential link to chronic inflammation that drives tumour growth. Recently funded by the National Institutes of Health with a five-year, \$3.1mm grant, the researchers have already made major advancements in the understanding of colorectal cancer. Published in *Gut*, a leading international journal in gastroenterology and hepatology, the project's first study examines how processed foods are likely hindering the body's natural healing processes.

"It is well known that patients with unhealthy diets have increased inflammation in their bodies," said Dr Timothy Yeatman, professor of surgery in the USF Health Morsani College of Medicine and associate centre director for Translational Research and Innovation at the TGH Cancer Institute. "We now see this inflammation in the colon tumours themselves, and cancer is like a chronic wound that won't heal – if your body is living off of daily ultra-processed foods, its ability to heal that wound decreases due to the inflammation and suppression of the immune system that ultimately allows the cancer to grow."

According to Yeatman, this study emphasises the urgent need to reevaluate the components of the diet, which typically consists of excessive consumption of added sugars, saturated fats, ultraprocessed foods, chemicals and inflammatory seed oils. In previous studies, the USF Health Heart Institute found an imbalanced diet not only impacts colorectal cancer, but also plays a role in other diseases, including Alzheimer's, diabetes and cardiovascular conditions.

# Why Trump's pro-corporate populism cannot last

# The growing movement reflects deep bipartisan resentment toward corporate elites and may reshape political dynamics

he outpouring of joy on social media after the murder of UnitedHealthcare CEO Brian Thompson suggests that America's populist moment is evolving into something larger and more significant than just a backlash against the political establishment. If so, it is also ecoming comething Ameri have seen before. In the late nineteenth century, the People's Party, also known as the Populists, targeted big business as well as establishment politicians, blaming large enterprises for both destroying Americans' livelihoods and corrupting the government. This change could be bad news for Donald Trump. The US president-elect is not the first Republican politician to purport to serve both commerce and the forgotten man; but after campaigning alongside billionaires and inviting them into his administration, he has stretched this claim to the breaking point. The American Populists were mainly farmers in the South and Midwest whose fortunes plummeted as the country industrialised and as the cultural centre of gravity shifted to the cities. Both major parties neglected agrarian interests as they relitigated the Civil War and sought support from the rising commercial class (in the

case of the Republicans) and the expanding ethnic populations in the cities (in the case of the Democrats).

Farmers, pummelled by the "Great Deflation" caused by the government's insistence on paying off the war debt, thus took it upon themselves to mobilise, achieving political dominance in several states and greater influence in Congress.

The populists hated government elites in Washington, but they also hated the new trade, and meddling in foreign conflicts – what he sees as the roots of America's problems – he did not oppose big business. Instead, he confined himself to attacking business leaders who criticised him and his programs, along with the social-media platforms that he believed were censoring him and his followers.

Unlike in his earlier campaigns, Trump benefited from a kowtowing business establishment in 2024, and he has reciprocated by bringing

The question now is whether anti-corporate populism will grow in the United States as it did 140 years ago. The online celebration of Thompson's murder was not noticeably partisan. Across the board, Americans today have a low opinion of corporate elites, with only 16% telling Gallup that they have a "great deal" or "quite a lot of" confidence in big business. That is less than for nearly all other institutions respondents assessed, including labour unions the military, organised religion, public schools, higher education, the presidency, and small businesses. Indeed, unions are benefiting from an increasingly anti-business climate, as are government trustbusters. Europeans must be scratching their heads. America's Big Tech companies may be widely loathed at home, but they are envied on a continent that struggles to create its own innovative wealth creators. The truth, however, is that these companies' huge market capitalisations owe as much to their monopoly status as to innovation. They have long downplayed the significant social harms they do, and they constantly lobby policymakers to block regulation. It is little wonder that their stranglehold on American culture is now deeply resented by left and right alike. While the 2024 election dashed the hope that America's populist turmoil would end with the Biden administration, it remains to be seen what shape the movement will take. The nineteenthcentury Populists petered out as deflation eased and farmers' living standards finally improved toward the end of the century, and as party leaders realised that their best option was to fuse with the Democrats. But the populist impulse did not disappear. In the twentieth century, widespread hostility toward business found a home again in the Democratic Party, and the Republicans became the party hostile toward government. The incoming Trump administration has vowed to round up illegal aliens and raise tariffs, but it will probably fail to reinvigorate the economy for the masses, who will watch the rich get richer on crypto and AI. If Trump doesn't turn on the business class and lay the blame at its feet, someone else will. Maybe then business elites will finally appear in the political crosshairs, not just in those of lone gunmen. Project Syndicate

derived from the foods that we eat and, if the molecules are coming from processed food products, they directly imbalances the immune system and drives chronic inflammation."

While the molecules are difficult to detect, Halade used a highly sensitive analytical technique to detect trace amounts of lipids in 162 tumour samples from patients at Tampa General Hospital. The tumours were frozen within 30 minutes of removal and transported to his lab via USF and TGH Cancer Institute's Biobank, in collaboration with USF Health Colorectal Surgery and the Gastrointestinal Oncology Programme at TGH Cancer Institute. Inside the tumours, the team observed an excess number of molecules that promote inflammation and a shortage of those that help resolve it and promote healing.

These findings pave the way for a new, natural approach, resolution medicine, which focuses on restoring balance in the patient's diet to treat colorectal cancer more effectively. Resolution medicine would focus on reversing inflammation using healthy, unprocessed foods rich with omega-3 fatty acids and derivatives of fish oil called 'specialised pro-resolving mediators,' to restore the body's healing mechanisms along with balanced sleep and exercise. "This has the potential to revolutionise cancer treatment, moving beyond drugs to harness natural healing processes," Yeatman said. "It's a vital step toward addressing chronic inflammation and preventing diseases before they start."

Early trials using specialised derivatives of fish oil have shown promise in addressing inflammation at its root cause. The trials are underway at TGH Cancer Institute and the team will continue studying resolution medicine and its impact on patient treatment and disease prevention. 

businesses, particularly the railroads. The latter, they believed, discriminated against them in the market and corrupted the government through bribes and other forms of political influence. Still, while they considered the entire system to be rotten, they had no clear idea how to reform it.

Many Populist leaders hoped a Napoleon-like president would come to power and sweep away big business and big government alike. Since these two forces were linked by tentacles of corruption, only a leader with no roots in conventional politics could achieve this goal.

It is a familiar story. Trump won the presidency in 2016 by attacking the political establishments of both parties, as well as the "deep state" (federal bureaucracy). But, owing to necessity as much as expediency, he rarely attacked the billionaire class to which he belonged. While he blamed the political class for ignoring illegal immigration, globalising



Meanwhile, others – including Amazon founder Jeff Bezos, billionaire investor Nelson Peltz, and Blackstone CEO Stephen Schwarzman – have made their peace with Trump or are trying to. The libertarian wing of Silicon Valley has joined in with great enthusiasm. It will profit mightily when Trump delivers on his promise to deregulate crypto.

But while billionaires' dollars and backing helped Trump win, so did the votes of his most loyal supporters, the vast majority of whom are not wealthy. Many are non-college-educated, lowerskilled workers and religious social conservatives who have grown increasingly hostile toward business. Trump tapped into this hostility by attacking Big Tech and railing against corporate America's attempts to appease the left with diversity programs and climate goals.

# 'Definitely several hundred' killed as Cyclone Chido devastates Mayotte

coal authorities said yesterday that the likely death toll from Cyclone Chido's passage across Mayotte was "definitely several hundred" though the disruption means reaching an exact count will be difficult.

Rescue workers and supplies are being rushed in by air and sea, but their efforts are likely to be hindered by damage to airports and electricity distribution in a territory where even clean drinking water was already subject to chronic shortages.

A previous toll shared with AFP by a security source had confirmed only 14 deaths.

"I think there will definitely be several hundred, perhaps we will come close to a thousand or even several thousand" deaths, prefect Francois-Xavier Bieuville said on broadcaster Mayotte la Premiere. He added that it would be "very difficult to reach a final count" given that most residents are Muslim, traditionally burying their dead within 24 hours.

The mayor of Mayotte's capital Mamoudzou, Ambdilwahedou Soumaila, had earlier told AFP that nine people were gravely wounded and fighting for their lives in hospital, while 246 more were seriously injured.

"The hospital is hit, the schools are hit. Houses are totally devastated," he said, adding that the hurricane "spared nothing".

Mayotte's 320,000 residents had been ordered into lockdown Saturday as Cyclone Chido bore down on the islands around 500km east of Mozambique with gusts of at least 226kph.

Electricity poles were hurled to the ground, trees uprooted and sheet-metal roofs and walls torn off improvised structures inhabited by at least one-third of the population.

Information from the lockeddown population, in shock and largely cut off from water and electricity supplies, is slow to filter out, a source familiar with the recovery effort told AFP.

One local resident, Ibrahim, told AFP of "apocalyptic scenes" as he made his way through the main island, having to clear blocked roads for himself.

will travel to Mayotte today, his office said, alongside 160 soldiers and firefighters to reinforce the 110 already deployed to the islands.

Medical personnel and equipment were being delivered from Sunday by air and sea, said the prefecture in La Reunion, another French Indian Ocean territory some 1,400km away on the other side of Madagascar.

A first aid plane landed in Mayotte at around 3:30pm local time with three tonnes of medical supplies, blood for transfusions and 17 medical staff, authorities in La Reunion said, with two military aircraft expected to follow.

A navy patrol ship was also to depart La Reunion with personnel and equipment including for electricity supplier EDF.

Pope Francis, visiting French Mediterranean island Corsica yesterday, urged people to pray for Mayotte's residents.

Just northwest of Mayotte, the Comoros islands, some of which had been on red alert since Fri-

day, were also hit, but suffered only minor damage.

Cyclone Chido later slammed into Mozambique, bringing galeforce winds and heavy rain when it made landfall early yesterday around 40km south of the northern city of Pemba, weather services said.

Buildings were damaged and power knocked out in some areas of Mozambique's northern coastal provinces of Nampula and Cabo Delgado early Saturday, authorities said.

But by the afternoon Chido was travelling over the inland province of Niassa and had weakened, said the president of the National Institute for Risk and Disaster Management, Luisa Meque.

Unicef said it was on the ground to help the people impacted by the storm, which had already caused some damage.

"Many homes, schools and health facilities have been partially or completely destroyed and we are working closely with the government to ensure continuity of essential basic services," it said in a statement.

Cyclone Chido is the latest in a string of storms worldwide to be fuelled by climate change, according to experts.

The "exceptional" cyclone was super-charged by particularly warm Indian Ocean waters, meteorologist Francois Gourand of France's Meteo France weather service told AFP.

The United Nations Office for the Co-ordination of Humanitarian Affairs (OCHA) said on Friday it was similar in strength to cyclones Gombe in 2022 and Freddy in 2023, which killed more than 60 people and at least 86 in Mozambique respectively.

It warned that some 1.7mn people were in danger, and said the remnants of the cyclone could also dump "significant rainfall" on neighbouring Malawi through Monday, potentially triggering flash floods.

Zimbabwe and Zambia were also expected to see heavy rains, it added.

# Lula discharged from hospital following emergency surgery

Brazilian President Luiz Inacio Lula da Silva was discharged yesterday from a Sao Paulo hospital following emergency surgery last week to treat an intracranial haemorrhage.

"I am here in one piece...returning home calmly," the 79-year-old leftist leader said as he made a surprise appearance at a news conference by his medical team at Hospital Sirio-Libanes. Lula had successful surgery on Tuesday in which doctors drilled through his skull to relieve pressure that built up after a blow to the head in October, when he fell in a bathroom in his presidential

Known for his frenetic work pace, Lula burst into the news conference Sunday without warning and approached the microphones, walking unassisted. He addressed reporters while wearing a fedorastyle hat that covered up signs of his operations, accompanied by his wife Rosangela "Janja" da Silva.

Lula's medical emergency started when he complained last Monday of a headache while in Brasilia.

"I felt like my steps were slowing down, my eyes were red and I was very sleepy," he said. An MRI scan found a haemorrhage between his brain and the dura mater membrane that protects it, prompting his swift transport to Hospital Sirio-Libanes – the country's top medical facility – for the surgery. "I confess I was scared by the volume of fluid growth in my head. I was worried by the urgency of the request" to go to the hospital, he President Luiz Inacio Lula da Silva, accompanied by his wife Rosangela 'Janja' da Silva, waves while leaving the Sirio-Libanes Hospital after surgery in Sao Paulo yesterday. said. "I never think I'm going to die, but I'm scared, so I need to follow the rules," Lula said, adding that he will not go to the beach for the end-of-year holidays, as many Brazilians do.

Now, he said, "I am calm. I feel good." After suffering his fall on October 19, Lula told an official from his Workers' Party that the accident had been "serious."

In the weeks following, the president skipped planned overseas trips. But from mid-November he resumed his active schedule, hosting a G2O summit in Rio and attending a Mercosur summit in Uruguay.

The latest medical emergency adds to a list of health problems Lula has suffered over the years, including treatment in 2011 for throat cancer, and a hip replacement operation last year. South Korea's opposition leader urged a top court yesterday to swiftly formalise the impeachment of President Yoon Sukyeol and ease the "suffering of the people" after his short-lived martial law decree.

Lawmakers voted on Saturday to remove Yoon from office over his "insurrectionary" suspension of civilian rule, which lasted hours but plunged South Korea into some of its worst political turmoil in years.

Yoon has been suspended while South Korea's Constitutional Court deliberates the impeachment, with Prime Minister Han Duck-soo serving as interim leader.

The court has 180 days to rule on Yoon's future.

Opposition leader Lee Jae-myung on Sunday urged the judges to "swiftly" remove Yoon from office.

"This is the only way to minimise national turmoil and alleviate the suffering of the people," he said.

"To hold those responsible for this absurd situation accountable and to prevent its recurrence, it is essential to uncover the truth and demand accountability."

An investigation into Yoon's inner circle over last week's martial law declaration has also rumbled on. ported.

Prosecutors said they were also seeking an arrest warrant for the head of the Army Special Warfare Command Kwak Jong-keun, according to Yonhap.

Kwak is accused of sending special forces troops to parliament during the martial law bid – sparking a dramatic confrontation between soldiers and parliamentary staff.

The investigators also said they had summoned Yoon for questioning over insurrection allegations.

"We instructed him to appear for questioning at 10am, but he refused to comply," the prosecution said in a press release.

"We will issue a second summons," they said without giving details.

And on Saturday, police arrested Yeo In-hyung, head of the Defense Counterintelligence Command, on charges including insurrection.

The South Korean government has meanwhile sought to project an air of business as usual.

Acting president Han yesterday held a call with US President Joe Biden, who underscored the strength of bilateral ties.

The United States is a key treaty

"confidence that the Alliance will remain the linchpin for peace and prosperity in the Indo-Pacific region during Acting President Han's tenure".

"President Biden expressed his appreciation for the resiliency of democracy and the rule of law in the Republic of Korea," the White House said.

Han has also ordered the military to "enhance vigilance" against North Korea, with which the South technically remains at war.

North Korea is yet to publicly comment on Yoon's impeachment.

Vast protests both for and against Yoon have rocked the South Korean capital since the December 3 martial law decree.

Demonstrators in both camps have vowed to keep up the pressure campaign as the Constitutional Court mulls Yoon's fate.

"I will certainly protest at the court to demand it reject the impeachment," Cho Hee-sun, a Yoon supporter, told AFP at a rally on Saturday before the parliamentary vote.

Seoul police estimated at least 200,000 people had gathered outside parliament in support of removing the president.

## Assad's Baath party wiped off Mideast politics, say analysts

The Baath party, once a powerful symbol of Arab nationalism, has become a fading relic of authoritarian rule in the Middle East after the fall of Syria's Bashar al-Assad, analysts told AFP vesterday.

The party has suspended its activities in Syria after Islamist-led rebel forces toppled Assad's government last week, 20 years after its rival twin branch in Iraq was banned, marking the final collapse of a movement that once held sweeping power in both countries.

With Assad gone, "the Baath in Syria... is bound to fully decline," said Nikolaos van Dam, an expert on the party and author of a book about its history, *The Struggle for Power in Syria*.

Van Dam said he does not believe "they will ever have an opportunity for a comeback".

The Arab Socialist Baath Party, officially, was founded in Damascus on April 7, 1947, seeking to merge socialist ideals and Arab nationalism.

In its early years, the party recognised the important cultural role of religion for Muslims, who make up the majority in most Middle Eastern countries, while advocating a secular state that could unify the fragmented Arab world across sectarian divides.

But in both Syria and Iraq, whose populations are multi-ethnic and multi-sectarian, the Baath party had become a vehicle for minority rule. In Iraq, Sunni Muslims ruled

over a Shiite majority, while Alawites – the Assad family – ruled over Syria's Sunni majority.

Sami Moubayed, a Damascusbased historian and writer, said that both the Iraqi and Syrian branches failed to live up to their slogan of "Unity, Freedom and Socialism".

"There was never unity, let alone freedom," he said.

"Their socialism amounted to disastrous nationalisations," added Moubayed, author of *The Makers of Modern Syria: The Rise and Fall of Syrian Democracy* 1918-1958.

The Baath had evolved into authoritarianism under Saddam Hussein in Iraq and Hafez al-As-

sad, and later his son Bashar, in Syria.

"Arab nationalism, particularly secular Arab nationalism, has lost much of its appeal...and thereby also the role of the Baath Party as an Arab nationalist party," said van Dam. "State nationalism has gradually become more important than pan-Arab nationalism".

In Syria, a military junta dominated by Alawite, Druze and Christian officers seized power in 1963, adopting Marxist-inspired policies.

The party's founders, Michel Aflaq, a Christian, and Saleh Bitar, a Sunni, were sidelined and then fled to Iraq.

Hafez al-Assad, an air force commander, emerged as the dominant figure in 1970, consolidating control over the party and leading Syria in a reign marked brutal repression.

In 2000, his son Bashar took power. In neighbouring Iraq, the Baath party solidified its grip in 1968 through a military coupled by General Ahmed Hassan al-Bakr.

In 1970, Saddam Hussein assumed control, ruling with an iron fist until his overthrow by a US-led coalition in 2003.

"Both parties only led their countries to failure," said Moubayed.

"What victory can they claim?"

Under the Baath rule, Syria's military lost territory to Israel in a 1967 war and suffered painful blows in another conflict six years later.

The Iraqi Baath party failed against Iran in the 1980-1988 war, initiated an invasion of Kuwait in 1990, and collapsed under the USled coalition intervention in 2003.

Despite their shared Baathist roots, the Syrian and Iraqi branches were bitter rivals.

E the Minister of Transport Sheikh Mohammed bin Abdullah bin Mohammed al-Thani laid the foundation stone yesterday for an EU-standard electric bus assembly plant at Um Al Houl Free Zone.

The plant is a collaboration between Mowasalat (Karwa), Chinese commercial vehicle manufacturer Yutong, and the Qatar Free Zones Authority (QFZ).

Marking the ceremony, an Enhanced Multilateral Framework Agreement was signed by HE the QFZ Chief Executive Sheikh Mohammed bin Hamad bin Faisal al-Thani, Karwa chief executive Ahmad Hassan al-Obaidly, and Yutong Middle East chief executive Shen Hui.

The plant is expected to be a pioneer project in delivering experience and industry localisation.

HE the Minister of Transport said that the founding an e-bus assembly plant is a major event in terms of supporting the efforts of the Ministry of Transport (MoT) to provide eco-friendly transportation solutions with the best global operation systems, in step with the goals of the Third Qatar National Development Strategy (NDS3), which focuses on sustainable development and advanced technologies, leading to the full realisation of the Qatar National Vision 2030 (QNV 2030).

The plant, HE Sheikh Mohammed bin Abdullah said, will contribute to achieving the MoT's strategy of public bus system electrification by 100% by 2030, ensuring less carbon emissions and better quality of life.

"As part of our commitment to developing sustainable transportation and our success in achieving 73% electrification in the public bus fleet, this initiative reflects our dedication to localising innovative technologies in Qatar," Karwa chairman Dr Engineer Saad bin Ahmed Ibrahim al-Mohannadi.



Difesa Servizi is the in-house company of the Italian ministry of defence that creates and supports all phases of the initiative.

The arrival in Doha of the Vespucci World Tour and the Villaggio Italia is part of the bilateral relationship between Qatar and Italy that has strengthened intensely in recent years, thanks to constant institutional dialogue.

His Highness the Amir Sheikh Tamim bin Hamad al-Thani visited Italy three times between 2016 and 2023.

In January 2020 Italian President Sergio Mattarella visited Doha, while in September last year Prime Minister Meloni was in Doha where she held a meet ing with His Highness the Amir.



On the occasion of His Highness the Amir's State Visit to Italy on October 21 this year, President Mattarella himself announced the arrival in Doha of the Vespucci, in conjunction with the celebrations of Qatar National Day on December 18.
