The Red Cross launched an emergency appeal yesterday for \$145mn to aid millions of Syrians returning to destroyed homes and neighbourhoods after the fall of long-time leader Bashar al-Assad. The International Federation of Red Cross and Red Crescent Societies said the money was for "critical health care, urgently needed food and shelter supplies, cash assistance and psychological support for those experiencing trauma".

US to withdraw from WHO

Members of Donald Trump's presidential transition team are laying the groundwork for the United States to withdraw from the World Health Organisation (WHO) on the first day of his second term. "I have it on good authority that he plans to withdraw, probably on Day One or very early in his administration," said Lawrence Gostin, professor of global health at Georgetown University in Washington.

Biden commutes death sentences

US President Joe Biden yesterday commuted the sentences for 37 out of 40 federal inmates on death row, converting them to life in prison without parole before he hands over power to President-elect Donald Trump on Jan 20. 'Gaps have narrowed in Gaza truce talks'

aps between Israel and Palestinian resistance movement Hamas over a possible Gaza ceasefire have narrowed, according to Israeli and Palestinian officials' remarks yesterday, though crucial differences have yet to be resolved.

A fresh bid by mediators Qatar, Egypt and the US to end the fighting and release Israeli hostages and Palestinian prisoners has gained momentum this month, though no breakthrough has yet been reported.

Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu yesterday said progress had been made in hostage negotiations with Hamas in Gaza but that he did not know how much longer it would take to see the results.

A Palestinian official familiar with the talks said while some sticking points had been resolved, the identity of some of the Palestinian prisoners to be released by Israel in return for hostages had yet to be agreed, along with the precise deployment of Israeli troops in Gaza.

His remarks corresponded with comments by the Israeli diaspora minister, Amichai Chikli, who said both issues were still being negotiated. Nonetheless, he said, the sides were far closer to reaching agreement than they have been for months.

"This ceasefire can last six months or it can last 10 years, it depends on the dynamics that will form on the ground," Chikli told Israel's Kan radio. Much hinged on what powers would be run-

ning and rehabilitating Gaza once fighting stopped, he said.

The duration of the ceasefire has been a fundamental sticking point throughout several rounds of failed negotiations. Hamas wants an end to the war, while Israel wants an end to Hamas' rule of Gaza first.

"The issue of ending the war completely hasn't yet been resolved," said the Palestinian official

Israeli minister Zeev Elkin, a member of Netanyahu's security cabinet, told Israel's Army Radio that the aim was to find an agreed framework that would resolve that difference during a second stage of the ceasefire deal.

Chikli said the first stage would be a humanitarian phase that will last 42 days and include a hostage release.

At least 24 Palestinians were killed in Israeli strikes yesterday, medics said.

Among the dead were four Palestinians killed when an Israeli airstrike hit a group of Palestinians tasked with protecting aid trucks into Gaza, medics said.

One of Gaza's few still partially functioning hospitals, on its northern edge, an area under intense Israeli military pressure for nearly three months, sought urgent help after being hit by Israeli

Palestinians accuse Israel of seeking to permanently depopulate northern Gaza to create a buffer zone, which Israel denies.

Yesterday, the United Nations' aid chief, Tom Fletcher, said Israeli forces had hampered efforts to deliver much-needed aid in northern Gaza.

Shura deliberates on National Emblem bill

'E Shura Council Speaker Hassan bin Abdullah al-Ghanem chaired yesterday the legislature's weekly session. The session in the Tamim bin Hamad Hall started with HE Shura Council Secretary-General Nayef bin Mohammed al-Mahmoud reading out the agenda before the minutes of the previous session were approved.

The agenda began with a debate motion based on a report of the Education, Culture, Sport and Information Committee on regulating digital content creation. In this regard, HE al-Ghanem highlighted free speech and personal freedoms as rights guaranteed by the Qatari constitution, yet he elaborated that all Qatar residents and visitors are required to adhere to public order and morals and to observe national traditions and established

Stressing the dangers of the uncontrolled digital and social media

usage, especially among youths, HE the Speaker highlighted the digital platforms' mounting impact on shaping awareness and public opinion and the need for digital media content to keep the society stable and respect its values and ethics.

HE Chairman of the Education, Culture, Sport and Information Committee Khalid bin Ahmed al-Obaidan detailed the committee deliberations and consultations with representatives of several parties on the topic. Following the debate, the legislative body decided to submit a proposal to the

Cabinet to regulate a disciplined digital media content.

The proposal includes a legal framework under which social media influencers will be licensed by state relevant authorities to ensure a content consistent with values and national identity, and prevent the spread of foreign cultures and uncontrolled advertisements.

Furthermore, the envisioned licence makes sure the content never harms national unity and social cohesion, avoid hate speech, discrimination and violence and respects cultural heritage, values and national identity. Also among the licensing regulations are credibility, intellectual property rights, transparency and the respect of social responsibility through avoiding misleading or unscientifically proven information.

Meanwhile, the Shura Council discussed a government bill on the national emblem of the State of Qatar and referred it to the Internal and External Affairs Committee for consideration.

The Council also approved a bill amending some provisions of the Income Tax Law issued by Law No 24 of 2018, and referred it to the esteemed government, after considering the Financial and Economic Affairs Committee report. The draft amendment to the law enables multinational companies to submit their tax returns, and implement global rules to combat tax base erosion and profit shifting for multinational companies.

Yesterday's session concluded with a review of reports on the recent participation of the Shura Council delegations in regional and international parliamentary

QRCS, UNFPA provide healthcare for 63,000 beneficiaries in Yemen



A total of 63,422 women and girls have befitted from the project.

The representation office of Qatar Red Crescent Society (QRCS) in Yemen is pursuing the project of providing comprehensive healthcare services for the most vulnerable groups and enhancing access to maternal and neonatal health services, co-funded by QRCS and the United Nations Population Fund (UNFPA).

To date, a total of 63,422 women and girls in three governorates have received reproductive health services, including pregnancy and newborn care. Also, there were 4,959 natural childbirths and C-sections. The project meets the needs of six health facilities, including medications, medical consumables, operational expenses, and staff remunerations, at a cost of \$926,700.

The target facilities are General Khalifa and Wihda Hospitals in Taiz; Surgical Hospital in Al-Hudaydah; and Wihda Hospital, Al-Manar Hospital, and Bayt Hanzal Medical Complex in Amanat Al-Asimah.

This project is part of a strategic partnership between QRCS and UNFPA, aimed at improving reproductive health services in Yemen and strengthening resilience and self-dependence of the health system and local communities.

Syrian medics coerced into false chemical attack testimony

wo Syrian doctors and a nurse said in a series of interviews over the weekend that Bashar al-Assad's government coerced them into providing false testimony to international investigators after a deadly 2018 chlorine attack.

The three, who treated the wounded at a field hospital in the rebel-held town of Douma near Damascus after the April 7, 2018 attack, said they were summoned to national security headquarters in the capital.

"I was told...that they knew where my family is in Damascus," said orthopaedic surgeon Mohammed al-Hanash, giving public testimony which would have been impossible before the fall of Assad's government on December 8.

Emergency and intensive care specialist Hassan Oyoun said that "when I arrived before the investigator...his gun was on the table pointing towards me". "I immediately understood what was being asked for and that the objective was for us to say" there had been no chemical attack," he said.

Muwafaq Nisrin, 30, who worked as an emergency responder and nurse in 2018, said: "I was under pressure because my family lives in Douma - like most of the medical personnel's families". The attack targeted a building

near a field hospital, where the wounded were taken and where the three personnel were among those working. A video soon circulated on-

line showing chaos at the facility, with medics treating the wounded including children, and a man spraying people with water. Assad's government called the

images "fake", and security services questioned those who appeared in the video, including the medical staff whom AFP met.

In Ianuary last ve ganisation for the Prohibition of Chemical Weapons (OPCW) blamed the Damascus government for the attack, which killed

Investigators said there were "reasonable grounds to believe" that at least one Syrian air force helicopter had dropped two cylinders of the toxic gas on Douma.

Damascus and ally Moscow said the attack was staged by rescue workers at the behest of the US, which afterwards launched air strikes on Syria, as did Britain and France.

"A team of us doctors who were at the hospital went to the national security building and met an investigator, and we tried as much as possible to give vague answers,"

Hanash said. "I was asked, for example, what happened that day... I told them that I was in the operating room," where chemical attack victims would not have been taken, he added.

Oyoun said that "all those at the hospital at the time were put under intense pressure, reaching barely concealed threats".

"We denied the incident...we avoided responding to certain questions, such as 'where were the dead taken?" he said, and tried to blame cases of suffocation on "the dust, the dirt and the smoke from the fighting". Nisrin, seen in the video helping a girl in extreme distress said the authorities "told us that no chemical attack happened" and that they "wanted to end this story and deny it so that Douma could turn a new page".

The OPCW watchdog said an "elite" Syrian unit known as the Tiger Force had launched the attack during a military offensive to reclaim Douma, and that rebels had agreed to withdraw the day afterwards. All three medical personnel said that after the first round of questioning, they were told to repeat their responses in front of a camera as testimony for an investigating committee working with the OPCW. The footage was "edited and some passages where deleted or taken out of context to serve the point of view" of the authorities,

Hanash said, and broadcast on state television the following day.

OPCW investigators have concluded that chemical weapons were used or likely used in 20 instances in Syria. The medics said the findings eased a burden they had been struggling with for years.

Hanash said he and his colleagues had waited a long time for "the security grip upon us to lift and for the day we could talk truthfully about what happened".

"We were happy... that our testimony did not impact the course of the investigation," he said.

But until those who carried out the attack are punished, "the joy is incomplete".

The bright red truck of CinemaTdour, or "moving cinema", has transformed parking lots and factory grounds in underserved towns and neighbourhoods across the North African country into pop-up theatres.

In the central town of Diemmal, dozens of workers unloaded the expandable truck, easily setting up a fully equipped outdoor movie theatre with 100 seats.

"The screen is huge, and the sound effects are amazing," said Elhani, who had so far only watched films on his phone or computer.

He had "never had the chance to go to a movie theatre", he said. "It's a fantastic experience. especially because I'm watching

with friends." Movie theatres are scarce in Tunisia, numbering at just 15 and largely concentrated in major urban hubs.

Recognising this gap, Cin-

Mobile cinemas have long existed in other countries, but Heraghi said CinemaTdour was "unique" for turning a truck into a full-fledged theatre. Without government fund-

ing, CinemaTdour relies heavily on partnerships with private companies to cover costs like film rights, maintenance and staffing.

The truck itself was purchased on credit for about 1mn Tunisian dinars (\$315,000), Heraghi said, with annual operating expenses of around 500,000 dinars.

For 10 days in Djemmal, residents could watch films for free thanks to a partnership with German car parts manufacturer

Draxlmaier, which has a factory in the town.

Jihene Ben Amor, Draxlmaier's communications manager in Tunisia, said the company wanted to "contribute to the development" of remote and underserved regions where it operates.

For many workers, earning up to 1,000 dinars a month, the cost of tickets and the journey to a main city with a movie theatre can be prohibitive. "Having this cinema right out-

side their workplace also gives workers a sense of pride and belonging," said Ben Amor.

in Hay Hlel was funded by the World Health Organisation, with screenings themed on mental health, smoking and drug abuse, and violence against women. The shows were tailored for

younger audiences as well as for viewers with hearing or visual impairments.

Heraghi, the project head, said that "what drives us is the social impact of culture." "We want to break stere-

otypes, shift mindsets, and promote values like social cohesion and community spirit." In just a few months, CinemaTdour has reached more than 15,000 people, including 7,500 in the southern oasis town of Nefta where a month of free screenings was sponsored by a date exporter.

The project now hopes to secure funding for additional trucks to expand its activities across the country.

But Heraghli has even bigger aspirations, she said, "taking it to Algeria, Libya, and maybe even across Africa".

Nine killed in Iran as bus, fuel truck collide

At least nine people were killed yesterday when a bus collided with a fuel truck in Iran's southeast. state media reported, the second mass casualty road accident within days, AFP reported from Tehran. Mozambique's top court confirms ruling party win in disputed election

ozambique's top court yesterday confirmed the ruling party Frelimo's victory in an October election, which has sparked massive protests by opposition groups who say the vote was rigged.

The Constitutional Council has the final say over the electoral process and its ruling is likely to spark further protests in Mozambique, a Southern African country of close to 35mn people that Frelimo has governed since 1975

Western observers said the election was not free and fair, and the post-election period has seen the biggest protests against Frelimo in Mozambique's history.

At least 130 people have been killed in clashes with police, according to the civil society monitoring group Plataforma Decide.

TV Sucesso Moz showed protesters had taken to the streets in the northern city of Nacala-Porto within an hour of the announcement and in other areas of the capital.

In its final tally, the Constitutional Council said Chapo had secured about 65% of the vote, lower than the figure of more than 70% given by the electoral commission in late October. It also gave Frelimo fewer seats in the parliament than the commission did, without explaining why it had made those changes. Frelimo has consistently been accused by opponents and election observers of rigging votes since it first allowed elections in 1994, although it has repeatedly denied those accusations. The electoral commission has not commented on allegations of fraud in this election. Chapo told a Frelimo gathering that as president he would work to improve the lives of Mozambicans.

A representative of opposition leader Venancio Mondlane, who the Constitutional Council said came second in the presidential election with about 24% of the vote, rejected the results announced yesterday. "We never

thought that the electoral truth would be trampled. The will of the people was obliterated." Judite Simao said. The post-election unrest has already affected the operations of foreign companies including the Australian mining firm South32 and led to the temporary closure of the main border crossing with neighbouring South Africa.

A senior International Monetary Fund official told Reuters Mozambique's 2024 economic growth would likely be below a previous 4.3% forecast because of the unrest and the impact of this month's Cyclone Chido.

Emergency response activated as Lassa fever kills 190 this year

Nigeria has launched an emergency response centre after recording 190 deaths from Lassa fever, a viral haemorrhagic illness, the country's disease control agency said yesterday, Reuters reported from Lagos. The disease, mainly transmitted to humans via contact with food or household items contaminated with rodent urine or excrement, has infected 1,154 people in six Nigerian states. Jide Idris, head of the Nigerian Center for Disease Control (NCDC), said the agency's risk assessment has categorised it as high, prompting the activation of the emergency Operations Centre to manage the outbreak. "While the disease occurs throughout the year, peak transmission typically happens between October and May coinciding with the dry when human exposure to rodents increases," he said at a press briefing in Abuja. The centre will ensure seamless co-ordination of the control and management of the outbreak. Symptoms of the virus which can also be passed between people through bodily fluids of those infected — include fever, headaches and, in the most severe cases, death.

Nigeria govt resumes mining in Zamfara state on improved security

igeria has lifted a ban on mining exploration in the northwestern state of Zamfara after a five-year suspension, the mining minister said, citing improved security.

Mining activities in Zamfara, which holds huge gold, lithium and copper deposits, were suspended in 2019 following incessant bandit attacks.

"The security operatives' giant strides have led to a notable reduction in the level of insecurity, and with the ban on exploration lifted. Zamfara's mining sector can gra ıdııally begin contributing to the nation's revenue pool," Dele Alake, mining minister, said in a statement

on Sunday. During the suspension, he said illegal miners had exploited the state's resources.

Africa's biggest oil producer, which is also rich in gold, limestone and zinc, wants its min-

ing industry that contributes less than 1% of its GDP to play a bigger role in its effort to diversify the economy away from oil.

To try to encourage investors, it has introduced reforms, including revoking unused licences, offering investors a 75% stake in a new national mining company, cutting exports of unprocessed minerals, and enforcing compliance with rules against illegal mining.

In its efforts to build capacity, Nigeria at the start of this month signed a training and development agreement with France.

"We need all the support we can get, including technical, financial, and capacity-building assistance from abroad. This is not the first agreement of its kind; similar partnerships have been established with Germany and Australia," Alake said.

Cyclone death toll rises to 120 in Mozambique

yclone Chido killed at least 120 people in Mozambique in its deadly rampage through the Indian Ocean last week, the country's disaster management agency said yesterday, up 26 from a previous toll.

The cyclone, which devastated the French island territory of Mayotte before hitting the African mainland, also destroyed 110,000 homes in Mozambique, officials said. It comes as the southern African nation reels from a deadly post-election crisis pitting the party in power since Mozambique's independence from Portugal against an opposition crying foul over alleged electoral fraud.

After making landfall the storm ravaged the northern province of Cabo Delgado with gusts of around 260km (160 miles) per hour, pelting it with 250mm (10 inches) of rain in a day. The region is regularly ravaged by tropical storms and is also wrestling with unrest from a

long-running insurgency. More than 500,000 of the 700,000 Mozambicans affected by the storm which experts say was made more intense by human-driven climate change - are concentrated in Cabo Delgado.

In the hard-hit Mecufi district a mosque had its roof stripped by the gale, as seen in images taken by Unicef. The ruling Frelimo party's presidential candidate Daniel Chapo - whose win at the ballot box in October has been denounced by the opposition as fraudulent visited the affected areas on Sunday. At least 130 people have been killed in protests against Chapo's victory in an election that international observers say was marred by irregularities, according to Plataforma Decide. That local civil society group's figures have been cited by Amnesty International.

Chapo – who is due to be sworn in as president on January 15 after the Constitutional Council approved the election results yesterday - appealed on public television for citizens across the country to donate food and clothes.



Senegal's toy makers thrive ahead of Christmas

nenegal's local toymakers are experiencing a boom in demand ahead of Christmas, with sellers hoping to win market share with high-quality products that reflect the country's culture and values.

Mostly Muslim Senegal has a strong tradition in which different religions share and enjoy each other's holidays. Christmas is an example in the capital Dakar, where the city is lit up with decorations in December and holiday markets draw families seeking gifts. Awa Gaye, the co-founder of the toy brand Yeewu, was among the sellers at a bustling Christmas market this month. She launched the business after having a daughter and realising there were few toys that made her feel valued.

"She couldn't see herself reflected in the toys she played with. So, we decided to create a brand," Gaye said.

Yeewu dolls are adorned with

African hairstyles and clothing, and carry inscriptions in the widely spoken local language Wolof. The idea is still new to some Senegalese parents, who sometimes ask her for white dolls or for writing in French.

Another local producer, Racky Daffe, founder of Senegalese toy brand Alyfa, is known for toys that promote Senegalese culture. like traditional wrestler figurines or dolls that come in a wide range of skin tones, including albino.

Daffe says demand is growing, but there are challenges competing against cheaper, imported products. In Senegal, there are often shortages of raw materials or financing that constrain production. "The biggest challenge com-

pared with global brands is that we cannot produce at the scale needed to offer these toys at a price affordable for the Senegalese middle class," said Daffe. Distributors, who have had ris-

ing sales in the past few years, are aware of the constraints. At Kidz Palace, a toy distribu-

tor in Dakar, chief executive Fa-

timetou Diop, said the toys sell quickly among families that want educational toys that reflect the country's cultural identity.

"The market cannot always be supplied consistently," Diop said. "Sometimes we run out of stock due to raw material shortages or financing issues. Local manufacturers often face these constraints."

Daffe remains optimistic that demand for Senegalese toys will remain strong, and noted that children often point out toys that look like them.

"It's really about representing an entire community. Every child can see themselves through our toys," she said.

Manila to acquire US Typhon missile system

Manila

The Philippines yesterday said it planned to acquire the US Typhon missile system as part of a push to secure its maritime interests, sparking warnings from China of a regional "arms

The US army deployed the midrange missile system in the northern Philippines earlier this year for annual joint military exercises with its long-time ally, and decided to leave it there despite criticism by Beijing that it was destabilising to Asia.

Philippine army chief lieutenant-general Roy Galido told a news conference yesterday that the missile system would be "acquired because we see its feasibility and its functionality in our concept of archipelagic defence implementa-

"I'm happy to report to our fellow countrymen that your army is developing this capability for the interest of protecting our sovereignty," he said, adding the total cost of the acquisition would depend on "economics".

The presence of the US mis-

sile launcher had angered Beijing, whose navy and coast guard forces have engaged in escalating confrontations in recent months with the Philippines over disputed reefs and waters in the South China Sea.

Beijing claims almost the entire South China Sea despite an international ruling that its assertion has no legal basis.

Manila and Washington, longstanding treaty allies, have deepened their defence co-operation since Philippine President Ferdinand Marcos took office in 2022 and began pushing back on Beijing's claims to the South China

China yesterday swiftly condemned the decision to acquire the system as a "provocative and dangerous move" and warned it risked triggering an "arms race".

"It is an extremely irresponsible choice for the history of its own people and the people of southeast Asia, as well as for regional security," foreign ministry spokeswoman Mao Ning said yesterday.

"The region needs peace and prosperity, not missiles and confrontation," she added, urging Manila to "correct its wrong practices as soon as possible".

or more years for the Philippine military to acquire a new weapons system from the planning stage, Galido said yesterday, adding it was not yet budgeted for 2025.

It took five years for Manila to take delivery of the BrahMos cruise missile last year, he added.

The land-based "mid-range capability" Typhon missile launcher, developed by US firm Lockheed Martin for the US army, has a range of 480km, though a longer-range version is in development.

Galido said the Typhon system would enable the army to "project force" outwards up to 370kms, which is the limit of the archipelago nation's maritime entitlements under the United Nations Convention on the Law of the Sea.

"You have to take note of the fact that at 200 nautical miles there is no land there and the army cannot go there," he said.

The Typhon platform "will protect our floating assets", he said, a reference to ships of the Philippine navy, coast guard and other ves-

Chinese Defence Minister Dong Jun warned in June that the Typhon deployment was "severely damaging regional security and stability".

New Zealand govt rejects Cook Islands passport plan

ew Zealand has rejected a proposal by the Cook Islands, a self-governing nation in free association with the larger Pacific country, to allow the creation of its own passports and citizenship but said it could discuss independence.

A spokesperson for New Zealand's Minister of Foreign Affairs Winston Peters said in a statement that a separate passport, citizenship and membership of the United Nations are only available to fully independent and sovereign countries.

As such, the Cook Islands could not access these things while it remains in free association with

New Zealand and would need to become fully independent for it to do so, the spokesperson said.

"If the goal of the government of the Cook Islands is independence from New Zealand, then of course that's a conversation we are ready for them to initiate," the spokesperson said. He added any decision on Cook Islands' future would be made by referendum.

The Cook Islands is a grouping of 15 islands and atolls in the South Pacific. It has a population of 15,000 and been a self-governing nation in free association with New Zealand for nearly 60 years.

The democratically elected government controls domestic and international affairs but the population has New Zealand citizenship. According to New Zealand's ministry of foreign affairs and trade, New Zealand also has a constitutional obligation to respond to requests for assistance with for-

eign affairs, disasters and defence. Nearly 100,000 people who identify as Cook Island Maori live

in New Zealand currently. In documents released first to broadcaster 1News, but seen by Reuters, Cook Island Prime Minister Mark Brown has been pushing for New Zealand to allow for the creation of the passport. Both New Zealand Prime Minister Christopher Luxon and Foreign Minister Peters have said this is not pos-

"A Cook Islands passport would raise fundamental questions for our shared constitutional relationship and shared citizenship." Peters wrote in a letter to Brown in September 2024.

Cadbury loses royal warrant under King Charles III

Chocolate firm Cadbury yesterday said it was "disappointed" after losing its royal warrant for the first time in 170 years following King Charles Ill's first review of the coveted list since becoming

Campaign group B4Ukraine earlier this year urged the king to remove companies "still operating in Russia" following its invasion of

It singled out Mondelez International which owns Cadbury as well as Nestle and Unilever, the maker of the UK's hate-it-or-love-it breakfast spread, Marmite.

Cadbury was among 100 firms including Unilever missing from a new list of 386 royal warrant holders, although Nestle retained its warrant. Not all those absent from the latest list, published by the Royal Warrant Holders Association, were necessarily actively removed, and instead may have ceased trading or not applied. The review of royal warrants follows Charles'

accession to the throne in September 2022 on the death of his mother Queen Elizabeth II.

Warrant holders receive "the right to display the appropriate royal arms on their product, packaging, stationery, advertising, premises and vehicles"

It is regarded as a guarantee of quality and can sway some customers to choose a particular firm's goods or services.

Cadbury, which was first awarded a royal warrant by Queen Victoria in 1854, was reportedly a

favourite of the late queen. A spokesperson for Mondelez said Cadbury had been "a part of British life for generations" and remained the "nation's favourite chocolate". "Whilst we are disappointed to be one of hundreds of other businesses and brands in the UK to not have a new warrant awarded, we are proud to have previously held one, and we fully respect the decision," the spokesperson added.

A Unilever spokesperson said it was proud of the long royal association of its brands, but that the granting of warrants was "a matter for the royal

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


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
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
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





























India's popcorn tax formula sparks outrage against GST system

ndia's move to tax popcorn differently based on its sugar or spice content has drawn criticism from the opposition and sparked social media outrage, with two former government economic advisers questioning the tax system introduced in 2017.

The Goods and Services Tax (GST) Council, chaired by the finance minister and including state representatives, announced on Saturday that non-branded popcorn mixed with salt and spices would attract a 5% GST, pre-packaged and branded popcorn 12%, and caramel popcorn. categorised as a sugar confectionery, 18%.

The differential rates come into effect immediately, ending confusion over rates as popcorn was taxed differently across states.

Explaining the rationale behind the decision to tax caramel popcorn at 18%, Finance Minister Nirmala Sitharaman said that any

product with added sugar is taxed differently.

The announcement, however, sparked a social media storm, with opposition politicians, economists and supporters of Prime Minister Narendra Modi's government criticising the move and others creating memes and poking fun at it.

"Complexity is a bureaucrat's delight and citizens' nightmare," India's previous chief economic adviser KV Subramanian wrote on X. He questioned the rationale of the decision he said will contribute minimally to tax revenues, but inconvenience citizens.

His predecessor, Arvind Subramanian, said: "The folly is compounded because instead of at least moving in the direction of simplicity we are veering to greater complexity, difficulty of enforcement and just irrationality".

One widely circulated post on X showed an image of a branded "salt caramel" popcorn packet and said how it would send the taxman into a tizzy calculating the tax rate

Jairam Ramesh, leader and

spokesman of the main opposition Congress party, said the "absurdity of three different tax slabs for popcorn under GST...only brings to light a deeper issue that the growing complexity of a system that was supposed to be a Good and Simple Tax".

A finance ministry spokesperson and the GST Council Secretariat did not respond to requests for comment on the controversy.

Gopal Krishna Agarwal, the ruling Bharatiya Janata Party's spokesman on economic affairs, said the GST Council "clarification" on how popcorn is to be taxed was in reply to a specific query on the issue.

"It is normal when basic ingredients are same but finished products attract different GST rates," he said, adding that GST has become a very efficient and effective ecosystem for enhanced and transparent tax compliance through a corruption-free and smooth process.

The GST system has run into similar controversies for its tax classifications in the past and faced questions although not on

Bangladesh requests India to send back Hasina for trial

angladesh has told neighbour India that it wants former prime minister Sheikh Hasina, who fled to New Delhi in August, back in the country for "judicial process", the acting head of the country's foreign ministry said vesterday.

Ties between the South Asian neighbours, who have strong trade and cultural links, have become

fraught since Hasina was ousted following violent protests against her rule and she took refuge across the border.

Dhaka's request to New Delhi yesterday came two weeks after India's foreign secretary visited Bangladesh and the two countries said they hoped to clear the clouds and pursue constructive relations.

"We sent a note verbale to the Indian government saying that the Bangladesh government wants her (Hasina) back here for judicial process," Touhid Hossain told reporters, referring to diplomatic correspondence between the two countries.

ceived a note verbale from the Bangladesh high commission in connection with an extradition request. At this time, we have no comment to offer on this matter," the official spokesperson of India's

The head of Bangladesh's interim government, Nobel laureate Muhammad Yunus, has demanded that India send Hasina back so that Bangladesh can try her for what it says are crimes against protesters and her opponents, and crimes she is accused of committing during her tenure over the past 15 years.

Yunus has also been upset with Hasina for criticising his adminis-

tration from New Delhi. Hasina faces numerous charges,

including crimes against humanity, genocide, and murder, among others. She denies the charges.

Indian foreign secretary Vikram Misri visited Dhaka this month and reiterated India's commitment to pursuing a constructive relationship with Dhaka.

New Delhi has said that Hasina came to India at a short notice for "safety reasons" and continues to remain here, without elaborating.

Bangladesh has also launched a probe into the alleged \$5bn embezzlement connected to a Rus-


sian-backed nuclear power plant by Hasina and her family, the anti-corruption commission said

Along with Hasina, those subject to the inquiry include her son, Sajeeb Wazed Joy, and niece, Tulip Siddiq, a British lawmaker and government minister.

The allegations were raised by a writ seeking an investigation filed in the High Court by Hasina's political opponent, Bobby Hajjaj, chairman of the Nationalist Democratic Movement party.

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Navigating the risks of Digital Public Infrastructure

In recent years, the concept of Digital Public Infrastructure (DPI) has gained significant attention from the international community, including the UN and the G20, as a new policy paradigm for development. But understanding the risks of DPI is crucial to ensuring that its potential benefits materialise.

The risks stem from the fact that "digital public infrastructure" lacks a clear definition. The term encompasses the many digital technologies that serve as economic and social infrastructure, from digital identification and payment systems to data exchanges and health services. As a policy initiative, though, DPI refers to a vague vision of using these technologies to serve the public interest. This could result in the Internet and technological innovation working for everyone - or just as easily turn them into tools for political control.

In discussions about DPI, policymakers often point to cases that highlight how technology and connectivity can spur development. They frequently cite India's Unified Payments Interface, which has expanded financial inclusion and reduced the costs of digital transactions for its hundreds of millions of

It is also understood that such infrastructure is to be built with Digital Public Goods (DPGs), a concept that encompasses opensource software, open standards, and other non-proprietary components. This definition is partly intended to position DPIs as being "for the public" but also to enhance competition and mitigate concentrations of power in the global digital economy.

Lastly, proponents point out that DPI could bolster international co-operation, particularly as the 20-year review of the World Summit on the Information Society (WSIS)

Policymakers often point to cases that highlight how technology and connectivity can spur development

approaches. This important UN initiative has provided the framework for countries to collaborate on digital development. Although authoritarian states have previously sought to assert greate control over the Internet's governance during these negotiations, a focus on promoting DPI could avoid this politicised debate and instead foster a constructive agenda to bridge digital divides. But basing policy

on such an ill-defined concept poses significant risks. Ideally, governments would convene other stakeholders to create an enabling environment for DPI and safeguard users' rights and interests. It is easy to imagine, however, that some governments will place their own interests above civil liberties and fundamental rights, using this infrastructure for surveillance and targeting in the name of law enforcement or national security. An especially pernicious example could involve the monitoring and regulation of individual behaviour through dystopian social-credit systems.

Moreover, while many proponents hope that DPI could chip away at Big Tech's outsize power, it has also been associated with narratives of digital sovereignty that could contribute to the Internet's fragmentation – a systemic threat to global communications. For example, one can imagine scenarios in which some governments challenge the multi-stakeholder model for governing global Internet resources like IP addresses and domain names on the grounds that they constitute DPIs.

The policy vision of DPI will continue to evolve, and ongoing discussions, it is hoped, will help identify and clarify further opportunities and risks. Initiatives such as the UN's Universal DPI Safeguards Framework, which seeks to establish guardrails for DPI, are a promising start. But much more must be done. For example, the UN's framework has recognised the need for continuous learning to ensure that the right safeguards are in

As the concept of DPI gains traction in the UN system and other multilateral organisations, vigorous and informed debate regarding its potential advantages - and pitfalls - will be essential. With clear-cut policy guidelines and protections, we can help prevent these technologies from becoming tools for surveillance and repression, ensure that everyone benefits from the burgeoning digital economy, and keep the Internet open, globally connected, and secure. - Project Syndicate

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Celebrating half a century of Malta-Qatar relations

he new year 2025 will mark a momentous occasion in the history of Maltese-Qatari relations, as the two countries anniversary of the establishment of bilateral ties. In addition to its role in the UNSC, Malta also played a key part, after having been chosen by consensus as Chair of the Organisation for Security and Cooperation in Europe (OSCE) for 2024, in ensuring that one of the last channels of communication in Europe remains open. Guided by the motto "Strengthening Resilience, Enhancing Security", Malta hosted on Dec 5-6, 2024, the 31st Ministerial Council of this organisation, where it managed to find consensus to fill the top four leadership positions of the secretariat and institutions of this organisation.

Describing this meeting as "a proud milestone", Malta's Deputy Prime Minister and Minister for Foreign Affairs the Hon. Dr Ian Borg, in his opening speech, referred to the historic 1989 Malta Summit between presidents Bush

and Gorbachev which ended the Cold War. He admitted that times have fundamentally changed and that the "principles, rules that have underpinned international peace and security for almost 80 years are being questioned, challenged and actively undermined". Nevertheless, Dr Borg reaffirmed that Malta remains a "staunch defender of peace and dialogue in the face of the seemingly insurmountable differences and challenges".

Malta's drive in the pursuit of peace will continue next year when it also assumes the Presidency of the European Committee of Ministers at the Council of Europe (CoE) from May to November 2025. During its presidency, Malta plans to focus on enhancing the council's capacity to respond to emerging challenges, including strengthening the protection of human rights in the face of global political and social changes.

In a similar vein, Qatar remains one of the most prominent players in regional and global diplomacy, particularly in the fields of mediation and conflict resolution. We commend Qatar's unwavering commitment to facilitating peace talks and negotiations, positioning itself as a neutral party with a strong commitment to achieving peaceful solutions to some of the world's most complex conflicts. Oatar's tireless work in the Middle East, Asia and Africa as well as between Ukraine and Russia has earned it recognition as a reliable and trustworthy mediator.

Qatar's support for dialogue

is also evident in its hosting of numerous international gatherings such as the Doha Forum, besides actual peace negotiations. It continues to invest heavily in diplomacy, driven by the belief that peace cannot be achieved through military means alone, but must come through dialogue, compromise, and mutual understanding, something which Malta also believes in.

Qatar's unstinting efforts for an immediate ceasefire in Gaza. as well as the release of hostages and the unrestricted access of humanitarian aid are indeed admirable and commendable. Dutch find wooden shoe that is five centuries old

The Dutch are known worldwide for their wooden shoes, but the recent rare discovery of a 500-year-old one in the city of Alkmaar has shown just how widespread their use once

"It was found in a cesspit in an urban surrounding. So this is very special, because with wooden shoes you always think of farmers using wooden shoes during their work," archaeologist Silke Lange told Reuters.

"But actually this was found in an urban context," she said. "They were using this kind of footwear for daily use."

The wooden shoe was found in a cesspit that was discovered just last month during the construction of an underground waste container in Alkmaar, around 30km (18.6 miles) northwest of Amster-

The cesspit was used as a toilet and for waste disposal from around 1450-1558, archaeologists The clog, a European size 36

(UK size 3.5), is estimated to have been made at the end of the 15th or early in the 16th century.

It is the first ever found in the Netherlands that was made of birch wood.

It is also just one of only 44 wooden shoes ever found during excavations in the Netherlands and Belgium.

Macron announces fourth government of the year

▼rench President Emmanuel Macron has named a new government, putting together a team under Francois Bayrou, his fourth prime minister of the year, to drag the second-largest EU economy out of political crisis.

Macron named former prime minister Elisabeth Borne education minister in a new cabinet under centrist Bayrou, the presidency said.

Another former premier, Manuel Valls, returned as overseas territories minister while former interior minister Gerald Dar-

manin became justice minister.

Both Defence Minister Sebastien Lecornu and Foreign Minister Jean-Noel Barrot kept their jobs, the presidency said.

Conservative Interior Minister Bruno Retailleau, who has vowed to crack down on illegal immigration, also stayed in his post.

The difficult job of delivering a budget plan for next year falls to Eric Lombard, the new economy minister.

Lombard, 66, the head of Caisse des Depots, the investment arm of the French government, will be working with Amélie de Montchalin as budget minister.

The inclusion of two former prime ministers indicates Macron's desire for a heavyweight government that will enjoy stability and not share the fate of Bayrou's predecessor Michel Barnier.

The priority for 73-year-old Bayrou is to make sure his government can survive a noconfidence vote and that it passes a costcutting budget for 2025.

The unexpected comeback of Valls, premier from 2014-16, as the head of the overseas territories ministry indicates the importance of the post after authorities were strongly criticised for their response to the deadly cyclone on the Indian Ocean territory of Mayotte, which killed at least 35

Darmanin had long been known to covet the post of foreign minister but after days of intense discussions will have to content himself with the justice ministry.

The last federal execution - carried out by lethal injection in Terre Haute, Indiana - occurred on January 16, 2021, four days before Trump left office.

Accused killer of US insurance **CEO** pleads not guilty

uigi Mangione, the man accused of fatally gunning down health insurance executive Brian Thompson on a Manhattan street, pleaded not guilty yesterday to New York state murder charges that brand him a

Mangione, 26, was escorted into Judge Gregory Carro's 13thfloor courtroom in the New York state criminal courthouse in lower Manhattan with a court officer on each arm, and a procession of a half dozen officers following him.

He was in handcuffs and shackles, and wore a burgundy sweater over a white-collared shirt.

Mangione leaned into a microphone and said "not guilty" when Carro asked how he pleaded to the 11-count indictment charging him with murder as an act of terrorism and weapons offences.

If convicted, he faces a maximum sentence of life in prison without the possibility of parole.

Thompson, the chief executive of UnitedHealth Group's insurance unit UnitedHealthcare, was shot dead on December 4 outside a hotel in midtown Manhattan where the company was gathering for an investor conference.

The brazen killing and ensuing five-day manhunt captivated Americans.

While public officials have condemned the killing, some Americans who decry the steep costs of healthcare and insurance companies' power to deny paying for some medical treatments have feted Mangione as a folk hero.

Mangione was arrested at a Mc-Donald's restaurant in Altoona Pennsylvania, on December 9.

After deciding last week not to fight extradition, he was transferred to New York, where he was led off a helicopter in lower Manhattan by a large phalanx of police officers and New York City Mayor Eric Adams.

That spectacle and other statements by public officials suggest Mangione may not be able to get a fair trial, his lawyer Karen Friedman Agnifilo said at yesterday's hearing.

Yesterday's arraignment was the second court appearance in New York for Mangione, who also faces a four-count federal criminal complaint charging him with stalking and killing Thompson.

He has not yet been asked to enter a plea in that case.

US Magistrate Judge Katharine Parker ordered Mangione detained at a December 19 hearing in Manhattan federal court.

The federal charges would make him eligible for the death penalty, should the US Attorney's Office in Manhattan decide to pursue it.

The separate federal and state cases will proceed in parallel. The state case is currently expected to go to trial first, federal prosecutors said. (Reuters)

'Thousands' of North Koreans dead or injured in Russia's Ukraine war

ore than 1,000 North Korean soldiers have been killed or wounded in Russia's war with Ukraine, South Korea said yesterday,

Pyongyang has sent thousands of troops to reinforce the Russian military, including to the Kursk border region, where Ukrainian forces seized territory earlier this year.

South Korea's Joint Chiefs of Staff (JCS) said in a statement that "we assess that North Korean troops who have recently engaged in combat with Ukrainian forces have suffered around 1,100 casualties", citing "various sources of information and intelli-

agency to MPs last week, which said at least 100 North Korean soldiers had been killed since entering combat in December. Ukrainian President Volodymyr Zelensky later
