One dead as Israel strikes Lebanon

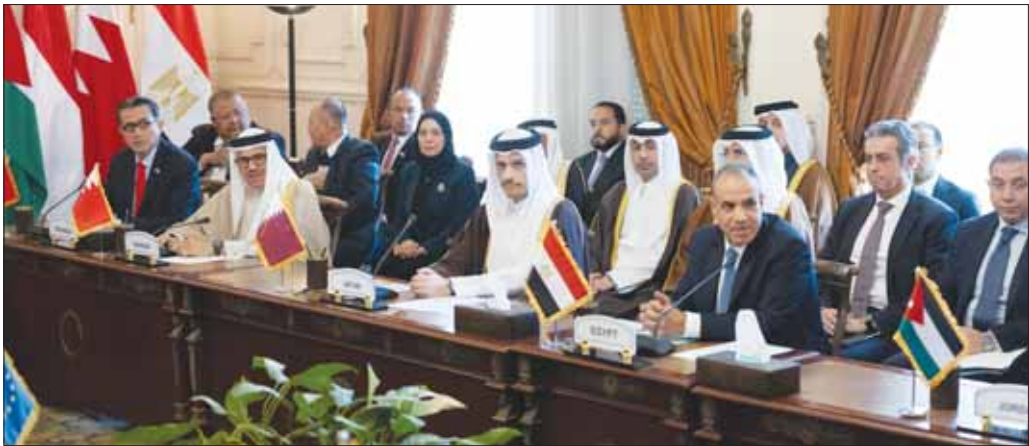

Arab-Islamic meet with EU stresses need for Gaza ceasefire, aid resumption

Israeli strike kills Hamas official; Gaza death toll passes 50,000

An Israeli air strike in southern Gaza killed a Hamas political leader, Salah al-Bardaweel, yesterday, the resistance group said, as Palestinian officials put the death toll from nearly 18 months of conflict at over 50,000. Hamas said the air strike on Khan Younis killed Bardaweel and his wife. At least 50,021 Palestinians have been killed and 113,274 wounded since the beginning of the war, the health ministry said. After two months of relative calm in the war, Gazans have again been fleeing for their lives after Israel effectively abandoned a ceasefire, launching a new all-out air and ground campaign on Tuesday against Hamas. Explosions echoed throughout the north, central and southern Gaza Strip early yesterday, as Israeli planes hit several targets in those areas.

At least 30 Palestinians had been killed in Israeli strikes on Rafah and Khan Younis so far yesterday, health authorities said. Bardaweel was a member of the Hamas decision-making body, the political office. "His blood, that of his wife and martyrs, will remain fuelling the battle of liberation and independence," the group said.

Ukraine, US teams hold talks in Saudi

Ukrainian and US delegations discussed yesterday proposals to protect energy facilities and critical infrastructure, Ukraine's defence minister said, part of a diplomatic push by US President Donald Trump to end three years of war.

The meeting in Saudi Arabia, which precedes talks on Monday between the US and Russian delegations, came as US special envoy Steve Witkoff expressed optimism about the chances for ending Europe's deadliest conflict since World War Two.

"I feel that (Russian President Vladimir Putin) wants peace," Witkoff told Fox News.

"I think that you're going to see in Saudi Arabia on Monday some real progress, particularly as it affects a Black Sea ceasefire on ships between both countries. And from that, you'll naturally gravitate into a full-on shooting ceasefire."

Ukraine's President Volodymyr Zelensky said his country's delegation to talks was working in "a completely constructive manner", adding: "The conversation is quite useful, the work of the delegations is continuing."

"But no matter what we say to our partners today, we need to get Putin to give a real order to stop the strikes," Zelensky said in a televised statement. Ukraine's delegation was headed by Defence Minister Rustem Umerov, who said the aim of such contacts was helping to "bring a just peace closer and to strengthen security", though Zelensky also said the talks were essentially "technical".


Putin agreed last week to Trump's proposal for Russia and Ukraine to stop attacks on each other's energy infrastructure for 30 days.





In addition, the project showcases integrated amenities for users, along with 15 parking lots for vehicles on the ground floor to ensure easy visitor access to shopping markets, featuring an architectural design that reflects conventional Qatari style, with pointed arches that embody local heritage, alongside serene colours and Islamic motifs that enhance its cultural character.

The design aims to strike a balance between authenticity and

modernity, contributing to the preservation of the region's architectural identity.

Throughout recent decades, the General Directorate of Endowments has carried out numerous outstanding projects, foremost of which was the Abilan Waqf project, which was converted from a collection of villas and traditional houses into nine modern residential buildings, alongside a health club in Fereej bin Mahmoud, as well as several investments in companies listed on the Qatar Stock Exchange.

The Al-Atrujah Endowment for the Qur'an is one of the largest Qur'anic endowments. It consists of two residential buildings that house 112 apartments and include sports facilities. 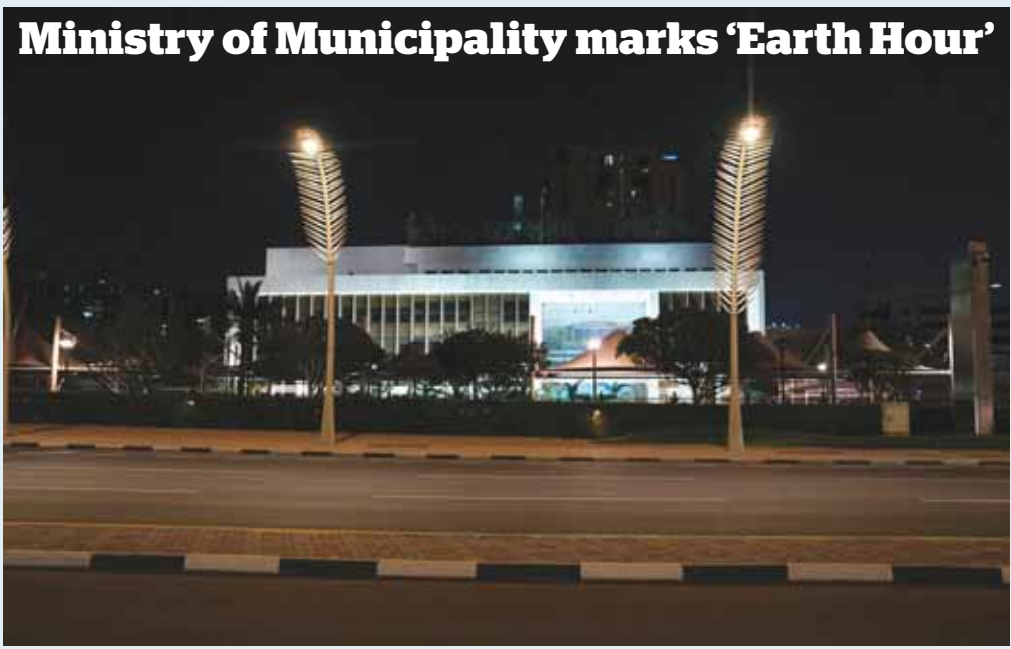
Rodriguez expressed his thanks and appreciation to Katara for hosting the distinguished artwork, which reflects mutual co-operation in the cultural and artistic fields.

HMC underlines quality of services on World TB Day

Hamad Medical Corporation (HMC) joins the global community in observing World Tuberculosis (TB) Day today (March 24), under the World Health Organisation’s theme, “Yes! We Can End TB: Commit, Invest, Deliver.”

The Communicable Disease Center(CDC) at HMC is the region’s first dedicated centre for the diagnosis, treatment, and prevention of infectious diseases and offers a range of world class services including a dedicated TB Outpatient clinic and contact screening for the condition.

Dr Muna al-Maslamani, chief executive officer and medical director CDC said HMC is at the forefront of preventing, diagnosing, and treating TB, ensuring access to high-quality care for all in Qatar.

“The CDC is staffed by highly specialised clinical team of nurses, physicians and allied health

professionals that provide consultations, treatment and support for patients who either have TB or may have been exposed to the disease,” Dr al-Maslamani said.

“Our TB services are provided free of charge to all. As treatment compliance is of paramount importance to combat TB, we have dedicated personnel to support our patients in adhering to their treatment regimen.”

In 2024, there were more than 850 admissions to the CDC’s TB wards and more than 19,500 patients referred to specialised TB clinics for treatment and follow-

up appointments. Tuberculosis, commonly referred to as TB, is a contagious infectious disease that usually attacks the lungs. It can also spread to other parts of the body, including the brain and spine. A type of bacteria called mycobacterium tuberculosis causes the disease.

The disease is classified as latent TB or active TB, with signs and symptoms of active TB including a cough that lasts three or more weeks, coughing up blood, chest pain, unintentional weight loss, fatigue and night sweats.

In addition to HMC’s advanced diagnostic and treatment services, the CDC also undertakes extensive community engagement and awareness surrounding TB.

Dr al-Maslamani said globally TB remains one of the deadliest infectious killers, with 1.25mn people dying from tuberculosis in 2023.

Qatar Charity’s projects benefit kids in Somalia

Qatar’s generous donations funded two humanitarian projects in Somalia, easing the suffering of children with heart conditions and supporting persons with special needs, Qatar Charity (QC) said yesterday.

The projects were launched by a QC delegation, led by Abdulaziz Jassim Hejji, director of the Development Operations Department, with Somali ministers and officials in attendance.

Through its ‘Compassionate Hearts’ initiative, QC facilitated critical surgeries for 30 children with heart defects at the Somali Sudanese Hospital in Mogadishu, thanks to the dedication of local and international volunteer doctors.

The Somali Minister of Health, Dr Ali Haji, lauded the initiative as a model of humanitarian solidarity. “Such precise surgeries were once considered impossible within Somalia, forcing patients to travel abroad or live with pain due to a lack of resources. We are grateful to Qatar Charity and all those who contributed to this project,



which saved children’s lives and restored hope to their families.”

Dr Mohamed Ahmed Nairobi, spokesperson for the surgical team, said: “The surgeries performed were not just medical interventions, but a message of new life for the children and their families. Every child’s smile we saw after the surgery was a new motivation for us to do more.”

The surgeries had a profound impact, greatly improving the health of the children, and their families expressed deep gratitude for the positive outcomes.

Samira’s mother described the moment: “It was a true miracle. I never imagined my daughter would return to her normal life so quickly.”

QC also launched the first phase of a project to distribute 700 wheelchairs in Somalia, providing 70 electric and manual wheelchairs to support individuals with special needs.

Present were Mohamed Osman, State Minister for Family Affairs and Human Rights; Hejji, and Mohamed Abdali Jama, chairman of Somalia’s National Disability Agency.

HMC Ambulance Service to cover key areas in Eid holidays

Hamad Medical Corporation's (HMC) Ambulance Service plan for covering Eid al-Fitr events is based on an assessment of the situation during Ramadan as the demand for the service has remained stable since the beginning of the holy month, a senior official said. Ali Darwish, assistant Executive Director of Ambulance Service, told local Arabic daily *Arrayah* that the Eid al-Fitr ambulance plan will focus on covering the camping areas and the beaches across the country, in addition to fulfilling requests for patient transfers between hospitals during the Eid holiday. The plan also prioritises covering vital areas and public gatherings, such as the Corniche, Aspire Park, Katara, Souq Waqif, and Old Al Wakra Market, various beaches, and specific events and celebrations based on requests received. Ambulance coverage will also be provided at the Eid prayer grounds at Imam Muhammad ibn Abd al-Wahhab Mosque, the Abu Samra border crossing and Hamad International Airport, as Qatar attracts a large number of tourists and visitors from the region during Eid al-Fitr holidays. The official explained that the Ambulance Service currently receives around 750 calls per day and operates from 65 station points, with a total of 177 ambulances of various types, including

those designated for ambulance supervisors, critical cases, and patient transfers. The response time remains at the standard level of 10 minutes within Doha and 15 minutes outside the city and the outskirts of the country. The station points are strategically distributed across the country based on accident reports and analytics that identify high-incident areas, ensuring ambulances are positioned near these locations. These points are dynamically adjusted throughout the year based on the changing call patterns across Qatar. Four-wheel-drive ambulances are used to respond to medical cases in the desert dune areas and rough terrains, while air ambulances are deployed for critical cases in remote locations, particularly in the Sealine and Khor Al Adaid. During Ramadan, the air ambulance transported an average of two cases per day. The Ambulance Service is divided into two sections: the first

handles daily emergency calls received through 999, while the second is dedicated to scheduled patient transfers, such as for cancer patients and those undergoing dialysis, with requests received via 16060. Darwish stressed the importance of this service in ensuring the safe transfer of patients between healthcare facilities, noting that around 500 patients are transported daily, reflecting the significant efforts of the ambulance service in supporting them. The official urged the public to use ambulance services strictly for emergencies, highlighting that about 20% of current calls involve minor cases that could be treated at the primary healthcare centres. This would help ensure that ambulance resources remain available for more serious cases and prevent unnecessary strain on the system. He also mentioned that the ambulances are equipped with advanced technologies, including automated traffic light systems, which open signals automatically when the emergency siren is activated. In addition, the ambulances are equipped with mapping systems to determine call locations and are linked to the hospitals to facilitate communication and preparation for incoming patients. Darwish called on all motorists to co-operate with the Ambulance Service by clearing the way for emergency vehicles, as this significantly helps in reaching incident sites quickly. He stressed that traffic authorities handle cases of drivers crossing red lights to allow ambulances to pass with flexibility, ensuring that such violations are dismissed. In cases where a traffic fine is issued for yielding to an ambulance, the Ambulance Service can be contacted to verify the incident and facilitate the removal of the violation after confirming the circumstances.



HBKU-CIS explores food security practices in Singapore

A delegation including representatives from Hamad Bin Khalifa University's (HBKU) College of Islamic Studies (CIS) and College of Public Policy (CPP), Earthna, the Ministry of Municipality, and Georgetown University in Qatar visited Singapore to exchange insights into sustainable food security strategies with academic, government, and industry experts. The visit was part of the knowledge dissemination activities within a grant by Qatar Research Development and Innovation Council (QRDI) led by Dr Dalal Aassouli, assistant professor of Islamic and Sustainable Finance, CIS. Ambassador of Qatar to Singapore Saoud bin Jassim al-Jufairi welcomed the delegation, hosting them to discuss the importance of knowledge transfer between the two countries. The delegation then undertook a two-day food security and crisis management workshop at Nanyang Technological University (NTU) Singapore, where participants discussed food security strategies and crisis management approaches in Qatar and Singapore.

Representatives from Qatar presented case studies from the country, giving an overview of its food security policies, supply chains, and sustainable water resource management efforts. Their NTU counterparts highlighted several of Singapore's food sustainability initiatives, including its support for hydroponic farming – a method of growing plants without soil using a nutrient-rich water solution – and its food waste policies. The workshop then pivoted to a focus on sustainable agriculture finance, featuring a one day masterclass delivered by Dr Aassouli that tackled various instruments available in the field and global taxonomies and standards in the sector. The masterclass also engaged leading international organisations including the Green Climate Fund, Grow Asia, and Dalberg advisers. Dr Aassouli said: "This trip complemented the diverse knowledge exchange and initiatives that HBKU has been leading in the field of food security and sustainable finance to support national priorities. It is another example of how HBKU and Qatar

Foundation foster dialogue that facilitates expertise and builds capacity in Qatar and beyond." Ambassador al-Jufairi noted: "Qatar and Singapore share a commitment to strengthening food security through collaboration, innovation, and strategic partnerships. With Qatar's National Food Security Strategy 2030 focusing on increasing local production and reducing import reliance, working with like-minded nations like Singapore allows both countries to exchange expertise, drive sustainability, and achieve greater resilience in global food systems." Dr Abdul Jalil Abdul Kader, assistant chief executive officer (Operations), Singapore Food Agency, added: "In an increasingly unpredictable world, no nation can tackle food security challenges in isolation. The collaboration between Singapore and Qatar is not just beneficial – it is essential. By sharing experiences, strategies, and innovations, we can build more resilient and adaptable food systems that serve our nations and contribute to global food security solutions."

Moscow, Turkiye, and the Maldives, as well as GCC countries, are topping the list of preferred Eid al-Fitr destinations for Qataris and expatriates, driven by factors like favourable weather, visa-free entry options, and family-friendly luxury, an industry expert said. "Shorter flight duration and mostly direct, since these are short holidays for Qataris as well as expatriates making it a dynamic and diverse travel period," Tawfeeq Travel Group chief executive Rehan Ali Syed (pictured) told Gulf Times, noting that "good weather is one of the key factors to decide on the selection of a destination". He stressed that factors influencing travel decisions this Eid holidays include cultural preferences and family ties, where travellers from Qatar often choose

erbaijan, Kazakhstan, Egypt, and Jordan are increasingly popular, alongside religious trips," Syed said, noting a growing interest in health and wellness tourism, particularly among Qataris. According to the expert, recent global events have also significantly impacted travel preferences. Economic factors are playing a crucial role, with travellers actively seeking destinations where good exchange rates allow for better value for money. He said safety and security are also crucial, particularly in regions facing security challenges related to geopolitical tensions. Gen Z are those born between 1995 and 2012.

Paramilitary shelling kills 3 in Omdurman

Three civilians, including two children, were killed yesterday in an artillery attack by the paramilitary Rapid Support Forces (RSF) on Omdurman, part of Greater Khartoum, a medical source told AFP.

Eyewitnesses in the area said the strikes were some of the heaviest in recent months, coming two days after the army recaptured the capital's presidential palace in a major symbolic victory.

Since April 2023, the RSF has been fighting Sudan's regular army in a war that has killed tens of thousands, uprooted more than 12mn and created the world's largest hunger and displacement crises.

Analysts have warned that the army's gains, while significant, are unlikely to end a war marked by mass atrocities against civilians, including bombs and artillery routinely hitting homes and markets.

"Before, there used to be four or five rounds of shelling, and there was time between one strike and the next," one resident told AFP, requesting anonymity for fear of retaliation. "This morning there were seven, one right after the other."

The medical source, who is at Al Nao hospital, one of the city's last functioning health facilities, said that "two children and a woman were killed and eight others injured in the shelling".

In recent days, the army and allied armed groups have regained most of Khartoum proper's government district, just across the Nile from Omdurman.

RSF fighters remain stationed in parts of the city centre including the airport, as well as the capital's south and west.

From their positions in western Omdurman, they have regularly launched strikes on civilian areas.

In February, more than 50 were killed in a single RSF artillery attack on a busy Omdurman market.

After a year and a half of humiliating army defeats, the tide seemed to turn late last year, when a military counteroffensive through central Sudan dislodged the RSF from key bases.

Since January this year, the army has retaken much of the capital Khartoum, pushing the paramilitary into holdout pockets and the outskirts of the city.

On Friday, the army and allied armed groups seized the country's presidential palace, which the RSF had used since the start of the war to house elite forces and stockpile ammunition.

The paramilitary force responded with what it called a "lightning operation" including a drone strike that killed three journalists and a number of army personnel.

The military has since launched a clearing operation to push the RSF out of the city centre, retaking several strategic state institutions on Saturday, including the central bank, state intelligence headquarters and the national museum.

An RSF source told AFP on Saturday that the paramilitary had "withdrawn from some locations" but that forces were waging "a fierce battle" near the airport.

The army has also seized key infrastructure, pushing on Saturday through Tuti Bridge to reclaim Tuti Island, which sits at the confluence of the Blue and White Niles in the centre of Greater Khartoum and has been under paramilitary control for nearly two years.

Despite the army's advances in the capital, Africa's third largest country remains effectively split in two, with the army holding the east and north while the RSF controls nearly all of the western region of Darfur and parts of the south.

Yesterday the paramilitary claimed control of Lagawa, a town in Sudan's southern West Kordofan state, some 600km (370 miles) southwest of the capital.

Eyewitnesses in the town told AFP that RSF fighters had set up checkpoints on the streets.

Control over Sudan's southern Kordofan region is split between the army, the RSF and an armed group known as the Sudan People's Liberation Movement-North, which last month signed a charter with the RSF.

More than 500km (320 miles) northwest, the paramilitary has also claimed control of the North Darfur town of Al Malha, killing at least 45 civilians, according to local activists.

Al Malha is one of the northernmost towns in the vast desert region between Sudan and Libya, where the RSF's critical resupply lines have come under increasing attack in recent months by army-allied armed groups.

Iconic Islamic figures continue to inspire, say experts

Writers and academics have affirmed that the biographies of prominent and brilliant figures in Arab and Islamic history can serve as a vital source for literary and dramatic creativity, as well as a spiritual model.

They emphasised that these biographies and characters are treasures of the nation, continually renewed through reflection and inspiration.

Speaking to the Qatar News Agency (QNA), the writers and academics underscored the importance of the experiences, symbols, and meanings that shaped the legacy of these individuals and their role in strengthening the sense of belonging to the nation.

Community College of Qatar (CCQ) professor of acting and directing Dr Saad Burshaid also highlighted the support of Qatar's institutions concerned with cultural and religious matters.

He cited Qatar Television's long-standing celebration of Arab and Islamic culture through various dramatic works, in addition to shedding light on prominent figures in Islamic history, showcasing their impact on promoting Islamic values and spreading awareness about them.

Dr Burshaid said that most of these works draw inspiration from the lives of the Prophet Muhammad (PBUH)'s companions, the Rightly Guided Caliphs, major Islamic battles, and conquests, as well as significant periods of state-building in Islamic history.

This, he said, also includes the lives of renowned imams.

The academic noted the creative vision and the distinctive spiritual, cultural, and religious content of the productions presented on television, which have the capacity to address audiences of all generations effectively.

Consequently, these works have garnered local and regional awards at prestigious international festivals and competitions, including the Arab Festival for Radio and Television, organised by the Arab States Broadcasting Union, and the Gulf Festival for Radio and Television.

Among these works are the series *Al Imam*, which dramatises significant events in Islamic history through the life of Imam Ahmad Ibn Hanbal, and the series *Al Qaqaa Ibn Amr Al Tamimi*.

Dr Burshaid further said that one of the most prominent examples of drawing in-

spiration from Islamic genius and historical icons in dramatic works is the series *Omar*, which aired in 2012.

This series was a joint production between the Qatar Media Corporation (QMC) and the Middle East Broadcasting Centre (MBC), written by Walid Saif and directed by Hatem Ali.

Omar portrays the life of the second Caliph of Islam, Umar Ibn al-Khattab, exploring his personality, qualities, and the events and battles during his life.

Dr Burshaid said that the events and historical details in the series were reviewed by a Sharia committee comprising scholars of Islamic jurisprudence, biography, and history, led by the late Sheikh Yusuf al-Qaradawi.

He added that the series has been translated into over 30 languages, marking a significant achievement for Qatar Television.

Omar was watched by millions worldwide, serving as both an exceptional creative and educational endeavour for Muslims around the world.

It has since become an academic material studied by high school and university students.

Dr Burshaid called for enriching Qatari and Arab dramatic experiences further by drawing inspiration from the nations historical icons and influential figures, and stressed the importance of strengthening Arab-Islamic culture through inspiring models in literature, arts, and drama.

On a similar note, Iraqi writer, academic and professor of creed and Dawah at Qatar University (QU)'s College of Sharia and Islamic Studies, Dr Mohammed Ayash al-Kubaisi, emphasised in his statement to the QNA the necessity of invoking historical figures and recalling them in education, literature, media, and arts to enhance the sense of belonging to the Arab and Islamic nation.

He noted that this invocation and remembrance relate to major issues within the current reality and future of the nation and align with its aspirations for progress and revival.

Dr al-Kubaisi said that these historical figures are part of the nation's identity, rep-

resenting its ambitions and status.

The academic said that when we recall the lives of the Prophet's companions, we are not merely revisiting history but a history deeply tied to the formation, expansion, and accomplishments of this nation in science, civilisation, giving, strength, and dignity.

He stated that when we recount the lives of leaders such as Khalid Ibn al-Walid, Saad Ibn Abi Waqqas, Abu Ubaidah Ibn al-Jarrah, or later figures like Tariq ibn Ziyad and Salahuddin al-Ayyubi, we revive the sense of belonging to this nation.

He added that when we recall the biographies of imams and scholars such as Abu Hanifa, Ahmad Ibn Hanbal, Imam al-Bukhari, or Ibn Khaldun, we present examples of individuals who encapsulate values like honesty, generosity, knowledge, and dedication in their symbolic dimensions.

Dr al-Kubaisi stressed that when we study the life of a scholar and their contributions, we provide a model rich with values that emphasise the importance of knowledge and its place.

He also noted that pre-Islamic Arabs invoked the legacy of prominent figures as an educational tool, mentioning personalities like Hatim al-Tai for generosity, Antarah Ibn Shaddad for courage, and Imru al-Qais for poetry and eloquence.

Dr al-Kubaisi described the invocation and inspiration of these great figures and symbols, which encapsulate the sense of belonging to the nation and embody the noble values that we aim to instil in the minds, souls, and hearts of our children and future generations, as a responsibility that must be upheld in education, knowledge, upbringing, family life, schools, and society.

He added that these figures should also be invoked through media and artistic works, including drama, theatre, songs, and poetry.

Egyptian writer and academic Dr Walid El Sayed Mohamed Marei, a member of the faculty at Al Azhar University and Al Azhar Global Fatwa Centre, said that Islamic history provides one of the richest sources for dramatic storytelling.

He noted that these historical events offer ample opportunities for projecting certain reflections on the figures and symbols that had a profound impact on human, political, and social life in these advanced eras.

Dr Marei underscored the importance of portraying iconic and brilliant figures in Islamic history through drama as a means to introduce contemporary generations, particularly the youth, to role models worth emulating.

The expert highlighted that historical dramas serve as a bridge between the past and the present, delivering these narratives to a far wider audience than specialised historians.

The academic explained that one of the main benefits of dramatising the lives of inspiring figures in Islamic history is educating audiences about the achievements of these exceptional individuals and correcting misconceptions or stereotypes about certain historical figures.

He cited Harun al-Rashid, whose image has been significantly improved through dramatic portrayals.

Additionally, he noted, such works stimulate curiosity among ordinary viewers and provoke critical thinking or questions regarding the historical figure being dramatised.

Dr Marei referenced two prominent figures in Islamic history who greatly influenced the Muslim world: Jabir Ibn Hayyan (d. 815 CE), the pioneer of chemistry who gained widespread recognition in Europe through the translation of his works during the onset of its scientific awakening; and Al Muzaffar Sayf Ad Din Qutuz (d. 1260 CE), who stopped the Mongol advance at the Battle of Ain Jalut, saving the Islamic state from imminent destruction.

Regarding the ideal approach to inspiration and dramatic treatment, he stated that drama creators should avoid presenting the biographies of historical figures in a conventional or purely informational manner, as accessing this material through verified historical texts is straightforward.

He added that instead of that, they must offer a vision tied to the concerns and challenges of the modern nation, exploring potential solutions within the lives of these early geniuses, explaining that drama is no longer merely a source of entertainment; it has become a profound intellectual medium and a tool for disseminating culture within society. - QNA

The signs of acceptance and rejection of deeds

There are several signs that signify whether our deeds have been accepted or rejected by our Lord.

The foremost sign of acceptance is to be helped to do good deeds one after the other, whereas the sign of rejection is to do misdeeds after the good deeds.

If one returns to his previous state of doing sins, misdeeds, indulgence and negligence, this indicates the rejection of his deeds; and if he, on the other hand, comes to do righteous deeds one after the other, this indicates the acceptance of his deeds.

This is because the reward of the righteous deed and the sign of its acceptance is that one is helped to do another righteous deed after it.

True repentance of one's signs is a matter between a person and his Lord and is achieved by the determination to give up sins.

It is impossible for one to expect such a precious prize as forgiveness from his Lord while he persists in sins, misdeeds, indulgence and negligence.

Who could dare say so?

Similarly, he should give up sins and misdeeds in his dealings with people.

That is, to make tolerance, excuse and reconciliation between the believers their slogan, perchance Allah The Almighty would excuse them, and accept their repentance, which makes them acceptable to Allah The Almighty.

On the middle night of Sha'baan, Allah The Almighty does not forgive the sins of two people who have disputes between them.

Thus, it is more likely that this is a condition for the forgiveness and the acceptance of the deeds of the one who fasts Ramadan, stands (in prayer at night of) Ramadan, and stands (in prayer) the Night of Al Qadr, otherwise when his deeds will be brought to be raised to Allah, He will Say: "Postpone those until they settle their disputes." [Muslim]

They will not be forgiven until they settle their disputes, reconcile and return to mutual tolerance whereby their deeds will be concluded on this day.

It is a very short time from the beginning of Ramadan until it ends.

It is very short-lived, just like the entire world, as mentioned by Allah The Almighty who will ask people in the Hereafter Saying (what means): {[Allah] will say, "How long did you remain on earth in number of years?" They will say, "We remained a day or part of a day; ask those who enumerate."} [Qur'an 23:112-113]

{They will murmur among themselves, "You remained not but ten [days in the world]. We are most knowing of what they say when the best of them in manner will say, "You remained not but one day."} [Qur'an 20:103-104]

When the Day of Judgement comes, he feels as if he has spent almost no time in this world, just like the month of Ramadan, if not the entire world, the time between whose beginning and end is very short.

If they come to Allah The Almighty, they will be in the same state, as if they have spent almost no more than a night or its forenoon, as confirmed by Allah The Almighty in His saying (what means): {He will say, "You stayed not but a little - if only you had known."} [Qur'an 23:114]

This day is only one, and tomorrow one may be with Allah The Almighty as He Says (what means): {O you who have believed, fear Allah. And let every soul look to what it has put forth for tomorrow - and fear Allah. Indeed, Allah is acquainted with what you do.} [Qur'an 59:18]

The lesson to learn here is to know that one's life passes too quickly for him to feel it.

Thus, the believers, in the days of Ramadan must contemplate how quickly the life of this world passes, and the Hereafter comes, and become from those who are devoted to the Hereafter, and prepare enough for it throughout the year.

No doubt, the Lord of Ramadan is the same Lord of Shawwaal and Sha'baan and all the months of the year, and those months pass very quickly as Ramadan does.

Also discussed were the consequences of the Israeli occupation's cut-off of electricity to the Gaza Strip, in addition to the dire escalation in the occupied West Bank, and the joint international efforts to implement the two-state solution, paving the way for the establishment of an independent Palestinian state on the 1967 borders, with East

Jerusalem as its capital, in light of the Arab Peace Initiative and relevant international initiatives.

HE the Prime Minister and Minister of Foreign Affairs underscored Qatar's enduring efforts within the framework of its mediation to end the war on the Gaza Strip, expressing its condemnation of the brutal bombardment of civilians and civilian objects by the Israeli occupation forces in the Strip.

Palestinians slam Israeli recognition of 13 new settlements

The Palestinian foreign ministry has condemned an Israeli decision to recognise more than a dozen new settlements in the occupied West Bank, upgrading existing neighbourhoods to independent settlement status.

The decision by Israel's security cabinet was a show of "disregard for international legitimacy and its resolutions", said a statement from the Palestinian Authority's foreign ministry.

The West Bank, occupied by Israel since 1967, is home to about 3mn Palestinians as well as nearly 500,000 Israelis living in settlements that are illegal under international law.

Israel's Finance Minister Bezalel Smotrich, a far-right leader and settler who was behind the cabinet's decision, hailed it as an "important step" for Israeli settlements in the West Bank.

Smotrich is a leading voice calling for Israel to formally annex the West Bank, as it did with east Jerusalem in a move not recognised by most of the international community.

"The recognition of each (neighbourhood) as a separate community ... is an important step that would help their development," Smotrich said in a statement on Telegram, calling it part of a "revolution".

"Instead of hiding and apolo-gising, we raise the flag, we build and we settle," he said.

"This is another important step towards de facto sovereignty in Judea and Samaria," added Smotrich, using the Biblical name for the West Bank.

Hamas "strongly condemned" Smotrich's remarks, describing them as proof that settlements were a "racist replacement project".

In its statement, the Palestinian foreign ministry also mentioned an ongoing major Israeli military operation in the northern West Bank, saying that it was accompanied by "an unprecedented escalation in the confiscation of Palestinian lands".

The 13 settlement neighbourhoods approved for development by the Israeli cabinet are located across the West Bank.

Some are effectively part of bigger settlements, while others are practically separate.

Peace Now, an Israeli non-governmental organisation (NGO) that opposes the settlements in the West Bank, condemned the decision to recognise 13 new ones as "another nail in the coffin" for hopes of a two-state solution that would see a Palestinian state alongside Israel.

The move "exposes Israel's long-standing lie that it does not establish new settlements, but only 'neighbourhoods' of existing settlements", it said in a statement. - AFP

UN mission expresses concern over wave of 'arbitrary' arrests in Libya

The United Nations Support Mission in Libya has expressed concern over what it said were arbitrary arrests, including of lawyers and members of the judiciary, calling for their immediate release.

"UNSMIL is alarmed by the wave of arbitrary arrest and detentions across Libya by law enforcement and security

actors," it said. "These actors are using their powers of arrest and detention to target individuals ... to silence perceived dissent and to undermine judicial independence."

It said the practice was used to "intimidate and humiliate" the individuals, and must be deemed inadmissible.

Among those arrested was Judge Ali al-Sharif, who was

subjected to violence during his arrest in Tripoli on March 10, as well as lawyer Mounir al-Orfi, detained in Benghazi since March 12, said the UN.

Two military prosecutors, Mansour Daoub and Mohammed al-Mabrouk al-Kar, have also been held in Tripoli since 2022, the UNSMIL said. - AFP

UK finance minister to stick to fiscal rules despite global turmoil

Britain's government will stick to its fiscal rules despite global upheaval, Finance Minister Rachel Reeves said yesterday, raising the prospect of belt-tightening measures to meet

her targets for the public finances in a budget update this week. In her first full budget last October, Reeves sought to win the trust of investors by pledging to bring day-to-day spending into balance with tax revenue by the end of the decade. But she is believed to have been knocked off course by slow eco-

nomie growth and higher borrowing costs. A potential global trade war triggered by US President Donald Trump's import tariffs has led to downgrades to the international outlook. "The world has changed. We can all see that before our eyes and governments are not inactive in that," Reeves told Sky News. "We'll

respond to the change and continue to meet our fiscal rules." On Friday, British debt costs jumped after higher-than-expected borrowing figures, showing nervousness among investors about the ability of Prime Minister Keir Starmer's government to fix the public finances with the economy stuck in a slow gear.

Last week, the government announced cuts to welfare spending to save around £5bn (\$6.5bn) a year, angering some lawmakers in Starmer's centre-left Labour Party. Reeves is expected to announce further measures in her Spring Statement on Wednesday to restore her £10bn of room for ma-

noeuvre to meet her fiscal targets. Asked by Sky News about possible spending cuts, Reeves said public spending was still expected to outpace inflation in each year of the current parliament. "But as a government, we have to decide where that money is spent, and we want to spend it on our priorities," she said.

India ad industry raids 'followed tip-offs under leniency scheme'

India's antitrust raids last week on media buying agencies followed tip-offs under a leniency scheme that reduces penalties for companies providing evidence, three people familiar with the matter said. Japan's Dentsu was at least one firm that has applied for the scheme, one of the people said. Dentsu declined to comment. On Tuesday and Wednesday, the Competition Commission of India raided the local offices of WPP-owned GroupM, Interpublic, Publicis and Dentsu, as well as high-profile Indian broadcasters' body IBDF, over suspected collusion on ad prices and discounts. The three sources said the CCI investigation was linked to the watchdog's leniency programme, which allows a 100% penalty waiver for the first company coming forward with evidence of wrongdoing, and lower waivers for subsequent ones, once the case concludes. One of the sources with direct knowledge of the matter said Dentsu made a leniency submission around February last year and disclosed evidence related to pricing arrangements between industry body the Advertising Agencies Association of India and the IBDF, which dictated terms on discounting to win ad clients. "If media agencies wanted to do

business, they had to follow these guidelines," the person added, referring to what they viewed as a potential anti-competitive arrangement. The CCI did not respond to queries. The AAAI and IBDF, both of which were raided in the enforcement action last week, also did not respond. Ad giant GroupM, US-based Interpublic's IPG Mediabrands unit and France's Publicis Groupe did not reply to requests for comment. It's not clear if any other company has made similar leniency submissions. The IBDF represents top domestic broadcasters, including billionaire Mukesh Ambani's Reliance-Disney joint venture, Sony and Zee Entertainment. The CCI does not make public details of any price-fixing investigations, and conducts such raids to seize potential evidence. In the latest case, raids ran through Tuesday night for over 24 hours. India is the world's eighth-biggest ad market where revenues of \$18.5bn last year are set to grow 9.4% in 2025, GroupM estimates. The investigation, which will drag on for months, comes amid major shifts in India's ad landscape following a \$8.5bn merger between Walt Disney and Reliance's Indian media assets, with the combined business estimated to have a 40% share of the ad market in TV and streaming segments.

Quashing Volkswagen's \$1.4bn tax bill would be 'catastrophic': India

India's government has told a court in Mumbai that agreeing to Volkswagen's demand to quash a \$1.4bn tax bill would have "catastrophic consequences" and encourage companies to withhold information and delay inquiries, court documents show. India's highest-ever demand for back taxes related to import duties came after scrutiny of 12 years of Volkswagen shipments and has re-kindled foreign investors' fears over lengthy investigations. The automaker has described the case as a "matter of life and death" for its India business, and is fighting the tax authority in the high court in Mumbai. Volkswagen unit, Skoda Auto Volkswagen

India, faces allegations that it misclassified component imports of some Audi, VW and Skoda cars to evade higher tariffs. Its key argument to quash the tax demand is the "inaction and tardiness" of tax officials in delaying shipment reviews. The Indian tax authority told the high court in a 78-page rebuttal that Volkswagen caused the delays by withholding crucial information and data about its imports. Accepting the carmaker's reasoning would allow importers to suppress vital information and then claim that the time-limit for the tax authority to conduct a probe had passed, the authority said in its March 10 filing, which was not public and is being reported for the first time. This would have "catastrophic consequences," they said in the filing. The case will be heard today. Volkswagen and

the Indian government did not respond to requests for comment. Volkswagen is a tiny player in India's car market, which is third-biggest in the world, and its Audi brand lags luxury peers such as Mercedes and BMW. If found guilty it could face a tax bill of \$2.8bn, including penalty and delayed interest. Prime Minister Narendra Modi has been courting foreign investors with promises of simpler regulations and lower bureaucratic hurdles, but lengthy tax investigations that can trigger lawsuits stretching over years remain a sore point. Had New Delhi wrapped up its reviews earlier, Volkswagen has said, it could have challenged the findings or re-evaluated its import strategy. The tax notice sent in September 2024 puts "at peril the very foundation of faith and trust" foreign investors desire, it said.

India govt urged to cut tariffs to boost local manufacturing

An Indian parliamentary committee recommended the government cut tariffs on imports of raw materials in a bid to support local manufacturers, who are expected to come under more pressure in looming trade talks with US. The committee, set up to examine trade and commerce legislation, said tariffs on incoming raw materials should come down to the lower level currently imposed on imported finished goods, to help local makers compete. India is preparing to kick off negotiations on a trade pact with the administration of US President Donald Trump, who has been pushing for significantly lower duties on US goods coming into India. India is also planning to seal trade pacts with the European Union and New Zealand this year, and has expedited talks with Britain over a trade deal. The report did not mention the upcoming US trade talks but said it wanted to ensure "a level playing field for domestic manufacturers".

Amazon, Flipkart flout quality control rules

Retail giants Amazon and Walmart-owned Flipkart violated Indian quality control rules by stocking products that did not have the required standards certificate, India's top government-run product certification agency said. Raids on warehouses operated by both firms by the Bureau of Indian Standards in the Tiruvallur district of the southern Indian state of Tamil Nadu, found that the firms had violated rules by storing, selling and exhibiting products that did not carry the BIS standard mark, a government statement said. A spokesperson for Amazon India said the company was engaged closely with various stakeholders including regulators,

while a Flipkart spokesperson said it worked with sellers to drive awareness and to comply with all applicable laws. "The platform has several processes to review the listings sellers make on the marketplace, and also conducts regular audits to ensure compliance," a spokesperson for Flipkart said in response. The raids are the latest headache for the two firms, leading players in India's e-commerce market which consultancy firm Bain estimated was worth \$57bn-\$60bn in 2023 and set to top \$160bn in value by 2028. At the Amazon warehouse, 3,376 products without the standard mark, including flasks, insulated food containers, toys and ceiling fans were seized, according to the statement, while officials seized diapers, casseroles and stainless steel water bottles from the Flipkart warehouse.

Eli Lilly launches weight-loss drug Mounjaro in India

Eli Lilly has launched its blockbuster diabetes and weight-loss drug Mounjaro in India, beating rival Novo Nordisk for a much-awaited entry into the world's most populous country grappling with increasing rates of obesity and diabetes. US-based Lilly and Danish Novo Nordisk have seen skyrocketing global demand for their innovative weight-loss drugs, with investor interest also boosting the drug-makers' valuations. Mounjaro, a once-weekly injection approved by India's drug regulator, is priced at Rs4,375 (\$50.67) for a 5mg vial and Rs3,500 (\$40.54) for a 2.5mg vial, its lowest doses, the company said. Its highest dose is 15mg. A patient in India may have to spend about \$200 a month when taking a weekly dose of 5mg, subject to doctor's prescription. Mounjaro carries a list price of \$1,086.37 for each monthly fill in the US, but the amount patients pay largely depends on their insurance plan. Lilly also offers 5mg, 7.5mg and 10mg vials of Zepbound, with prices around \$499 for a month's supply if customers pay directly in cash without any third-party entities.

Chemically known as tirzepatide, Mounjaro is currently sold in the UK and Europe under the same brand name for both diabetes and weight loss. It is sold as Zepbound for obesity in the US. Lilly, however, said that the pricing in different geographies cannot be compared given significant variation in healthcare systems, economies and reimbursement policies in each country. "(Mounjaro) launch is ahead of Novo Nordisk and the first mover advantage should help ... but pricing seems high (for the Indian market). At the highest dose, a patient will have to spend close to Rs700,000 (around \$8,100) per annum," Vishal Manchanda, analyst at Systematix Institutional Equities said. Novo's weight-loss drug, Wegovy, can cost non-insured US patients more than \$1,000 a month. Novo's India team has been pushing the global leadership to launch Wegovy as early as 2025 in the country as opposed to the company's target of a 2026 launch. The drugmaker said Wegovy has already been approved in India, but said it did not have a confirmed date for the medicine's launch there. Novo is not the only competitor Lilly will have to confront in India. Local drugmakers such as Sun Pharma, Cipla, Dr Reddy's and

Lupin have been racing to make generic versions of these drugs to grab a share of the global market estimated to be worth \$150bn in the next decade. The active ingredient in Wegovy is semaglutide, which is likely to go off-patent in 2026 in India. "The dual burden of obesity and type 2 diabetes is rapidly emerging as a major public health challenge in India," said president and general manager Winslow Tucker at Lilly India. Obesity and diabetes rates in India, a country of more than 1.4bn people, have been steadily climbing. The number of adults with diabetes is set to increase to over

124mn by 2045 from 74.2mn in 2021, according to International Diabetes Federation. Meanwhile, a government survey conducted between 2019 and 2021 showed that 24% of women and nearly 23% of men between the ages of 15 and 49 were either overweight or obese, up from 20.6% of women and 19% of men in 2015-2016. Wegovy and Novo's diabetes drug, Ozempic - which has the same main ingredient - and Mounjaro, belong to a class of therapies known as GLP-1 receptor agonists that help control blood sugar and slow digestion, making people feel fuller for longer.

Global TB fight at risk amid funding crisis

With tuberculosis (TB) remaining the world’s deadliest infectious disease, responsible for over 1mn deaths annually bringing devastating impacts on families and communities, the World Health Organisation’s (WHO) calls for urgent action could not have come at a more appropriate time. On the occasion on World TB Day, marked today (March 24), the WHO has called for an urgent investment of resources to protect and maintain TB care and support services for people in need across regions and countries.

Global efforts to combat TB have saved an estimated 79mn lives since 2000. However, the drastic and abrupt cuts in global health funding happening now are threatening to reverse these gains. Rising drug resistance especially across Europe and the ongoing conflicts across the Middle - East, Africa and Eastern Europe, are further exacerbating the situation for the most vulnerable.

Under the theme Yes! We Can End TB: Commit, Invest, Deliver, World Tuberculosis Day 2025 campaign highlights a rallying cry for urgency, and accountability and hope. “The huge gains the world has made against TB over the past 20 years are now at risk as cuts to funding start to disrupt access to services for prevention, screening, and treatment for people with TB,” said Dr Tedros Adhanom Ghebreyesus, WHO Director - General. “

Early reports to WHO reveal that severe disruptions in the TB response are seen across several of the highest -burden countries following the funding cuts. Countries in the WHO African Region are experiencing the greatest impact, followed by countries in the WHO South -East Asian and Western Pacific Regions. In all, 27 countries are facing crippling breakdowns in their TB response, with devastating consequences, such as: Human resource shortages

Severe funding cuts are disrupting TB prevention, screening and treatment in 27 high-burden countries, threatening decades of progress and risking millions of lives

undermining service delivery; diagnostic services severely disrupted, delaying detection and treatment; data and surveillance systems collapsing, compromising disease tracking and management; community engagement efforts, including active case finding, screening, and contact tracing, deteriorating, leading to delayed diagnoses and increased transmission risks.

Nine countries report failing TB drug procurement and supply chains, jeopardising treatment continuity and patient outcomes. The 2025 funding cuts further exacerbate an already existing underfunding for global TB response. In 2023, only 26% of the \$22bn annually needed for TB prevention and care

was available, leaving a massive shortfall. TB research is in crisis, receiving just one-fifth of the \$5bn annual target in 2022—severely delaying advancements in diagnostics, treatments, and vaccines. WHO is leading efforts to accelerate TB vaccine development through the TB Vaccine Accelerator Council, but progress remains at risk without urgent financial commitments.

In response to the urgent challenges threatening TB services worldwide, WHO’s Director -General and Civil Society Task Force on Tuberculosis issued a joint statement last week, demanding immediate, co-ordinated efforts from governments, global health leaders, donors, and policymakers to prevent further disruptions. The statement outlines five critical priorities: Addressing TB service disruptions urgently, ensuring responses match the crisis’s scale; securing sustainable domestic funding, guaranteeing uninterrupted and equitable access to TB prevention and care; safeguarding essential TB services, including access to life-saving drugs, diagnostics, treatment and social protections, alongside cross-sector collaboration; establishing or revitalising national collaboration platforms, fostering alliances among civil society, NGOs, donors, and professional societies to tackle challenges; enhancing monitoring and early warning systems to assess real-time impact and detect disruptions early.

“This urgent call is timely and underscores the necessity of swift, decisive action to sustain global TB progress and prevent setbacks that could cost lives,” said Dr Tereza Kasaeva, Director of WHO’s Global Programme on TB and Lung Health. “Investing in ending TB is not only a moral imperative but also an economic necessity — every dollar spent on prevention and treatment yields an estimated \$43 in economic returns.”

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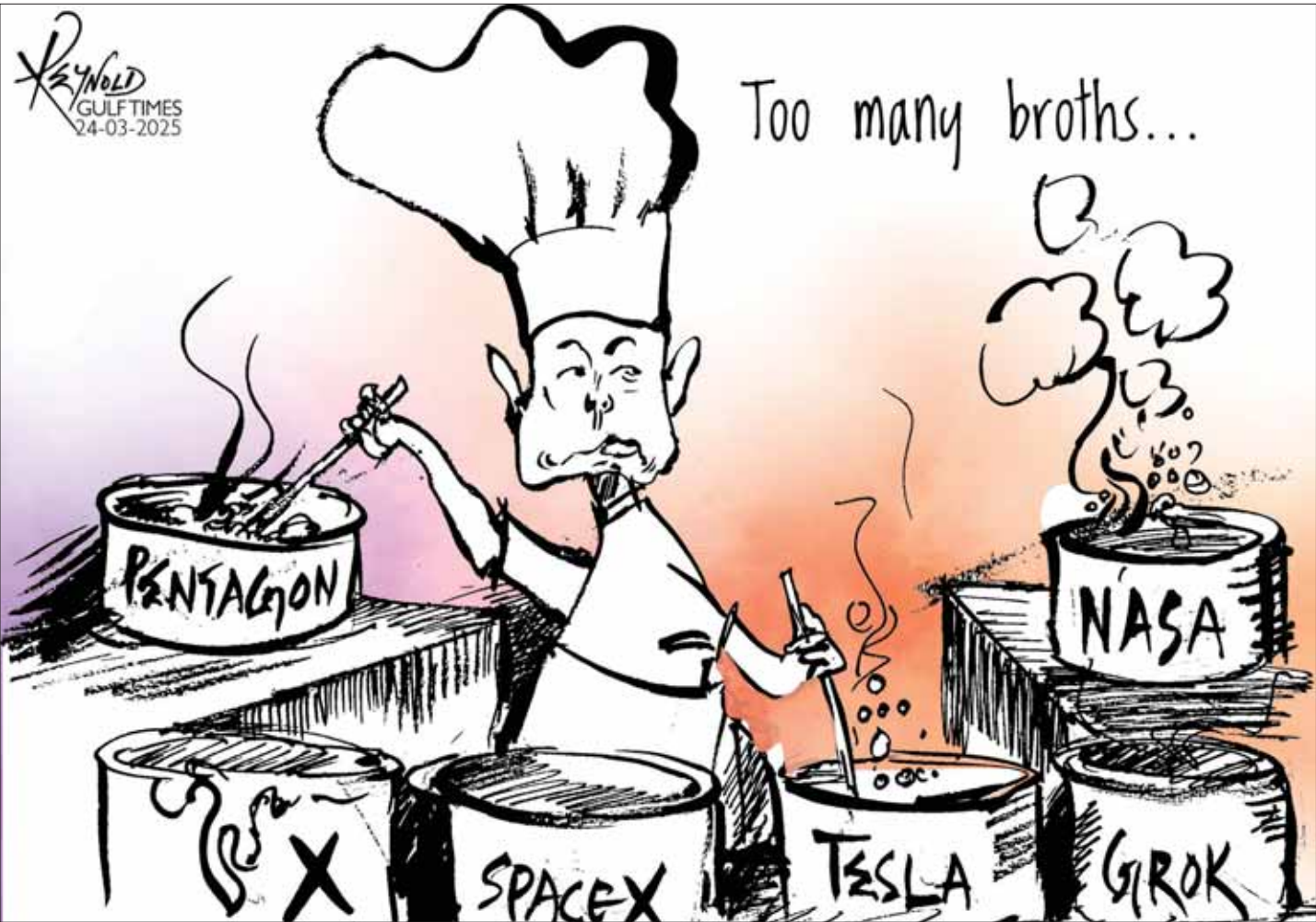
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Big Tech’s data centre boom poses new risk to US grid operators

Data Centre Alley, a 30-square-mile stretch outside Washington DC and home to more than 200 data centres, consumes roughly the same electricity as Boston. So power company officials were alarmed when a big chunk of those centres – 60 of them – suddenly dropped off the grid one day last summer and switched to on-site generators.

The mass reaction was triggered by a standard safety mechanism across the data centre industry, intended to protect computer chips and electronic equipment from damage caused by voltage fluctuations. But it caused a huge surge in excess electricity, according to federal regulators and utility executives.

The magnitude of the imbalance forced grid operator PJM and local utility Dominion Energy to scale back output from power plants to protect grid infrastructure and avoid a worst-case scenario of cascading power outages across the region.

The near-miss – reported here in detail for the first time – forced federal regulators to recognise a new vulnerability of America’s electrical grid: unannounced disconnections by data centres.

“As these data centres get bigger and consume more energy, the grid is not designed to withstand the loss of 1,500-megawatt data centres,” John Moura, Director of Reliability Assessment and System Analysis for NERC, told Reuters in an interview. “At some level it becomes too large to withstand unless more grid resources are added.”

Historically, grid operators have planned for large power plants tripping offline. But the rapid expansion of data centres processing the vast amounts of information used for AI and crypto mining is forcing grid operators to plan for new contingencies and complicating the already difficult task of balancing the country’s supply and demand of electricity.

“What it tells us is that the behaviour of data centres has the potential to cause cascading power outages for an entire region,” said Alison Silverstein, a former senior adviser to the chairman of the US Federal Energy Regulatory Commission.

The event last July 10 occurred near the DC suburb of Fairfax, Virginia, an area known as Data Centre Alley for its concentration of facilities serving Microsoft, Google and Amazon. About 70% of the world’s Internet traffic flows through the area. A month after the incident, the North American Electric Reliability Corporation (NERC), the federal regulator for grid reliability, founded a taskforce to study en masse disconnections by data centres and crypto miners.

For this story, Reuters examined thousands of pages of regulatory documents and interviewed about a dozen industry executives to determine the origins of the fault – a failed surge protector on Dominion’s Ox-Possum 230-kilovolt line near Fairfax, Virginia – and its spread across the area. NERC reviewed the incident in a report in January but did not disclose the exact location of the fault, the number of data centres involved, or how PJM and Dominion worked to rebalance the grid’s supply and demand of electricity.

The number of near-miss

events like the one in Data Centre Alley has grown rapidly over the last five years as more data centres come online.

The amount of power used by data centres has tripled over the past decade and could triple again by 2028, according to a report produced by the Lawrence Berkeley National Laboratory for the Department of Energy in December. A Reuters review of disclosure filings by the Electric Reliability Council of Texas (ERCOT), the state’s main grid operator, identified more than 30 near-miss incidents since 2020, triggered by big energy users like data centres and crypto miners switching offline.

In December 2022, a failed transformer at a substation in west Texas caused nearly 400 crypto miners, data centres and oil and gas production facilities to unplug without warning.

The mass exodus produced an oversupply of nearly 1,700 megawatts of electricity – equivalent to about about 5% of the grid’s total demand – and forced 112 megawatts of power generation to shut down, according to ERCOT.

The risk of power outages will only grow as new data centres come online, the NERC forecast in a December report. Nearly all of the United States will face higher risks of energy shortfalls over the next 5 to 10 years, the report said.

The regulator urged utilities to consider updating federal reliability standards for data centres and crypto miners.

Many data centres are engineered by their operators to switch to local generators at the smallest hint of a problem on the grid to minimise the risk of an interruption to services like Google search or crypto mining, according to NERC.

Some grid operators have

proposed requiring data centres to “ride through” routine voltage dips without disconnecting. But data centre operators are opposed because of the risk of damaging electronic equipment and cooling systems.

ERCOT last year withdrew a proposal that would have imposed ride-through restrictions on data centres and crypto miners after facing pushback from an industry group, the Data Centre Coalition.

The group, whose members include Amazon, Google, and Meta, cited costs and the risk of damaging computer chips and cooling systems exposed to fluctuating voltage levels.

“Data centre hardware and power supplies, similar to other electronics, are very sensitive to power supply stability,” the coalition said in January 2024 comments filed with ERCOT.

“Deviating from this range will deteriorate the optimal performance, reduce longevity, or damage the components beyond repair.”

The coalition said in a statement to Reuters that it intended to be a helpful partner to grid operators.

“We fully recognise grid planning and management is the responsibility of utilities and grid operators, but DCC is committed to leaning in as an active and engaged partner to be helpful and ensure we collectively meet this moment,” said Aaron Tinjum, the coalition’s Vice-President of Energy.

Amazon, Google and Meta did not return messages seeking comment. ERCOT did not return messages seeking comment. There is “high potential” for the magnitude of these disconnection events to grow as larger operations plug into the Texas grid, ERCOT operations engineer Patrick Gravois said in a December presentation to NERC’s Large Load Task Force.

Gravois said the grid operator is still working to determine exactly what prompts big users of electricity to unplug from the grid, so that it can avoid surges.

Ari Peskoe, director of the Electricity Law Initiative at Harvard Law School, said regulators could require data centres to ride through voltage dips – but that could risk Big Tech decamping for states with more relaxed rules.

Jim Simonelli, chief technology officer for Schneider Electric’s secure power division, said utilities and the data centre industry have a lot of lessons to be learned from what happened outside Washington DC this past July.

“One thing that doesn’t exist yet for the data centre industry is how to be grid-friendly,” Simonelli said. - Reuters

In Trump shadow, Canada calls snap polls for April 28

Canada's new Prime Minister Mark Carney yesterday called early elections for April 28, pledging to defeat Donald Trump's drive to annex the United States's huge northern neighbour. Carney, a former central banker, was chosen by Canada's centrist Liberal Party to replace Justin Trudeau as prime minister, but he has never faced the country's broader electorate. That will now change as Carney brought parliamentary elections forward several months from October, and he made it clear that the barrage of trade and sovereignty threats coming from the US president will be the focus of his campaign. "I've just requested that the governor general dissolve parliament and call an election for April 28. She has agreed," Carney said in a speech to the nation, referring to King Charles III's representative in Canada, a member of the British Commonwealth. In power for a decade, the Liberal government had slid into deep unpopularity, but Carney will be hoping to ride a wave of Canadian patriotism to a new majority. "I'm asking Canadians for a strong, positive mandate to deal with President

Trump," Carney said, adding that the Republican "wants to break us, so America can own us. We will not let that happen." "We are facing the most significant crisis of our lifetimes because of President Trump's unjustified trade actions and his threats to our sovereignty," Carney said. "Our response must be to build a strong economy and a more secure Canada," he added, pledging not to meet Trump until the US leader recognises Canadian sovereignty. Trump has riled his northern neighbour by repeatedly dismissing its borders as artificial, and urging it to join the United States as the 51st state. The ominous remarks have been accompanied by Trump's swirling trade war, with the imposition of tariffs on imports from Canada, which could severely damage its economy. Domestic issues such as the cost of living and immigration usually dominate Canadian elections, but this time around, one key topic tops the list in this country of 41mn people: who can best handle Trump. The president's open hostility toward his northern neighbour — a Nato ally and historically one of his country's closest partners — has upended the Canadian political landscape. Trudeau, who had been in power since 2015, was deeply unpopular when he an-

nounced he was stepping down, with Pierre Poilievre's Conservatives seen as election favourites just weeks ago. But the polls have narrowed spectacularly in Carney's favour since he took over the Liberals, who only hold a minority in parliament, and analysts are now calling the race too close to call.

"Many consider this to be an existential election, unprecedented," Felix Mathieu, a political scientist at the University of Winnipeg, told AFP. "It is impossible at this stage to make predictions, but this will be a closely watched election with a voter turnout that should be on the rise."

Poilievre, 45, is a career politician, first elected when he was only 25. A veteran tough-talking campaigner, he has sometimes been tagged as a libertarian and a populist. Yesterday, Poilievre — seen by some as too similar to Trump in style and substance — set the tone. "I want the opposite of what Donald Trump wants," the Conservative leader said, promising to base his campaign on bread-and-butter economic issues and the worries of "regular people." Carney, 60, has spent his career outside of electoral politics. He spent more than a decade at Goldman Sachs and went on to lead Canada's central bank, and then the Bank of England. Smaller opposition parties could suffer if Canadians seek to give a large mandate to one of the big two, to strengthen their hand against Trump. As for the US leader, he professes not to care, while pushing ahead with plans to further strengthen tariffs against Canada and other major trading partners on April 2. "I don't care who wins up there," Trump said this week. "But just a little while ago, before I got involved and totally changed the election, which I don't care about [...] the Conservative was leading by 35 points."

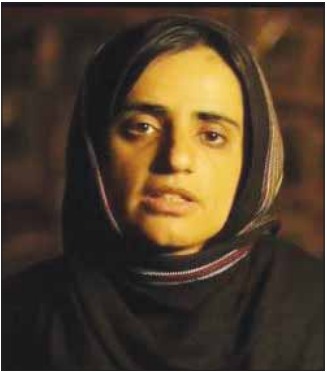

Baloch activist charged with 'terrorism'

Pakistan yesterday charged a Baloch rights activist with terrorism, sedition and murder after she led a demonstration which ended in the death of three protesters, according to police documents. Mahrang Baloch (pictured), one of Pakistan's most prominent human rights advocates, has long campaigned for the Baloch ethnic group, which claims it has been targeted by Islamabad with harassment and extrajudicial killings. Pakistan has been battling a separatist insurgency in Balochistan for decades, where militants target state forces and foreign nationals in the mineral-rich southwestern province bordering Afghanistan and Iran. On Friday, she and other activists took part in a sit-in protest outside the University of Balochistan in the provincial capital of Quetta. They demanded the release of



members of their support group, whom they allege had been detained by security agencies. Police launched a pre-dawn raid on Saturday, arresting Baloch and other activists, during which at least three protesters died. Both sides blamed each other for the deaths. Mary Lawlor, the United Nations special rapporteur on human rights defenders, said she was "very concerned" at Baloch's arrest. Baloch and other protesters have been charged with terror-

ism, sedition and murder, according to the police charge sheet seen by AFP. Hamza Shafqaat, a senior administrative official in Quetta, said that Baloch and other activists were held under public order laws. Her lawyer, Imran Baloch, confirmed she was detained in a jail in Quetta. Baloch was barred from travelling to the United States last year to attend a TIME magazine awards gala of "rising leaders". Protests among the Baloch are often led by women. Baloch, now in her 30s, began her activist career aged 16 when her father went missing in what his supporters said was an alleged "enforced disappearance". His body was found two years later. Earlier in March, the separatist Baloch Liberation Army (BLA) — which accuses outsiders of plundering the province's natural resources — launched a dramatic train siege that officials said ended in around 60 deaths, half of whom were separatists behind the assault.

France arrests young man for suspected rabbi attack

French police this weekend arrested a young man suspected of attacking a rabbi in a city south of Paris, a prosecutor said yesterday, as the president described anti-Semitism as a "poison". The man on Saturday afternoon allegedly hit the rabbi of Orleans in the head, bit him on the shoulder and insulted him as he was walking back from synagogue with his nine-year-old son, a source following the case told AFP. Several sources said rabbi Arie Engelberg was hit on the cheek and shoulder blade. Police were checking the identity of the person in custody since he did not have documents on him when he was detained, Orleans prosecutor Emmanuelle Bochenek-Puren said. Another source with knowledge of the case said the suspect arrested on Saturday night was known under at least three identities, one Moroccan and two Palestinian. France is home to the largest Jewish population outside Israel and the United States, as well as the largest Muslim community in the European Union. Several EU nations have reported a spike in "anti-Muslim hatred" and "anti-Semitism" since the Gaza war started on October 7, 2023, according to the European Union Agency for Fundamental Rights. Andre Druon, a Jewish community leader in Orleans, said there had not been any incident in Orleans since October 7, 2023 "apart from some graffiti" before the "very violent" attack on the rabbi. He said the rabbi was profoundly shaken when he recounted his ordeal to the community yesterday. "An individual started filming" the rabbi then attacked the religious leader when he asked him to stop recording, Druon said.

Tourists turning away from Trump's America

In just a few weeks, the US tourism outlook has clouded as a result of some of President Donald Trump's policy decisions, which have angered some foreign visitors and prompted fear of a surge in prices and a stronger dollar. Foreign traveller arrivals in the United States are expected to decline by 5.1% in 2025 compared to last year, against a previously projected increase of 8.8%, Tourism Economics said in a report published late last month. Their spending is expected to slide 10.9%. Since the report's publication, "the situation has deteriorated further," and the outcome will likely be even worse, Tourism Economics president Adam Sacks said, citing "the effects of antipathy towards the US." In recent weeks, the Trump administration has slapped tariffs on Canada, Mexico, and China — and threatened to impose them on the European Union. A sweeping plan to curb immigration has intensified. Government bodies like the US Agency for International Development have been decimated, thousands of civil servants from lawyers to park rangers have been laid off, and Trump has drawn up controversial plans for the wars in Ukraine and Gaza. "A situation with polarising Trump Administration policies and rhetoric... will discourage travel to the US," said Tourism Economics, a subsidiary of Oxford Economics. "Some organisations will feel pressure to avoid hosting events in the US, or sending employees to the US, cutting into business travel," it added. The World Tourism Forum Institute said a mix of stringent immigration policies, a strong dollar and global political tensions "could significantly affect" international arrivals, "potentially reshaping the nation's tourism sector for years to come." Among residents of 16 European and Asian countries surveyed by YouGov in December, 35% of respondents said they were less likely to come to the United States under Trump, while 22% were more likely. For tourists from France, Uzbekistan, and Argentina interviewed by AFP in New York's Times Square, Trump's stance has not upended their plans. Marianela Lopez and Ailen Hadjiovakis, both 33, nevertheless used their European passports rather than their Argentine ones to avoid any problems at the border.

"We were a bit scared about the situation, but we didn't change our plans," said Lopez. The Lagardere family, who came from France, said it hadn't impacted their plans either. The Americans "elected this president. It's democracy. If they're not happy, they'll change it in four years," said Laurent Lagardere, 54. "He is who he is" and avoiding the United States "won't change anything," Lagardere added. Some 77.7mn foreign tourists were expected in 2024, up 17% year-on-year, according to the National Travel and Tourism Office, which does not yet have final figures for last year. Tourists from Western Europe — who made up 37% of visitors in 2024 — are the most likely to choose other destinations, along with Canadians and Mexicans. The US Travel Association warned in early February that customs tariffs would deter Canadians, the largest contingent of foreign tourists in the United States with 20.4mn in 2024. According to Statistics Canada, the number of Canadians returning from the United States fell 23% in February year-on-year, the second consecutive monthly decline. In New York, which welcomed 12.9mn foreign travellers in 2024, the effect is already noticeable, with Canadians cancelling tour bookings and a drop in online searches for hotels or Broadway shows, NYC Tourism president Julie Coker told AFP. She lowered her forecast for the year in February but said that so far, only Canadians are saying no to Trump's America. "We're not currently seeing anything from the UK or Europe," because it's too early, she said. "We are definitely watching that very closely." But British and German authorities have just warned their nationals to be extra vigilant with their travel documents, citing the risk of arrest. United Airlines has noted a "big drop" in travel from Canada to the United States as well as a decline in demand for domestic travel, as have several competitors. According to Tourism Economics, the tourism sector could lose about \$64bn in revenue in 2025 due to the decline in international and domestic travel. Americans now appear frozen by the economic outlook, and terms like recession and inflation also scare tourists, along with the risk of a stronger greenback, experts point out. "This will make the US more expensive for inbound travellers, dampening both visitor volume and average length of stay," noted Tourism Economics.

Tired Pope returns to Vatican from hospital

Pope Francis returned home to the Vatican yesterday after more than five weeks in hospital with pneumonia, taking time before leaving to thank well-wishers for their support. Looking tired and worn, the 88-year-old Catholic leader waved to a crowd outside Rome's Gemelli hospital from a balcony, the first time he has been seen in public since he was admitted on February 14. "Thank you, everyone," a weak-sounding Francis said into a microphone, seated in a wheelchair, as hundreds of pilgrims chanted his name. He waved his hands from his lap, doing an occasional thumbs-up sign, and drew laughter when he noted, smiling: "I can see that woman with yellow flowers, well done." Francis, who had bags under his eyes, was on the balcony for two minutes before being discharged from the hospital immediately afterwards. The

Argentine pontiff left by car wearing a cannula — a plastic tube tucked into his nostrils which delivers oxygen — an indication of the continued fragility of his health. His doctor said Saturday that he will need "at least two months" of convalescence at his home in the Santa Martha guesthouse in the Vatican. Pilgrims gathered yesterday outside the Gemelli, where he was treated in a special suite on the 10th floor, expressed their delight at seeing him in person. His appearance "just filled me and I think many of the people who are here with a great sense of joy," Larry James Kulick, a bishop from the US state of Pennsylvania told AFP. "It was just a wonderful opportunity to see him and I think he responded so much to the people's prayers and to all of the chanting," he said. "I hope it lifted his spirits, I think it did."

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
