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

## New deal under study to restore Gaza truce

Egypt has floated a new proposal aimed at restoring the Gaza ceasefire deal, security sources said yesterday, as Palestinian health authorities said Israeli strikes had killed at least 65 people in the enclave in the previous 24 hours.

The proposal, made last week, follows an escalation in violence after Israel resumed air and ground operations against Hamas militants on March 18, ending a two-month period of relative calm after 15 months of war.

Gaza health officials said Israeli air strikes and shelling have killed nearly 700 Palestinians since then, including at least 400 women and children.

Among those killed yesterday were two local journalists, Mohammad Mansour and Hussam Shabat, medics said. The Palestinian Journalist Syndicate said at least 206 journalists have been

killed by Israeli fire in Gaza since early October 2023, when the conflict erupted. There was no immediate Israeli comment.

Palestinian resistance movement Hamas said several of its senior political and security officials had also been killed.

Later yesterday, the Israeli military said it had intercepted a missile launched from Yemen before it crossed into Israel. Warn-

ing sirens had sounded in Jerusalem, Tel Aviv and other areas.

The Egyptian plan calls for Hamas to release five Israeli hostages each week, with Israel implementing the second phase of the ceasefire after the first week, two security sources said.

Hamas is still holding 59 hostages, with 24 thought to be still alive.

Both the US and Hamas have agreed to the proposal, the security sources said, but Israel has not yet responded.

A Hamas official did not confirm the proposed offer, but told Reuters that "several proposals are being discussed with the mediators to bridge the gap and to resume negotiations to reach common ground that would pave the way to start the second phase of the agreement".

The sources said the Egyptian proposal includes a timeline for a full Israeli military withdrawal from Gaza, backed by US guarantees, in exchange for the release of remaining hostages.

Minister and Minister of Foreign Affairs stressed Qatar's keenness to enhance the prospects of co-operation with the Kurdistan Region of Iraq in various fields, in a way that serves mutual interests. HE Sheikh Mohammed also highlighted the strong historical fraternal relations that bind Qatar with the sisterly Republic of Iraq, praising in this regard the level of consultation and co-ordination between the two countries on regional and international issues in order to strengthen international peace and security.

## Qatar condemns Israeli policies

Qatar strongly condemned the Israeli occupation's declaration of establishing an agency to displace Palestinians from the Gaza Strip, and endorsing the dismantlement of 13 unlawful settlement outposts in the West Bank, as a prelude to their legalisation as colonial settlements. It stressed that displacing the Palestinians in any form constitutes a flagrant violation of international law, while expanding the settlements represents an underestimation of international legitimacy resolutions, especially UN Security Council Resolution 2344. **Page 2**

## Conservatives target Trump as Canada campaign begins

Canada's Conservative leader Pierre Poilievre argued yesterday that he is the strongest candidate to take on US President Donald Trump, whose annexation and tariff threats have shaken the once promising chances of a Tory-led government. The leading candidates ahead of Canada's April 28 election fanned out on the first full day of campaigning in a vote certain to be dominated by Trump. Liberal leader and Prime Minister Mark Carney, who replaced Justin Trudeau earlier this month, was in the eastern province of Newfoundland, saying Canadians needed to view the United States as "a friendship lost." Poilievre built significant support as a relentless critic of an unpopular Trudeau government, but Trump's return and Trudeau's departure have forced the Conservatives to pivot.

## Greenland leaders slam US team's trip

US President Donald Trump yesterday doubled down on his suggestion that the US should take over Greenland as leaders from the semi-autonomous Danish territory criticised a planned trip there this week by a high-profile US delegation. "I think Greenland is going to be something that maybe is in our future," Trump told reporters. Greenland's outgoing Prime Minister Mute Egede called plans by the US delegation to visit an American military base and attend a dog sled race a "provocation". **Page 15**

## Al Jazeera journalist killed in Israeli attack on Gaza

**S**eparate Israeli attacks on the Gaza Strip have killed two media workers, including an Al Jazeera journalist.

**Hossam Shabat**, a journalist who worked for Al Jazeera Mubasher, was killed in northern Gaza yesterday. Witnesses told the network that his car was targeted in the eastern part of Beit Lahiya.

Reporting from Deir el-Balah in central Gaza, Al Jazeera's Tareq Abu Azzoum said Shabat, 23, had been previously wounded in another Israeli attack "but he insisted on continuing news reporting" in Gaza.

"The Israeli military targeted his vehicle" without giving "any prior warning", Abu Azzoum said.

The colleagues of Shabat, have shared his final words.

In a post on X, prewritten by Shabat, his team wrote, "If you're reading this, it means I have been killed – most likely targeted – by the Israeli occupation forces." Shabat wrote that over the last 18 months of war, he has dedicated "every moment" to his people.

"I documented the horrors in northern Gaza minute by minute, determined to show the world the



truth they tried to bury. I slept on pavements, in schools, in tents – anywhere I could. Each day was a battle for survival. I endured hunger for months, yet I never left my people's side."

"I ask you now: do not stop speaking about Gaza," Shabat added. "Do not let the world look away. Keep fighting, keep telling our stories – until Palestine is free."

Earlier yesterday, an Israeli army attack on Khan Younis, in southern Gaza, also killed journalist Mohammad Mansour, who worked for Palestine Today. (Courtesy Al Jazeera)

## Israel strikes on Syria, Lebanon 'risk escalation'

EU foreign policy chief Kaja Kallas warned yesterday during a visit to Jerusalem that Israeli strikes on Syria and Lebanon threatened to worsen the situation. The most intense escalation since a November ceasefire, which ended the war between Israel and the Iran-backed militant group Hezbollah in Lebanon, occurred on Saturday. Lebanon's health ministry said eight people have been killed, with Israel saying it attacked in response to rocket fire, which Hezbollah denied responsibility for. Despite the ceasefire, Israel has continued to carry out strikes on Lebanon, and both sides have repeatedly accused the other of violating the truce. "Military actions must be proportionate, and Israeli strikes into Syria and Lebanon risk further escalation," Kallas said at a news conference.

Qatar Chamber chairman Sheikh Khalifa bin Jassim al-Thani has presided over the first meeting of the chamber's Insurance Committee for 2025.

firms within the Qatari market. It also reviewed the participation of the Insurance Committee in determining pricing mechanisms for compulsory health insurance. Furthermore, it re-examined commissions paid on compulsory car insurance.

The committee recommended arranging visits to relevant entities to further discuss the key topics raised during the meeting.

Members also agreed to refer these issues to the technical team for automotive and compensation

matters, who will submit their technical proposals for the committee's review.

## US, Russia hold Ukraine ceasefire talks in Saudi

**T**alks between Russia and the US on Ukraine in Saudi Arabia yesterday have ended after a dozen hours of negotiations, with a joint statement expected today, Russian news agencies reported.

The TASS news agency reported its source saying that the meeting had ended after "more than 12 hours of consultations" and that a "joint statement" on results will be published today.

As US and Russian officials met in Saudi Arabia to discuss a partial ceasefire in Ukraine, dozens of people were wounded in a

missile strike on a Ukrainian city. With Ukrainian negotiators waiting nearby, a day after they sat down with the US team, the Americans and Russians met in Riyadh with a Black Sea ceasefire top of the agenda.

President Donald Trump is pushing for a rapid end to the three-year war and hopes the latest round of talks will pave the way for a breakthrough.

While the talks took place at a luxury hotel in the Saudi capital, 65 people were wounded in a missile attack on Sumy in northeast Ukraine, officials said.

The attack on a "densely populated residential area" damaged apartments and an educational facility, the regional prosecutor's

office said. The city's acting mayor earlier said a hospital had been affected.

The Ukrainian negotiating team was expecting a second meeting with the US delegation, a source in Kyiv said, a sign that progress may have been made.

This month in Jeddah – days after President Volodymyr Zelensky's White House dressing-down by Trump – Ukraine agreed to a US-proposed, 30-day ceasefire that was then rejected by Russian President Vladimir Putin.

Officials are now studying a possible resumption of the Black Sea Initiative, a year-long agreement that allowed millions of tonnes of grain and other food exports to be shipped from Ukraine's ports.



# Shura Council strongly condemns Israel's brutal aggression on Gaza

The Shura Council held yesterday its regular weekly session, chaired by HE the Speaker Hassan bin Abdullah al-Ghanem.

At the beginning of the session at the Tamim bin Hamad Hall at the Council's premises, the legislature expressed its strong condemnation of the Israeli occupation's resumption of its brutal aggression on the Gaza Strip and its continued perpetration of crimes against the Palestinian people, killing innocent victims, including children and women, in flagrant violation of all international and humanitarian laws and conventions.

The council affirmed that these brutal attacks represent a blatant challenge to international efforts seeking to achieve peace and a deliberate undermining of all efforts aimed at achieving a ceasefire and protecting civilians.

It stressed that the occupation's aggressive policies will only escalate the situation and increase the suffering of the Palestinian people, which requires urgent and decisive action to ensure the protection of the Pales-



tinian people and halt the ongoing violations against them. The Shura Council reiterated Qatar's firm and supportive position on the just Palestinian cause and the inalienable right of the Palestinian people to self-determination and the establishment of their independent state on the 1967 borders, with East Jerusalem as its capital, in accordance with the Arab Peace Initiative and relevant international legitimacy resolutions.

During the session, the council approved a draft law on ministers and referred it to the esteemed government, after debating the Legal and Legislative Affairs Committee's report.

Separately, the session reviewed a report on the council's participation in the meeting of the General Assembly and the Administrative Board of the Coalition of Women MPs from Arab Countries to Combat Violence against Women, which was held via videoconference in June 2024. The council also discussed a report on its delegation's participation in the Fourth Parliamentary Policy Dialogue on Countering the Use of AI and New Technologies for Terrorist Purposes and the Sixth Meeting of the Counter-Terrorism Coordination Mechanism for Parliamentary Assemblies, both held in Rome in December 2024.

## Qatar denounces Israel's unlawful settlement outposts in West Bank

Qatar strongly condemned the Israeli occupation's declaration of establishing an agency to displace Palestinians from the Gaza Strip, and endorsing the dismantlement of 13 unlawful settlement outposts in the West Bank, as a prelude to their legalisation as colonial settlements. It stressed that displacing the Palestinians in any form constitutes a flagrant violation of international law, while expanding the settlements represents an underestimation of international legitimacy resolutions, especially UN Security Council Resolution 2334. In a statement, the Ministry of Foreign Affairs stressed that it is imperative for the international community to stand in strong solidarity to compel the occupying power to comply with the will for peace and to immediately end the brutal war on the Gaza Strip. The ministry reiterated Qatar's unwavering support for the Palestinian cause and the resilience of the brotherly Palestinian people, based on international legitimacy resolutions and the two-state solution to ensure the establishment of the independent Palestinian state on the 1967 borders with East Jerusalem as its capital. Qatar welcomed the statements issued by the Democratic Republic of the Congo (DRC) and the Republic of Rwanda on their commitment for de-escalation and reducing tensions in the eastern region of Congo, in regards to the M23 statement on their withdrawal from the Walikale area. Qatar viewed this as a significant positive step towards achieving stability and peace in the region.


In a statement, the Ministry of Foreign Affairs expressed Qatar's full appreciation to both DRC and Rwanda for their commitment to dialogue aimed at calming the situation in Eastern Congo, and commended their positive engagement and efforts to resolve the crisis through peaceful initiatives. ## CRA issues policy to protect postal services consumers

The Communications Regulatory Authority (CRA) has issued the Consumer Protection Policy for the Postal Sector and the Regulation for Postal Consumer Protection, reinforcing its commitment to safeguarding postal consumers' rights and ensuring a fair, transparent, and accountable postal service sector.

These regulatory instruments align with the Law Regulating Postal Services (Law No. (15) of 2023), and the broader regulatory framework, setting a new benchmark for consumer rights and Service Provider obligations in this sector.

The Consumer Protection Policy outlines the guiding principles for consumer protection in postal services, ensuring that consumers receive clear, accurate, and accessible information about the services offered.

It establishes a robust foundation for consumer rights, ensuring that postal services are fit for purpose and that service providers adhere to fair and transparent practices.

The Regulation for Postal Consumer Protection establishes a detailed framework of rules and obligations for postal service providers. This framework encompasses vital aspects such as service quality standards, consumer rights, procedures for handling complaints, and mechanisms for resolving disputes.

The regulation sets rigorous benchmarks for transparency in billing, fairness in contracts, and safeguards against deceptive advertising or unfair business conduct. Furthermore, it guarantees consumers have access to effective means of resolving complaints with service providers, thereby promoting a postal service environment characterised by balance and accountability.

Commenting on this, Director of Consumer Affairs Department at CRA, Amel Saleem al-Hanawi, stated: "The protection of postal consumers is at the core of CRAs regulatory efforts. The policy and regulation contribute to ensuring that consumers have access to fair, transparent, and high-quality postal services, aligning with the objectives of the Third National Development Strategy 2024-2030, which prioritises improving residents' quality of life. These measures enhance Qatar's postal regulatory framework, aligning with global standards and the objectives of CRAs strategy and Qatar National Vision 2030." (QNA)



## Endangered dolphins spotted in Qatar's waters



A scientific team from the Wildlife Development Department at the Ministry of Environment and Climate Change has spotted a group of Indian Ocean humpback dolphins in the northern waters of Qatar, including newborn calves, which is considered a positive indicator of the good health of the local marine ecosystem. 

140mn riyals, reflecting the importance of this programme in alleviating the financial burdens on retirees."





## Kia, Honda, Mazda models recalled

The Ministry of Commerce and Industry, in co-operation with Al-Attiya Motors and Trading Company, has announced the recall of Kia Telluride 3.8L, 2019-2020 models, as over time, the headlamp projection unit (high beam) shield gear mechanism in the headlamp assembly, can independently become damaged due to heat generated from the halogen bulb.

If this occurs, the high beam(s) is/are no longer operable. The ministry, in co-operation with Domasco (Doha Marketing Services Company), announced the recall of Honda CRF1100, 2024-2025 models, as Wheelee Control does not work based on the catalogue or owner's manual due to a malfunction in the setting value of the wheelie ECM control program, affecting its proper function. The ministry, in cooperation with National Car Company, has announced the recall of Mazda 3 and CX-3, 2019-2020 models, as the rear-view camera may sometimes display intermittent images and blurred or distorted vision due to the rear-view camera wiring harness not being properly closed.

## Glimpses of Divine Mercy

Allah, The Almighty, is the Most Merciful, Most Compassionate, and He is the most Merciful of those who show mercy. His Mercy encompasses all things. Allah, The Almighty, Says (what means): (...and My Mercy embraces all things....) [Qur'an 7:156]

Allah, The Almighty, extends His Mercy to all His creation, for He knows that man was created weak and is prone to fall into sin. After promising His Mercy to humanity, Allah, The Almighty, informs them that as long as they call on Him and put their hope in Him, He will forgive them. This statement alone can convince one to have hope and never despair.

When a person calls out to Allah, The Almighty, or supplicates to Him, he is displaying his need of and dependence on Allah, The Almighty. He is demonstrating his weakness to the fact that he has no power to do anything by himself. It is the essence of submission and servitude. It is also a recognition of the Attributes of Allah, The Almighty, associated with Mercy, such as kindness, generosity, forgiveness and His unlimited power and knowledge. Human beings are always in need of Allah, The Almighty, at all times and in all circumstances. A believer always turns to Allah to ask for guidance as well as to seek forgiveness for sins and shortcomings.

In fact, The Mercy of Allah, The Almighty, extends to all His creation, not just humanity. Abu Hurairah, may Allah be pleased with him, narrated that the Prophet, sallallaahu 'alaihi wa sallam, said: "Allah has one hundred parts of Mercy, of which He sent down one between the jinn, mankind, the animals and the insects; by means of which they are compassionate and merciful to one another, and by means of which wild animals are kind to their offspring. And Allah has kept back ninety-nine parts of mercy with which to be merciful to His slaves on the Day of Resurrection." [Muslim] It was narrated that 'Umar ibn al-Khattaab, may Allah be pleased with him, said: "Some prisoners were brought to the Messenger of Allah, sallallaahu 'alaihi wa sallam, and there was a woman among the prisoners who was searching (for her child). When she found her child she embraced him and put him to her breast. The Messenger of Allah, sallallaahu 'alaihi wa sallam, said to us: 'Do you think that this woman would throw her child in the fire?' We said, 'No, by Allah, if she is not obliged to do so.' The Messenger of Allah, sallallaahu 'alaihi wa sallam, said: 'Allah is more merciful to His slaves



than this woman is to her child.'" [Al-Bukhari and Muslim]

One aspect of the Mercy of Allah to His slaves is that He sent them Messengers and revealed the Books and laws to organize their lives in a wise manner, far from hardship and difficulty. Allah, The Almighty Says (what means): (And We have sent you (O Muhammad) not but as a mercy for the 'Alameen (mankind, jinn and all that exists).) [Qur'an 21:107]

The Mercy of Allah, The Almighty, is the means through which His believing slaves will be admitted to Paradise on the Day of Resurrection. No one will ever enter Paradise because of his deeds alone, as the Prophet, sallallaahu 'alaihi wa sallam, said: "No one will enter Paradise thanks to his deeds." They said, "Not even you, O Messenger of Allah?" He, sallallaahu 'alaihi wa sallam, said, "No, not even me, unless Allah shower me with His Mercy. So try to be close to perfection. And no one should wish for death; if he is doing good deeds, he will do more of them, and if he is sinning, he may repent." [Al-Bukhari and Muslim]

Thus, the believer must remain in a state between hope and fear, hoping for the Mercy of Allah, The Almighty, and fearing His Punishment; Allah, The Almighty Says (what means):

- (Declare (O Muhammad) unto My slaves, that truly, I am the Oft-Forgiving, the Most-Merciful. And that My Torment is indeed the most painful torment.) [Qur'an 15:49-50]

- (Say: O My servants who have transgressed against their own souls, despair not of the mercy of Allah. Indeed, Allah forgives all sins. Truly, He is Most Forgiving, Most Merciful.) [Qur'an 39:53]

## 2,700 attend Ramadan lecture by Mufti Menk at Msheirib



This is achieved by subduing our desires, achieving the piety desired by the prescription of fasting, enhancing our self-worth, and elevating our goals to attain the pleasure of Allah," he said.

Dr Saleh bin Ali al-Marri, Fanar director, said that preacher Mufti Ismail Menk enjoys widespread acceptance. "He has a great influence and a distinctive style in preaching and speaking to people. He explained that his preaching style combines scientific foundations and the ability to deliver information to all segments of society," he said.

## KMC provides tips for easing joint pain

Experts at the Korean Medical Center (KMC) in Lusail provide specialised guidance on stretching exercises that can be performed before and after prayer to help alleviate joint and lower back pain, a statement said.

By incorporating practical physiotherapy-backed techniques, individuals can reduce strain and improve mobility, allowing for a more comfortable and fulfilling prayer experience.

Dr Youngwoong Back, head of the Spine & Joint Centre at KMC, explains: "Simple stretching exercises and strengthening the supporting muscles can help reduce joint stress, enhance mobility, and make prayer movements more comfortable and fluid."

Experts at KMC's Spine & Joint Centre emphasise that practising stretching exercises before and after prayer can significantly contribute to alleviating joint pain and enhancing comfort during the movements.

Maintaining body flexibility, improving prayer posture, and strengthening supportive muscles are essential factors for joint health and preventing chronic strain.

One of the most effective ways to prepare the body for prayer is through gentle stretching before and after each session.

A few minutes of targeted movements can improve



flexibility, reduce stiffness, and support smoother transitions between standing, kneeling, and prostration.

Dr Back emphasises the importance of flexibility in preventing pain. "When the joints are stiff, movements become more difficult and force other areas of the body to compensate, increasing strain." Several simple stretches can be particularly effective. A seated knee stretch, where one leg is extended forward while flexing the foot, helps relieve pressure from the knees. A gentle forward bend from a standing position can ease lower back tension, while a hip-opening stretch, where one ankle is placed over the opposite knee while seated, can improve mobility and reduce stiffness in the hips.

Correcting posture during prayer can significantly reduce joint strain. Ensuring proper

risk of pain and inflammation. Building muscle strength through simple, low-impact exercises can provide additional stability and improve endurance for prolonged standing or kneeling. Wall sits, where an individual leans against a wall and lowers into a squat, can strengthen the quadriceps without putting excessive pressure on the knees. Leg raises, performed while lying down, engage the quadriceps and improve knee stability. Core activation, including gentle abdominal bracing, can help reduce pressure on the lower back and improve posture.

For individuals experiencing chronic discomfort, additional joint care strategies can enhance mobility and reduce pain. Applying heat therapy before prayer can help relax muscles and improve circulation, making movement easier. Cold therapy after prayer can reduce inflammation and prevent soreness, especially for those with arthritis or joint sensitivity. For some, joint pain persists despite making these adjustments. If discomfort worsens over time or begins to interfere with daily activities, seeking medical support may be necessary.

At KMC's Spine & Joint Centre, specialists provide non-surgical treatment options tailored to each individual's needs.

In addition, Menk spoke about the negative habits associated with Ramadan worship, which sometimes overshadow the spiritual essence of the acts, turning them into mere routines. He emphasised that fasting is meant to transform the entire life of a Muslim, including daily habits, as Ramadan was prescribed to make Muslims more aware of the value of time and life. Through intensive training in worship, Ramadan elevates them above desires, achieving the piety intended by fasting, while enhancing self-worth and striving towards divine approval. (QNA)

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## Burkina journalists held after defending freedom of speech: media body

Authorities detained two journalists in Burkina Faso yesterday after the media body to which they belong denounced attacks on freedom of expression under the country's military rulers, the association said.

The Journalists' Association of Burkina Faso said on Facebook that its president Guezouma Sano and deputy president Boukari Ouoba were detained at a national press centre in the capital Ouagadougou and taken to an unknown destination.

Burkina has seen numerous kidnappings of people viewed as critical of the junta under its chief Ibrahim Traore since he led a coup in 2022.

In remarks to the association's congress on Friday, Sanogo criticised "attacks on the freedom of expression and the press", saying that they had "reached an unprecedented level".

Other journalists spoke at the congress of the abductions of seven colleagues last year, some of whom are still missing.

Media rights group Reporters Without Borders (RSF) demanded the authorities "make known where they are detained" and "release them without delay" in a statement sent to AFP.

The style of arrest - by individuals presenting themselves as intelligence police - "resembles numerous other arrests and abductions organised by the military authorities since their arrival in power", said RSF's sub-Saharan Africa director, Sadibou Marong.

Last week, a political group said five of its members including a journalist had been abducted after the group denounced civilian massacres blamed on the army and allied militias.

The group, SENS, had criticised videos posted on social media over the past week showing dozens of bloodied bodies with hands and feet bound, many of them appearing to be women, children or elderly.

Burkinabe authorities have denied the accusations of mass killings by its soldiers and allied militias.

International non-governmental organisations (NGOs), including RSF and Amnesty International have condemned several of the kidnappings of journalists.

RSF said in its statement yesterday that the arrests were "part of a strategy aiming to systematically silence all critical voices in the country".

NGOs have also reported cases of people being forcibly recruited into the security forces to be sent to fight religious militants, following a mobilisation order in 2023.

The campaigners say the order targets figures critical of the country's leaders.

The military authorities in Burkina Faso have also suspended several international media organisations, accusing them of publishing false information about the conflict. - AFP

## Tunisia probes ride-hailing apps for money laundering

Tunisia has launched an investigation into alleged money laundering and tax fraud involving ride-hailing applications, the interior ministry said yesterday. Authorities also said that they are suspending the apps.

"The financial division of the National Guard has uncovered suspicions of money laundering and tax evasion among operators of private taxi ride-hailing apps," the ministry said in a statement.

The statement did not name the apps, but a source familiar with the matter told AFP the main company under scrutiny was the Estonia-based Bolt.

The ride-hailing app, operating in more than 500 cities from over 45 countries, is widely used in Tunisia, where public transport infrastructure is inadequate.

Tunisian authorities said they have seized about 12mn dinars (\$3.8mn) from accounts linked to multiple ride-hailing apps. They said the companies had been removed from the commercial registry and their offices shut for allegedly operating without proper licences and using fraudulent authorisations.

They were also accused of using bank accounts to illegally funnel funds abroad. - AFP

## Bosnian community in Qatar provides over 1,000 Iftar meals to workers

The Bosnian community in Qatar has provided over 1,000 Iftar meals to workers in the Abu Nakhla area, in collaboration with Wahab, a local organisation devoted to minimising food waste and promoting sustainability.

"Ramadan teaches us the importance of empathy, kindness, and community," Dr Vahid Suljic, a founding member of the Bosnian community initiative, said in a statement.

"We are honoured to contribute to a country that has embraced us, and we hope to pass on that warmth to others," he said.

"Qatar's welcoming, multicultural spirit encourages us to grow not only as individuals but as a community," Suljic added. "It inspires a collective sense of purpose - where acts of kindness multiply and everyone feels seen, supported, and empowered."

# East Congo ceasefire in trouble as rebels stay in strategic town

A de facto ceasefire between Congolese forces and Rwandan-backed rebels in the eastern Democratic Republic of the Congo (DR Congo) town of Walikale appeared to have broken down yesterday, with the rebels going back on a pledge to withdraw and accusing the army of violating its own commitments.

The prospect of a ceasefire in the strategic town of Walikale, which the M23 rebels captured last week, had briefly fuelled hopes of reviving stalled diplomatic efforts to resolve eastern DR Congo's biggest conflict in decades.

The conflict, rooted in the long fallout from the 1994 genocide in Rwanda and competition for control of mineral riches, has led to rebel control of eastern DR Congo's two largest cities, thousands of deaths and fears of a wider regional war.

However, less than 48 hours after the rebels announced their intention to withdraw from Walikale and DR Congo's army responded by saying it would refrain from attacking them, the arrangement risked going the way of a string of prior failed ceasefires.

Lawrence Kanyuka, the spokesperson for M23's Congo River Alliance (AFC) rebel coalition, accused the army and allied militias of not withdrawing their attack drones from Walikale.

"This situation delays the repositioning of AFC/M23 forces in the zone," he wrote

on X. "It should be noted that this act constitutes a major obstacle to respecting the ceasefire and thus compromises peace initiatives underway."

Army spokespeople did not immediately respond to requests for comment.

Residents of Walikale, which marked the farthest west M23 had reached since escalating their offensive in January, said rebel fighters were still in town yesterday morning.

"They haven't moved. They are still visible in the centre of town," said one, speaking

on condition of anonymity.

Attempts to bring the DR Congo and the rebels to the negotiating table have repeatedly failed.

The two sides were scheduled to hold direct talks for the first time in Angola last week after Kinshasa dropped its longstanding refusal to speak to the rebels, but M23 then pulled out in protest of European Union sanctions against its leaders and Rwandan officials.

Angola meanwhile said yesterday that it was pulling back from efforts to mediate in

the conflict and that another African state would take its place.

President Joao Lourenco, the current chairperson of the African Union (AU), had been trying to facilitate a lasting ceasefire but his office said in a statement that Angola needed to devote itself more to the AU's overall priorities.

Lourenco was named mediator by the AU in 2022 in an attempt to pacify the protracted conflict in mineral-rich eastern DR Congo.

"Angola recognises the need to free itself from the responsibility of mediating this conflict ... in order to more comprehensively focus on the general priorities established by the continental organisation," the presidency said in a statement.

The southern African country took up the rotating presidency of the AU two months ago.

Luanda added that "necessary steps" would be taken with the AU Commission to "find the country whose head of state ... should take over the mediation".

"Angola has always believed in the need for direct negotiations between the DR Congo government and the M23," the presidency said.

The DR Congo, the United Nations and Western countries all accuse Rwanda of providing arms and troops to the ethnic Tutsi-led M23.

Rwanda denies supporting M23 and says its military has been acting in self-defence against the DR Congo army and a militia founded by perpetrators of the 1994 genocide.

## S Africa, DR Congo discuss boosting 'defence capabilities'

The Democratic Republic of the Congo (DR Congo)'s defence minister began a visit to South Africa yesterday aimed at strengthening "strategic defence capabilities" between the two countries, South Africa's government said.

The visit, due to last until Thursday, comes against the backdrop of an escalating conflict in the mineral-rich east of the DR Congo, where South African troops deployed with a mission of the Southern African Development Community (SADC) have suffered severe losses.

"This visit aims to further strengthen and enhance the longstanding bilateral defence relations between South Africa and the DR Congo," South Africa's defence ministry said in a statement.

The talks between Congolese Defence Minister Guy Kabombo Muadiamvita and his South African counterpart Angie Mot-

shegwa will focus on "key areas of defence cooperation and bolstering strategic defence capabilities", it added.

The partnership is "crucial for fostering peace, security and stability across the region", the ministry said.

Fourteen South African soldiers were killed in January in eastern DR Congo, where the Rwanda-backed M23 armed group has launched a lightning offensive, seizing large swathes of land and key cities.

Most of the soldiers were from the SADC mission sent in December 2023 to help the government of the DR Congo - also a SADC member - to restore peace and security.

At least two of the troops killed were deployed as part of a separate United Nations peacekeeping force.

Following the deaths, a row erupted between South African President Cyril Ramaphosa and his Rwandan counterpart Paul

Kagame, with the latter tweeting that the southern African troops were "not a peace-keeping force" but were "engaging in offensive combat operations to help the DR Congo government".

"If South Africa prefers confrontation, Rwanda will deal with the matter in that context any day," Kagame posted on X.

The SADC announced mid-March that it would end its military deployment, of which the bulk of the troops are from South Africa.

On March 18, Qatar unexpectedly announced it had hosted the Rwandan and Congolese presidents for talks in which they "reaffirmed the commitment of all parties to an immediate and unconditional ceasefire".

However, despite the announcement, the M23 last week took control of the mining hub of Walikale, the farthest west the group has advanced into the interior of the DR Congo since 2012. - AFP

## 'Bandits' kill 10 members of militia backed by Nigeria govt

Criminal gangs in northwest Nigeria's Zamfara state killed at least 10 members of government-backed militia forces in an ambush at the weekend, the state governor said.

Zamfara is one of several states in northwestern and central Nigeria terrorised by criminal gangs - called bandits by locals - who raid villages and kill and abduct residents across the country's rural hinterlands, where government presence, infrastructure and security has long been scarce.

Last year, Zamfara state government set up the Zamfara Community Guards, comprising 5,200 personnel to secure communities.

The militia members were returning from a "hugely successful" joint operation with military troops against bandits in their Sunke forest stronghold in Anka district when they fell into an ambush, Dauda Lawal Dare, Zamfara state governor said in a statement.

"On their way back from the operation ... they were ambushed by bandits in Bagega village where they killed six community protection guards and four vigilantes," Dare said.

Vigilante groups, unlike the community guards, are unpaid volunteers.

Three militiamen were still missing, Dare said.

A large number of bandits were killed and a huge arsenal was recovered in the Sunke forest raid, he added.

Nigeria's various bandit gangs, who maintain camps in a huge forest straddling Zamfara, Katsina, Kaduna and Niger states, are notorious for mass kidnappings.

In January, 21 government militiamen were killed in an ambush by bandits in neighbouring Katsina state while returning from a condolence visit to the family of their dead colleague.

In 2023, Katsina state established Katsina Community Watch Corps (KCWC) comprising around 2,000 militia members to assist the military and police in fighting bandits. - AFP

## South Sudan suffers worst cholera outbreak in 20 years: Unicef

South Sudan is suffering its worst cholera outbreak since it became an independent nation in 2011, the United Nations warned yesterday, reporting almost 700 deaths in six months, including many children.

The organisation's children's fund Unicef said that 40,000 cholera cases were reported from the end of September to March 18, "including 694 deaths country-wide, its worst outbreak in 20 years".

"This is the worst outbreak South Sudan as an independent country has ever faced," Unicef emergency specialist Verity Rushton told AFP, speaking from the capital Juba.

Half the cases were children under 15 years old, the Unicef said, with Rushton adding that "a third of the deaths that have been reported are children under the age of 14".

Deeply impoverished despite its major oil deposits, the nation has been plagued by insecurity since declaring independence.

Parts of the country have lately seen fresh waves of violence, with clashes between forces allied to President Salva Kiir and his long-time rival, First Vice-President Riek Machar, displacing tens of thousands.

Of South Sudan's 10 states, Rushton said, nine have been impacted by cholera with the majority of cases in Jonglei in the east.

South Sudan and Angola face the most severe of several outbreaks across eastern and southern Africa, the agency said.

Angola reported over 7,500 cases, including 294 deaths, from January 7 to March 18, the Unicef said, warning there were "high risks for further escalation".

Doctors Without Borders (MSF) warned yesterday that cholera was spreading rapidly as people in South Sudan fled for safety.

The medical charity has treated 400 cholera patients in one county alone in Upper Nile State in the northeast, it said, warning the disease had spread to neighbouring Jonglei state where the MSF runs a 100-bed treatment unit.

"With cholera spreading rapidly and violence ongoing, the need for medical care in Upper Nile State is more critical than ever," said Zakaria Mwaria, MSF head of mission in South Sudan.

Earlier this month, the UN Office for the

Co-ordination of Humanitarian Affairs (OCHA) in South Sudan said that 50,000 people had been displaced since February as violence flared in Upper Nile State.

It said a cholera treatment unit in the state's Nasir county had closed, with 23 humanitarian workers forced to leave.

The region has been the main focus of clashes that threaten a fragile power-sharing agreement between Kiir and Machar.

South Sudan has seen a steady increase in cholera over the past three years.

It is an acute form of diarrhoea that is treatable with antibiotics and hydration, but can be deadly if untreated.

In 2022, the country suffered its first cholera resurgence in five years, following an outbreak between June 2016 and December 2017 that killed 436 people.

## 12 prisoners escape in early morning jailbreak in central Nigeria

Twelve prisoners escaped in an early morning jailbreak in central Nigeria yesterday, authorities said.

The escape is the latest in a country where old infrastructure

and overcrowding are often faulted for such incidents, although Femi Fanwo, the Kogi State Commissioner for Information, blamed the breakout on "internal compromise and collaboration".

The circumstances surrounding the escape, including reports suggesting that the inmates fled through the tower without caus-

ing structural damage to the facility, raise serious concerns that necessitate a thorough investigation," Fanwo said in a statement.

One of the prisoners has been apprehended, he said.

With deteriorating infrastructure and an overpopulation rate of 147%, according to the UN, many prisons in the west African nation

are vulnerable to escapes. The UN blames excessive use of pre-trial detention for the overcrowding, with prisoners often waiting years before their trials are held.

Earlier this month, Interior Minister Olubunmi Tunji-Ojo said that some 4,000 prisoners

were pardoned in 2024 to help ease congestion in the prisons and cut government spending.

Yesterday Tunji-Ojo ordered an investigation into the Kogi state jailbreak.

Last year, nearly 120 people escaped after torrential rains brought down buildings and a perimeter wall in Suleja prison, near the capital, Abuja.



## Trump takes challenge to judge's rehiring order to Supreme Court

President Donald Trump's administration brought its bid to purge the federal workforce to the US Supreme Court yesterday, challenging a judicial directive to rehire thousands of fired government employees and arguing that the judge overstepped his authority.

The Justice Department in a filing asked the Supreme Court to block a March 13 order by San Francisco-based US District Judge William Alsup for six federal agencies to reinstate thousands of probationary – meaning recently hired – employees dismissed as part of Trump's campaign to downsize and reshape the government.

The judge faulted the administration for improperly terminating en masse the probationary workers and cast doubt on the

justification presented by the government that the firings were the result of poor employee performance.

In its filing, the Justice Department said that Alsup's order lets the plaintiffs in the case "hijack the employment relationship between the federal government and its workforce" violating the separation of power between the judiciary and executive branches of the government.

These two branches as well as the legislative branch – Congress – were established as coequal in the US Constitution in order to provide checks and balances to the power they wield.

"This court should stop the ongoing assault on the constitutional structure before further damage is wrought," the department added.

Probationary workers typically have less than one year of service in their current roles, though some are longtime federal

employees serving in new roles.

They have fewer job protections than other government workers, but in general can be fired only for poor job performance.

The actions by the judge represented a significant blow for a high-profile effort by Trump and billionaire adviser Elon Musk to drastically shrink the federal bureaucracy.

Unions, nonprofit groups and the state of Washington claimed that the US Office of Personnel Management (OPM) exceeded its authority for the mass firings.

Alsup, an appointee of Democratic former president Bill Clinton, agreed.

"It is a sad day when our government would fire some good employee and say it was based on performance when they know good and well that's a lie," he said.

Alsup's ruling applied to probationary employees at the US Department of Defence, Department of Veterans Affairs,

Department of Agriculture, Department of Energy, Department of Interior and the Treasury Department.

In a separate case, a Baltimore-based federal judge ordered the administration to reinstate probationary workers at 18 federal agencies, including the Environmental Protection Agency, the Consumer Financial Protection Bureau and the US Agency for International Development, in a lawsuit brought by 20 Democratic-led states.

Trump, US Attorney-General Pam Bondi and other members of his administration have accused federal judges who have issued orders impeding the Republican president's actions of judicial overreach at the expense of presidential authority.

Trump last week called for impeachment by Congress of the judge presiding over a legal challenge to deportation flights, drawing a rebuke from US Chief Justice John Roberts.

Trump has also called for an end to nationwide injunctions.

"If Justice Roberts and the United States Supreme Court do not fix this toxic and unprecedented situation IMMEDIATELY, our Country is in very serious trouble!" Trump wrote in that post.

The Justice Department told the Supreme Court in yesterday's filing that lower courts have issued more than 40 judicial orders impeding its policies "without sufficient regard for limits on their own jurisdiction or to defects in plaintiffs' representations about the law and the underlying facts".

"This situation is unsustainable," the filing stated.

Trump, along with Musk, has moved to eliminate thousands of federal jobs, dismantle agencies and remove the heads of independent agencies despite congressionally authorised job protections as he seeks to remake the federal government.

## Conservatives target Trump as Canada campaign kicks off

Canada's Conservative leader Pierre Poilievre argued yesterday that he is the strongest candidate to take on US President Donald Trump, whose annexation and tariff threats have shaken the once promising chances of a Tory-led government.

The leading candidates ahead of Canada's April 28 election fanned out on the first full day of campaigning in a vote certain to be dominated by Trump.

Liberal leader and Prime Minister Mark Carney, who replaced Justin Trudeau earlier this month, was in the eastern province of Newfoundland, saying that Canadians needed to view the United States as "a friendship lost".

Trump's return, while potentially devastating for Canada's economy, appears to have boosted the Liberals, with several polls showing them as a slight favourite, a stunning turnaround from early January when the Conservatives looked headed for a landslide.

Poilievre built significant support as a relentless critic of an unpopular Trudeau government, but Trump's return and Trudeau's departure have forced the Conservatives to pivot.

Flanked by his wife and two young children at a packaging plant outside Toronto, Poilievre fought back against perceptions that Carney was the better counter to Trump.

"There's a reason why Donald Trump wants the weak, out of touch Liberals in power. They have handed him control of our economy," Poilievre said, an apparent reference to Trump's recent comment that he would "rather deal with a liberal" in Canada.

"I know that people are scared, they feel threatened ... and now they are facing these unjustified threats from President Trump who quite frankly needs to knock it off," Poilievre said.

He pledged tax cuts to boost the economy so Canada can "confront Donald Trump and the Americans from a position of strength".

Political analysts have argued that Poilievre may need to re-centre the campaign on non-Trump issues that made the Liberals vulnerable after a decade in power, like soaring housing costs.

However, given Trump's primacy in Canadian politics, Poilievre has increasingly taken aim at the president.

### Carney says he's 'available' for call with Trump, but on Canada's terms

Canadian Prime Minister Mark Carney said yesterday that he is available for a call with US President Donald Trump but would do so "on our terms as a sovereign country".

Carney was elected leader of the ruling Liberal Party on March 9, automatically becoming prime minister.

Calls with the US president traditionally take place soon afterwards but the two men have yet to speak.

"I'm available for a call, but you know, we're going to talk on our terms as a sovereign country, not as what he pretends we are," Carney told reporters in Newfoundland on the second day of a general election campaign.

Trump has threatened tariffs on Canadian exports and often muses about annexing Canada, comments which Carney says are disrespectful and unhelpful.

Carney also said he assumed Trump is waiting to see the result before calling the winner. - **Reuters**

Trump's dominance is unhelpful.

"This threat from the south has diverted too much attention," she told AFP in a parking lot outside the Poilievre event.

"Who ever heard of a state the size of Canada ... come on, be real," she said, praising the Conservative leader for focusing on the challenges people face trying to "make it through the week".

Carney, who previously led the central banks in Canada and England, has tried to position himself as a departure from Trudeau and a seasoned economic crisis manager.

He spoke yesterday in Gander, a town that sheltered thousands of Americans whose trans-Atlantic flights were abruptly forced to land there after the September 11 attacks.

"Canadians did extraordinary things for Americans when they needed it. Now, we need to do extraordinary things for ourselves," he said. "In this crisis caused by the US president and those who are enabling him, we lament a friendship lost, or at least a friendship strained."

In a jab at Poilievre, who Liberals charge is ideologically aligned with Trump, Carney said that the president is watching to see if the next

prime minister will be someone "who's in sync with him, or is it someone who will stand up for Canadians".

Carney, Poilievre and other party leaders will face off in two debates – one French, one English – on April 16 and 17.

Trump has threatened, withdrawn and imposed a dizzying array of tariffs on Canadian goods, with more levies expected next week, triggering a trade war economists say could plunge Canada into a recession.

His tariffs and repeated threats to turn Canada into the 51st US state, combined with Trudeau's departure have upended Canadian politics.

On January 6, the day Trudeau announced his plans to resign, the Liberals held 20.1% support with the Conservatives at 44.2%, according to aggregated polling data from the public broadcaster CBC.

Yesterday the Liberals were at 37.8% and the Tories stood at 37.2%.

The data shows the Carney-led Liberals have eaten into support for the left-wing New Democrats, whom progressives may not trust to take on Trump.

## Colombia's lonely chimp Yoko finds new home in Brazil

Kidnapped from his family as an infant, then raised by a drug lord before ending up in a Colombian zoo, Yoko the chimpanzee has lived the last two years of his life alone.

He lost his last friend, Chita, in 2023 when she escaped from the zoo with Pancho – Yoko's rival – and the pair was shot dead by soldiers out of human safety concerns.

On Sunday, 38-year-old Yoko was flown to Brazil to finally join others of his kind at a sanctuary there.

However, will he make friends?

Yoko is in many ways more human than chimp, his caregivers say.

He uses a knife and fork, plays ball, watches television and makes artwork with crayons on paper and canvas. He is fond of eating sweets and chicken.

Fed junk food by his captor – a narco trafficker whose name has not been divulged – Yoko has only four of his teeth left.

Chimps, like humans, are meant to have 32.

It was common for narco bosses such as Pablo Escobar in the 1990s to keep exotic animals as pets, including tigers and lions, and even hippos and giraffes.

Yoko was taught to smoke and dress up in human clothes – causing him to develop a skin disease and lose part of his fur.

"Yoko ... is a highly humanised chimpanzee, the degree of tamedness is very high ... he basically behaves like a child," said veterinarian Javier Guerrero.

The vet accompanied Yoko on the first part of his journey, dubbed "Operation Noah's Ark" from UKumari Biopark, a zoo in the Colombian city of Pereira.

Experts fear that Yoko may find it hard to adapt to life with other chimpanzees at Sorocaba in the Brazilian state of Sao Paulo – the largest great ape sanctuary in Latin America.

There are more than 40 other chimps there, but vets and animal behaviourists worry Yoko may not fit in.

"Yoko ... is not a chimpanzee in the strict sense ... he is an animal that identifies much more with human beings," said Cesar Gomez, UKumari's animal training co-ordinator.

"To give you an example, a smile is something positive" for humans, "but for chimpanzees it is something negative and Yoko does not understand these types of communication," he said.

Yoko was seized from his owner's lair by police in 2017 after spending an unknown amount of time there, then taken to a refuge that flooded before he became a resident of the Pereira zoo.

"He was denied the chance to be a chimpanzee and grow up with his family," assistant vet Alejandra Marin told AFP.

In the wild in their natural home in Africa, chimpanzees die at about 40 or 45 years of age.

They are social, group animals, and with good care in captivity, they can live up to 60.

The chimpanzee is listed as an endangered species by the International Union for Conservation of Nature.

With Yoko's transfer on Sunday, Colombia became the first country in the world to rid itself of entirely captive great apes, said the Great Ape Project, an non-governmental organisation (NGO).

"The great apes are chimpanzees, orangutans, gorillas, and bonobos – none of these species are endemic to our country, and they have no reason to be here," said Andrea Padilla, a Colombian senator of the Green Alliance who oversaw Yoko's "deeply symbolic" transfer.

"From a very young age, Yoko was a victim of trafficking and trade, passed from one drug trafficker to another," she added.

Padilla posted on X yesterday morning that Yoko had landed in Brazil, and was "safe and sound and about to start a new life with his peers".

## 23andMe files for bankruptcy

Pioneering US genetic testing company 23andMe has filed for bankruptcy and is looking for a buyer two years after hackers gained access to millions of profiles.

23andMe, which sells a mail-back saliva test to determine ancestry or certain health-related genetic traits for less than \$200, said late on Sunday that it had "filed a voluntary petition for re-organisation" with a state bankruptcy court in Missouri.

At its height years ago, the DNA testing craze saw millions of consumers rushing to discover their ancestry and health information with tests from 23andMe becoming popular holiday gifts.

The Silicon Valley-based company, which went public in 2021, claims 15mm customers and has seen its sales decline as the test-taking craze faded and the company suffered a data breach.

23andMe said that it rejected a takeover offer from its co-founder and chief executive Anne Wojcicki who has resigned from her position but will remain on the company's board of directors, according to the statement.

On X, Wojcicki posted that "While I am disappointed that we have come to this conclusion and my bid was rejected, I am supportive of the company and I intend to be a bidder".

Wojcicki, who co-founded 23andMe 19 years ago, acknowledged the company's challenges but emphasised her "unwavering" belief in its future.

With the bankruptcy announcement, Geoffrey Fowler, a tech columnist for the Washington Post warned: "If you're one of the 15mm people who shared your DNA with 23andMe, it's time to delete your data."

He cited the risk "that your data could get sold or transferred to a new company, which might want to use it for new purposes" - **AP**

**UK detects first case of bird flu in a sheep**

Bird flu has been detected in a sheep in northern England, the first known case of its kind in the world, Britain's government said, adding to the growing list of mammals infected by the disease and fuelling fears of a pandemic. Many different mammals have died of the H5N1 bird flu virus across the globe including bears, cats, dairy cows, dogs, dolphins, seals and tigers. "The case was identified following routine surveillance of farmed livestock on a premises in Yorkshire where the highly pathogenic avian influenza (H5N1) had been confirmed in other captive birds," Britain's government said in a statement.

## AVIATION

**Heathrow defends decision to shut airport**

Britain's Heathrow defended its decision to shut down operations at Europe's busiest airport last Friday as the blame game intensified over an 18-hour closure. As questions mounted over how such a critical part of Britain's infrastructure could fail and whether all Heathrow's four terminals needed to shut, both National Grid and Heathrow agreed that the failure of the transformer was an unprecedented event. But the airport was forced to defend its closure after the boss of National Grid told the *Financial Times* that the electricity transmission network remained capable of providing power to the airport throughout the crisis.

**Japan, China in new spat after three-way talks**

Japan and China became embroiled in a spat with Tokyo accusing Beijing of misrepresenting its position after weekend talks also involving South Korea. The discussions in Tokyo were billed as a chance to improve historically frosty relations. But Japan took exception to a Chinese statement that Prime Minister Shigeru Ishiba told Chinese Foreign Minister Wang Yi that he "respects the positions elaborated by the Chinese side". Chief government spokesman Yoshimasa Hayashi said Japan had "protested to the Chinese side... and asked to immediately remove the inaccurate statement".

**Myanmar clinic air strike kills 11 including doctor**

A Myanmar junta air strike on a remote village medical clinic killed 11 people including a doctor and his wife, locals said. A 2021 military coup has plunged Myanmar into a civil war between the junta, anti-coup guerillas and ethnic armed groups. Locals said the air strike hit the village of Hnan Khar in the western region of Magway, in a zone currently held by anti-coup forces. A spokesman for Myanmar's military could not be reached for comment. "It flew very low and I heard a loud bomb blast when we were hiding," said a villager. "When I went to clear up the area I saw only pieces of human bodies," he added.

# UN seeks nearly \$1bn in aid for Rohingya refugees in Bangladesh

The United Nations yesterday announced it was seeking nearly \$1bn to provide life-saving aid this year for some 1.5mn Rohingya refugees and their hosts in Bangladesh.

The UN and more than 100 partners launched a two-year 2025-26 Joint Response Plan for the Rohingya crisis, amid what it called "dwindling financial resources and competing global crises".

The appeal seeks \$934.5mn in its first year to reach some 1.48mn people including Rohingya refugees and host communities. Around a million members of the persecuted and mostly Muslim minority live in squalid relief camps in Bangladesh, most of whom arrived after fleeing the 2017 military crackdown in neighbouring Myanmar. "In its eighth year, the Rohingya humanitarian crisis remains largely out of the international spotlight, but needs remain urgent," the UN said in a statement. Launching the appeal in Geneva, UN migration agency chief Amy Pope said drastic foreign aid cuts were putting lives on the line.

US President Donald Trump imposed a freeze on foreign aid in January pending a review, after which Washington announced the cancellation of 83% of programmes at the US Agency for International Development (USAID).

"If we face cuts as organisations, the Rohingya don't eat, or they don't

have protection, or they don't have basic life-saving needs met," Pope said.

She said the international community had failed to create the conditions whereby the Rohingyas would be able to go home safely.

"If we do not provide other options for the Rohingyas, we are leaving them completely dependent on humanitarian aid. And so cutting that aid, without giving them other options, means that people will die," she said. "When you deprive people of hope and opportunity, you create conditions for more despair," added Pope, and "the problem gets much, much worse".

The overcrowded settlements around Cox's Bazar in Bangladesh are reliant on aid and suffer from widespread malnutrition.

UN chief Antonio Guterres visited the area earlier this month, in a show of solidarity.

Khalilur Rahman, Bangladesh's high representative on Rohingya issues, said he was cautiously optimistic that a cessation of hostilities in neighbouring Rakhine State in Myanmar – a pre-requisite for the return of refugees – was now "within the realm of possibility".

The Arakan Army, an ethnic minority rebel group in Myanmar, is engaged in a fierce fight with the military for control of Rakhine, where it has seized swathes of territory in the past year.

His Sunday performance in Mumbai included a parody song referring to Eknath Shinde, the number two figure in the state government, as a "traitor". Soon after the show finished, supporters from Shinde's Shiv Sena party stormed The Habitat comedy venue and began wreaking havoc.

Footage widely shared on social media showed dozens of men throwing chairs, smashing light fittings and breaking apart paintings mounted on the wall. At least 20 people were being sought in relation to the vandalism at the club, local media reported.

# S Korea court reinstates impeached PM as acting president

South Korea's Constitutional Court yesterday reinstated Prime Minister Han Duck-soo to the post of acting president, striking down his impeachment as he pledged to focus on steering Asia's fourth-biggest economy through a US "trade war".

The ruling, which comes amid months of political turmoil in the country, returns Han to power immediately. He took over as acting leader from President Yoon Suk-yeol, who was impeached over his imposition of martial law in De-

cember. "I believe the people are making it very clear, in one voice, that the extreme confrontation in politics must stop," said Han, who thanked the court for its "wise decision" and the cabinet for their hard work while he was suspended.

"As acting president, I will do my best to maintain stable state administration, and devote all wisdom and capabilities to safeguard national interests in the trade war," Han said in televised comments.

South Korea, one of the world's top exporters, has been bracing for the potential impact of a range of threatened tariffs under US President Donald Trump.

South Korea has already seen

US tariffs on steel and aluminium and has been seeking an exemption from reciprocal US tariffs next month. Earlier this month, Trump singled out South Korea for applying high tariffs on US exports.

Yoon's martial law declaration plunged the key US military ally into its greatest political crisis in decades, and sparked a leadership vacuum amid spiralling impeachments, resignations, and criminal indictments for a range of top officials.

Han had initially lasted less than two weeks in the post and was impeached and suspended on December 27 after clashing with the opposition-led parliament by refusing to appoint three more jus-

tices to the Constitutional Court.

The justices on the court ruled yesterday seven to one to strike down the impeachment.

Finance Minister Choi Sang-mok had assumed the position of acting president while the cases of Yoon and Han were before the Constitutional Court.

Han, 75, had served in leadership positions for more than three decades under five presidents, both conservative and liberal.

In a country sharply divided by partisan rhetoric, Han is a rare example of an official whose varied career transcended party lines.

Still, the opposition-led parliament accused him of not doing

enough to thwart Yoon's decision to declare martial law, an accusation he denied.

Lee Jae-myung, head of the opposition Democratic Party, urged the Constitutional Court to swiftly make a decision on President Yoon's impeachment.

The court is expected to rule within days. Yoon also faces a separate criminal trial on charges of leading a revolt by declaring martial law. If Yoon is removed, a new presidential election will be held within 60 days. "The court's continued delay in ruling is fuelling concern and conflict," said Lee, who opinion polls suggest would win an election if Yoon is removed.

South Korea has seen huge, mostly peaceful, rallies both in support of Yoon and calling for his removal in recent months. Lim Ji-bong, a law professor at Sogang University, said he expects the court to remove Yoon. The justices will want to show they can be "united to make a bold decision to stop deepening national divisions," he said.

The unexpected imposition of martial law on December 3 and the ensuing political upheaval sent shockwaves through South Korea, and raised concern among allies such as the US under former president Joe Biden, who had seen Yoon as a key partner in efforts to counter China and North Korea.

## Top Asian countries may struggle to fill aid gap left by US

China is best placed to replace the United States as a key foreign donor in Asia but may be reluctant to fully fill the void, while South Korea and Japan may struggle to give enough, experts said.

From critical maternal healthcare to funding disaster relief, life-saving projects in Asia hang in the balance after President Donald Trump paused foreign aid and moved to dismantle the US Agency for International Development (USAID).

While China is the world's second-largest economy, its foreign assistance looks very different from that of the United States, as Beijing primarily provides loans that need to be paid back and focuses on infrastructure projects, experts said.

"China is very unlikely to step up to fill gaps in areas such as democracy promotion, media freedom, civil society or women's rights," said Melissa Conley Tyler, executive director of Asia-Pacific Development & Defence Dialogue, a think tank in Australia.

"It is vital that other donors don't let these vital areas be a casualty of the US foreign assistance cuts."

The United States disbursed a total of \$56bn globally in foreign assistance in 2024, \$32.48bn of which was managed through USAID, US government data showed.

About \$7bn of the United States' total global foreign aid in 2024 was given to South, Central, and East Asia, as well as Oceania, the data showed.

While China does not make its foreign aid data readily available, the Lowy Institute said in its 2023 report that China disbursed about \$5.5bn a year in official development finance (ODF) to Southeast Asia between 2015 and 2021, three-quarters of which went to infrastructure.

democracy, health, or education," said Dayant.

The report said "China has been Southeast Asia's single largest source of official development finance" but that its financing has been in decline in recent years.

Experts said South Korea and Japan could also step up to help, but that they would need to substantially increase their aid budgets to make a difference.

Once a foreign aid recipient, South Korea had an official development assistance (ODA) budget of \$4.8bn in 2024 – a record for the country – and aims to more than double that by 2030, according to the Organisation for Economic Co-operation and Development (OECD).

"South Korea has been stepping up its efforts as an aid provider in recent years and its income level should enable them to do even more," said Ian Mitchell, senior policy fellow at the Center for Global Development (CGD), a think tank.

But South Korea and Japan's combined aid budgets were over \$22bn in 2023, OECD data showed. That was less than a third of the \$80bn the United States said it spent on foreign assistance that year.

"So replacing US support would require a substantial increase," said Mitchell, adding that Japan's aid efforts were already focused on the region.

While China's priorities differ from those of the United States, some said China would not miss the opportunity to gain more influence in the region.

"In the past, its assistance had mostly come in loans to help other countries build various types of projects, but I think China will dramatically increase grants across Asia – it is an obvious opportunity for China to further diminish the United States' influence in the region," said Joshua Kurlantzick, senior fellow at the Council on Foreign Relations.

Mitchell said there were already some signs that China is breaking new ground.

"China acknowledged that it provided climate finance for the first time last year; and this may signal it is more comfortable being seen as a provider of development support," he said. – Reuters



We will continue to expand high-standard opening up, and share the vast opportunities of Chinese modernisation with all countries. We will safeguard the multilateral free trade system, foster an open, inclusive and non-discriminatory environment for international co-operation, and advance a universally beneficial and inclusive economic globalisation.

In the West, they say, "There are no eternal friends, only permanent interests." But we in China believe that friends should be permanent and we should pursue common interests. President Xi Jinping has proposed building a community with a shared future for mankind, and called on all countries to transcend disagreements and differences, jointly protect our only planet, and develop together the global village as our common home.

China is naturally a member of the Global South, because we have fought colonialism and hegemonies together in history and we are committed to the common goal of development and revitalisation. No matter how the world changes, our heart will always be with the Global South, and our root will grow deeper in the Global South. China will work with all Global South countries to add a new chapter to the annals of the history of the world.

### China is a sincere friend of our Arab brothers and will resolutely support for peace and stability in the Middle East

The Palestinian question has always been at the heart of the Middle East issue. The Palestinian-Israeli conflict takes place again and again simply because the two-State solution is only half achieved: The State of Israel has long been a reality, but the State of Palestine is still far beyond reach. Going forward, the international community should focus more on the two-State solution and give more support to independent statehood for Palestine. Only then could Palestine and Israel truly coexist in peace, and the Arab and Jewish peoples live side by side in enduring amity.

Gaza belongs to the Palestinian people. It is an inseparable part of the Palestinian territory. Changing its status by forceful means will not bring about peace, but only new chaos. We support the plan for restoring peace in Gaza initiated by Egypt and other Arab countries. The will of the people must not be defied, and the principle of justice must not be abandoned.

If some major country truly cares about the people in Gaza, it should promote comprehensive and lasting ceasefire, ramp up humanitarian assistance, observe the principle of Palestinians governing Palestine, and contribute to the reconstruction in Gaza.

China is a strategic partner of Middle East countries. We will continue to strive resolutely for justice, peace and development for the Middle East people, and

support countries in the region in taking their future in their own hands, independently exploring their development paths, and realising the dream of peace and revitalisation at an early date.

### China will realise reunification and this is unstoppable

Taiwan is an inalienable part of China's territory. This is the history and the reality. This year marks the 80th anniversary of the recovery of Taiwan. Both the Cairo Declaration and the Potsdam Proclamation, issued by major victorious nations of WWII, stated in explicit terms that Taiwan is a territory that shall be restored to China. All these have confirmed China's sovereignty over Taiwan, and formed an important part of the post-WWII international order.

Resolution 2758 adopted in 1971 by the UN General Assembly with an overwhelming majority decides to restore all the lawful rights of the People's Republic of China at the UN and expel forthwith the representatives of the Taiwan authorities from the UN and all the organisations related to it.

The only reference to the Taiwan region in the UN is "Taiwan, Province of China." Taiwan is never a country, not in the past, and never in the future. ## Mainland Europe's first orbital rocket launch postponed

**A** German start-up yesterday postponed a test flight of its Spectrum rocket from Norway's Andoya Spaceport in the Arctic, seen as a key step in Europe's new space economy.

The Munich-based company Isar Aerospace said in a statement it had cancelled yesterday's flight "due to unfavourable winds" and that it was working to find a new launch date.

A re-scheduled launch would be the first flight of an orbital launch vehicle from the European continent, excluding Russia.

It would also be Europe's first flight financed almost exclusively by private actors.

Measuring 28 metres high and two metres in diameter, with a payload capacity of one tonne, the Spectrum will not carry any cargo on its first launch, nor is it expected to reach orbit.

"Every second we fly is good, because we collect data and experience. Thirty seconds would already be a great success," said Daniel Metzler, co-founder and chief executive of Isar Aerospace.

"We do not expect to reach orbit with this test. In fact, no company has yet managed to put its first orbital launch vehicle into orbit," he said ahead of the planned launch attempt.

Europe has had no access to Russian space stations and launchers since Moscow's full-scale invasion of Ukraine in February 2022.

Its space industry has also seen delays in the development of the Ariane 6 rocket and the suspension of the European Vega-C satellite launcher after an accident.

It wasn't until March 6, when the first commercial flight of an Ariane 6 rocket took off from Kourou in French Guyana, that Europe was able to regain its own space independence after several months without its own access to space.

While the US already has giants such as Musk's SpaceX and Blue Origin, "New Space" – commercial space activities driven by private companies – is still in its infancy in Europe.


The Spectrum launch "is the first real and serious attempt in Europe to have a New Space launcher," said Maxime Puteaux, a consultant at Novaspace.

Small launchers like the Spectrum can be used to put miniature satellites – used for Earth observation or Internet coverage, for instance – into orbit.

In addition to Isar Aerospace, Europe is home to Germany's Hy-Impulse and Rocket Factory Augsburg (RFA), French groups Latitude and MaiaSpace and Spain's PLD Space, all racing to establish themselves as key players in the sector.

"The rise of these new actors and new European launch services is part of a common objective: to guarantee independent and sovereign access to space. Their role is expected to strengthen in the coming years," Toni Tolker-Nielsen, director of Space Transportation at the European Space Agency (ESA), told AFP.

# Trump intent on having Greenland as territory flays uninited US delegation

**P**resident Donald Trump yesterday doubled down on his suggestion that the US should take over Greenland as leaders from the semi-autonomous Danish territory criticised a planned trip there this week by a high-profile US delegation.

"I think Greenland is going to be something that maybe is in our future," Trump told reporters after a meeting with officials in his cabinet, saying it was important for US national security.

Greenland's outgoing Prime Minister Mute Egede called plans by the US delegation to visit an American military base and attend a dog sled race a "provocation", and said his caretaker government would not meet with the group.

Trump said his administration was working with "people in Greenland" who want something to happen, but did not elaborate.

"They're calling us," he said. "We're not calling them."

The US visit, which runs from Thursday to Saturday, will be led by Usha Vance, wife of Vice-President JD Vance, and include White House National Security Adviser Mike Waltz and Energy

Secretary Chris Wright. Trump has made US annexation of Greenland a major talking point since his eldest son, Donald Trump Jr, paid a private visit to the vast, mineral-rich island in January.

"Until recently, we could trust the Americans, who were our allies and friends, and with whom we enjoyed working closely," Egede told local newspaper *Sermitsiaq*. "But that time is over."

Nalakkarsuisut, the Greenlandic government, is now in a caretaker phase following a March 11 parliamentary election won by the Democrats, a pro-business party that favours a slow approach to independence from Denmark.

Jens-Frederik Nielsen, leader of the Democrats, called for political unity and criticised the timing of the US visit during coalition talks with municipal elections due next week.

"We must not be forced into a power game that we ourselves have not chosen to be a part of," Nielsen said yesterday.

Similarly, Danish Foreign Minister Lars Lokke Rasmussen said yesterday the visit was "problematic" and showed "a lack of respect".

"These are not random tourists. And you sense it is a signal. It is a

charm offensive to pull Greenland towards the United States," Lokke Rasmussen told public broadcaster DR.

"There is no appetite for this neither in Greenland nor in the Kingdom (of Denmark) and it is therefore not good timing."

Brian Hughes, spokesman for the White House National Security Council, said the visit aimed to "build on partnerships that respect Greenland's self-determination and advance economic co-operation".

"This is a visit to learn about Greenland, its culture, history, and people and to attend a dog sled race the United States is proud to sponsor, plain and simple," Hughes said.

Two US Hercules military transport planes arrived in Greenland's capital Nuuk late on Sunday, carrying security personnel and bulletproof vehicles, Greenland's online news outlet *Sermitsiaq* reported.

Around 60 police officers from Denmark also arrived in Nuuk on Sunday, state broadcaster KNR reported.

Waltz and Wright plan to visit the Pituffik space base, the US military base located along the shortest route from Europe to North America, vital for its ballistic missile warning system.

They will then join Vance to visit historical sites and attend the national dog sled race.

Vance said in a video posted by the US consulate in Greenland that her visit was meant to "celebrate the long history of mutual respect and co-operation between our nations".

Trump, who first floated the idea of buying Greenland in 2019, has renewed his calls for the US to take over the island since his return to the White House in January, and he has not ruled out using force to achieve this objective.

Greenland is rich in raw materials, including minerals critical to advance new technologies.

The governments of both Greenland and Denmark have voiced opposition to any US takeover.

Danish Prime Minister Mette Frederiksen said in a written comment reacting to news of the US delegation's visit that "this is something we take seriously".

She said Denmark wanted co-operation with the US, a Nato ally, but on the basis of "the fundamental rules of sovereignty", adding that Copenhagen and Greenland's future government would both be involved in any talks with the US regarding the island.

## Chaos as cyberattack hits Ukraine rail service

**A** powerful cyberattack knocked out the online ticketing system for Ukraine's state railway service, causing long queues at stations yesterday in what Kyiv officials said looked like a Russian attempt to "destabilise" the situation.

The rail system is a vital way for civilians and freight to travel round wartime Ukraine – a country twice the size of Italy – where air travel had been grounded due to regular missile and drone strikes since Russia's full-scale invasion in 2022.

There was no comment from Moscow about the attack.

Blaming the cyberattack on the "enemy", shorthand usually used by Kyiv to mean Russia, officials said rail travel had not been affected but that work was still under way to restore the online ticketing system more than 24 hours after the hack.

An outage was first reported on Sunday when the rail company notified passengers about a failure in its IT system and told them to buy tickets on-site or on trains.

"The latest attack was very systematic, unusual and multi-level," rail company Ukrzaliznytsia wrote on the Telegram app.

Long lines had formed at Kyiv's central train station last morning as people waited to buy tickets. Booking offices said tickets were only available for travel until Tuesday.

The Ukrainian rail company, which has grappled with Russian

missile strikes at various points during the war, did not explicitly say who it thought was behind the attack.

A Ukrainian security official and a senior government source, both of whom were speaking on condition of anonymity, said the attack looked like it had been carried out by Russia.

The security official said the attack appeared aimed at exerting psychological pressure on Ukrainians and destabilising the social and political situation.

"It was some hacker group. We think that they are Russians. It is a strong strike but not critical," the government source said, also saying that it looked aimed at "destabilisation."

Trains have been the main mode of transportation for domestic and international passengers since 2022, as well as a key route for weapons and equipment deliveries.

The system transported around 20mn passengers and 148mn tonnes of freight last year, Deputy Prime Minister Oleksiy Kuleba said at the end of 2024.

Oleksandr Pertsovskyi, Ukrzaliznytsia's board chairman, said on national television that the company had handled the fallout from the attack well.

"Operational traffic did not stop for a single moment. The enemy attack was aimed at stopping trains, but we quickly switched to backup systems."

## AIDS pandemic risks surge after US funding halt

**T**he world risks returning to the worst days of the global AIDS pandemic following the sudden halt to US foreign aid funding, the UN's top AIDS official said yesterday, warning millions would die.

The United States has historically been the world's biggest donor of humanitarian assistance, but President Donald Trump has slashed international aid since returning to the White House two months ago, putting the entire humanitarian community into a tailspin.

UNAIDS executive director Winnie Byanyima said that if the US funding is not reinstated or others do not step in to fill the

gap, "there will be an additional... 6.3mn AIDS-related deaths", a 10-fold increase, in the next four years alone.

"You're talking of losing the gains that we have made over the last 25 years. It is very serious," she told reporters in Geneva.

"It is reasonable for the United States to want to reduce its funding over time, but the sudden withdrawal of life-saving support is having a devastating impact," she said.

"The US cuts mean that today, 27 countries in Africa and Asia are experiencing shortages of staff, disruptions of diagnostics treatment and surveillance systems are collapsing."

Looking beyond the next four years, if aid funding is not restored, "we see the AIDS pandemic... resurging globally", grow-

ing in Eastern Europe and Latin America, Byanyima said.

"We'll see it come back, and we'll see people die the way we saw them in the '90s and in the 2000s." She hailed US leadership in the fight against AIDS as "the greatest acts of humanity in global health".

She highlighted the US anti-HIV initiative PEPFAR, which is considered one of the world's most successful public health efforts, having saved an estimated 26 million lives over two decades.

Now, thanks to US innovations, the world is "at the cusp of another revolution in prevention treatment", Byanyima said, pointing to a new drug called lenacapavir, developed by US pharmaceutical giant Gilead.

Trials have showed the drug to be 100% effective, and Byanyima

said tests were under way towards providing it as a single injection per year – far more affordable for low-income countries.

"That is almost like a flu vaccine," she said. "If this could be rolled out ambitiously... we could cut down new infections to close to zero. We could see the end of AIDS."

Byanyima appealed to the "ideal-maker" Trump directly, insisting that rescuing the global HIV response was "an amazing deal": lenacapavir is able to "make profits for Gilead, to create good jobs for Americans and to save lives".

She suggested that when PEPFAR is brought back online, UNAIDS could work with the United States and other donors to help low-income countries become self-sufficient in the fight against HIV.

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
