

Al Khor register 3-0 win over Umm Salal

Gomes nets a double in much-needed win for Al Khor, Al Shamal beat Al Shahania 3-0

Ricardo Gomes struck as a brace as Al Khor scored a much-needed yet impressive 3-0 win over Umm Salal Qatar Stars League at the Al Khor Stadium yesterday.

Gomes scored in the stoppage time of both the halves - 45+2 minute and 90+1 minute - while Sofiane Hanni scored one in the 58th minute.

It was Al Khor's only second win of the league, and came after six games. Their last win was over Al Gharafa.

The result took Al Khor's points tally into double figures (10pts) although they still remain in twelfth place in the standings. For Umm Salal, this was their 12th loss and they remain in 11th place in the rankings with 15 points.

Al Khor, who according to their coach Salam Shaker, were pepped up psychologically prior to this match, showed superb intent

right from the start and succeeded in finding their way to success.

Al Khor were aggressive but were tied down for almost all of the opening half by Umm Salal.

Al Khor's Cape Verdean forward Gomes was initially disappointed when an attempt of his went just wide of the right post and later a header also missed the target. But just ahead of the half time whistle, Gomes produced a gem to provide his teammates the right motivation.

Having placed himself perfect-

ly ahead of a shadowing defender, Gomes caught an Hanni corner kick to make the deflection superbly and the ball hit the top of the bar on the inside on the right before going in.

Al Khor returned more vigorous in the second session and soon found their second goal through a fine combine.

Abdulaziz Hazaa Alhassia cut across a lob from the left and Aitor Garcia Flores unleashed a volley strike which was stave away by a diving Umm Salal goalkeeper Ahmed Basher Ali but the ball went to an alert Hanni on the

left and his left-foot kick saw the ball take the inside of the crossbar on the left before going into the net.

There more joy for Al Khor fans towards the end as Gomes made a flying header off a corner kick (taken by Ahmad Hassan al-Mohannadi) for the ball to diagonally find its way into the right corner.

Meanwhile, Al Shamal also scored a 3-0 win over Al Shahania at the Al Bayt Stadium yesterday. Younes El Hammach (15th minute), Mouafak Awad (61st minute) and Mohamed Rafik Omar (75th minute) scored for the winners.

**PSG's Enrique
keen to keep
momentum going**

Paris St Germain (PSG) have a chance of winning Ligue 1 with seven games to spare if they win at Saint-Etienne and other results go their way this weekend, but coach Luis Enrique is keen to keep momentum going to help clinch more silverware. Unbeaten PSG have a 19-point lead over second-placed Olympique de Marseille with eight matches to go as they stand on the verge of their fourth straight Ligue 1 title. If PSG win, Marseille lose, and the next two teams in the standings, AS Monaco and Nice, drop points, that will ensure PSG's 11th league title since 2012-13, and the second straight crown under Luis Enrique. "We're never champions until it's mathematically a foregone conclusion. But we're the best team in Ligue 1. We're going to use this moment so that these eight games can be used for more global objectives," Luis Enrique told reporters yesterday. The Spaniard, who previously led Barcelona to a treble of La Liga, Champions League and Spanish Cup titles in 2015, has an opportunity to repeat the feat this year. "We need to be ready for the two or three months of competition," he said.

PSG, who lost to Borussia Dortmund in the Champions League semi-finals last season, will face Aston Villa in the two-leg quarter-finals of the continental competition next month, after a French Cup semi-final against Ligue 2 side Dunkerque.

Luis Enrique said PSG were fully motivated ahead of their visit to relegation-threatened Saint-Etienne who sit 17th in the table, one point below Le Havre who have played a game more.

Saint-Etienne were closing in on their first win since January when they were 2-0 up at bottom side Montpellier on March 16, but the match was abandoned after home fans threw flares onto the pitch.

Batsmen, bowlers combine to help RCB hammer CSK

CAPTAIN PATIDAR SMASHED A HALF CENTURY BEFORE EXPERIENCED HAZLEWOOD GRABBED 3 FOR 21

Table-topping Royal Challengers Bengaluru thrashed Chennai Super Kings by 50 runs yesterday for a second win in this year's Indian Premier League (IPL), inspired by a "game-changing" performance from fast bowler Josh Hazlewood. Chasing 197, Chennai wilted despite a late cameo by veteran M S Dhoni who clubbed 30 runs off 16 balls, batting low down at nine in the order.

Australian seamer Hazlewood, who finished with 3-21 in his four overs, and skipper Rajat Patidar's 32-ball 51, sealed Bengaluru's comfortable victory.

Patidar, who is hoping to force his way into the India T20 team, was well-supported by teammates with openers Phil Salt and Virat Kohli both making scores in the thirties in a total of 196-7.

Chennai lost early wickets to Hazlewood and India veteran Bhuvneshwar Kumar, who finished with 1-20 in his three overs.

Hazlewood removed Rahul Tripathi (1) and Chennai skipper Ruturaj Gaikwad (0) in the second over of the innings.

Deepak Hooda (4) was then dis-

missed by Kumar in the fifth over to leave the home team reeling at 26-3.

Yash Dayal took 2-18 in his three overs with England's Liam Livingstone finishing with 2-28 in four overs of spin.

India duo Ravindra Jadeja (25) and Shivam Dube (19) put up

some resistance before Chennai limped to 146-8. Patidar said his "was a very important (innings). We were targeting 200 because that wouldn't be easy to chase" in Chennai. "My goal was clear that as long as I was there, I would maximise every ball."

Patidar said that Hazlewood's

spell "was game-changing because we got two-three wickets in the first six overs".

Earlier, Kohli made a scrappy 30-ball 31 with the Indian superstar and Salt (32), falling to Afghanistan leg-spinner Noor Ahmad.

Noor was the most impressive

of all the Chennai bowlers and finished with an impressive 3-36 in his four overs.

Devdutt Padikkal (27) and Tim David, with an eight-ball 22, also played important roles to boost the visitors' total.

"It wasn't that easy to bat," said Chennai skipper Gaikwad who

added "bad fielding cost us" the game.

Lucknow's dashing Pooran justifies the top order slot

Lucknow Super Giants captain Rishabh Pant said sacrificing the number three slot for Nicholas Pooran was well worth it after they beat Sunrisers Hyderabad on Thursday for their first victory of the new Indian Premier League (IPL) season.

Lucknow wanted an aggressive left-handed batter to follow their right-right opening pair of Mitch Marsh and Aiden Markram and the choice was between Pant and Pooran, both renowned for their six-hitting prowess.

Former West Indies captain Pooran smacked six sixes and as many fours in his 70 off just 26 balls as Lucknow thumped Hyderabad by five wickets.

Pooran's 13 sixes in two matches is the highest by any batter this season and his powerplay carnage drew praise from Pant, who has dropped down to number four in the batting order.

"The thought was to give freedom to him," the Lucknow captain said after their victory in Hyderabad.

"We know what damage he can do down the order. I like that

freedom too, but you have got to give someone that charge that you have to go and express yourself.

"The way he has been batting is phenomenal for us."

Pooran raced to an 18-ball fifty against Hyderabad and his second-wicket partnership of 116

with Marsh set up their comfortable victory.

"I don't plan to hit sixes," Pooran said. "I just try my best to get in good positions and if it's there, just time the ball nicely."

"In the last nine years I have been working on my craft. Obvi-

ously, I have been getting the opportunity to bat higher up in the powerplay as well."

"It is really important to cash in when the wicket is nice and obviously when the match-up is there you try your best to execute your skills."

Brennan wins again, Ayuso has lead in Catalonia

Sprinter Matthew Brennan continued his breakout season as he exploded past the pack in a bunch sprint on a blustery stage five of the Tour of Catalonia yesterday, his second win of the race.

Spaniard Juan Ayuso retook the overall lead from Primoz Roglic after taking a bonus second on the intermediate sprint as wind split the peloton with Simon Yates losing 41sec in the overall standings.

With two days to go Ayuso leads Roglic by 1sec with Enric Mas third at 21sec, Mikel Landa fourth at 22s and Lenny Martinez fifth at 28sec.

"It's better to lead by a second than trail by one," said Ayuso, a 22-year-old from Barcelona. "It's nice to have the jersey and this race is so often won by a very narrow margin."

Visma rider Brennan is just 19.

The Briton held the overall leader's green and white jersey for two stages after his opening day win in Barcelona. Today's mountain

run could prove decisive with four climbs including a summit finish at Queralt. "It's very easy to get dropped there. It'll be a great

Bangladesh star Tamim back home after health scare

Dhaka: Former Bangladeshi cricket captain Tamim Iqbal returned home yesterday, days after suffering a massive heart attack during a local match. The 36-year-old was leading Mohammad Sporting Club in a match of the 50-over Dhaka Premier Division Cricket League when he was rushed to a nearby hospital complaining of severe chest pain on Monday. He was given stenting surgery the same day and later moved to a bigger health facility in the capital Dhaka. "After observing his health condition, we have decided to discharge him today," Shahabuddin Talukder, a doctor at Evercare Hospital told reporters. He added that Tamim would have to maintain a rehabilitation pro-

gramme and modify his lifestyle. "We hope he will be able to return to cricket soon," he added. Abu Zafar of the Bangladeshi health ministry told reporters on Wednesday that it was uncertain whether Tamim would be able to return to cricket. "Tamim won't be able to play sports for the next three months. If everything goes well, then he will be able to return," he said. "Unfortunately, he is a smoker, which is a risk factor for heart attacks. He must stay away from it. He will have to follow doctors' advice." Tamim scored more than 15,000 runs for Bangladesh in a career spanning 15 years and remains the only Bangladeshi to score hundreds in all formats of international cricket.

Root not eyeing England white-ball captaincy

Former Test skipper Joe Root has ruled himself out of contention for England's white-ball captaincy, saying the ship has sailed to take over the role following Jos Buttler's resignation.

England need a new limited-overs captain after Buttler stepped down during their dismal Champions Trophy campaign in Pakistan, where they lost all three matches, but Root expected the team to bounce back from their failure.

Asked about the white-ball captaincy, Root told Sky Sports yesterday: "I don't think so. I think that ship's sailed. I think I've done my time as a captain in England."

"But I'm sure whoever gets the opportunity to do it will be extremely proud and do a brilliant job."

"The Champions Trophy was disappointing. We didn't play anywhere near what we're capable of but there's so much talent and so much more to come from that team."

The 30-year-old is looking ahead to the home Test series against India from June 20 and the Ashes in Australia from November 21, where he hopes to secure his first series win after past defeats.

"I think we're capable of (winning The Ashes). I think we've got to look after things leading up to that. We've got to play some really strong cricket at home," he added.

"We are good in our own conditions but with India coming over for a five-match series there's no

hiding place. It's a long old slog, you've got to be consistent."

Bairstow still has England ambitions despite Yorkshire captaincy role

Jonny Bairstow is still aiming for an England recall after being appointed as Yorkshire's red-ball cricket captain.

Bairstow was installed as skipper a week before the start of the English domestic season after the 35-year-old looked to feature in either the Indian Premier League or Pakistan Super League.

Instead, he will now captain Yorkshire, the most successful club in the history of the County Championship with 32 outright titles, as they look to return to the First Division.

Bairstow's late father David led Yorkshire from 1984 to 1987 and Jonny said: "He played here for 20 years and was captain as well. There's not many fathers and sons who have done it. The county is embedded in my heart, and I take immense pride in representing the club on the field."

Bairstow, while a veteran of 100 Tests and 187 limited-overs internationals, has not featured in any kind of England squad since last year's T20 World Cup.

But he still has six months left on the two-year England deal he signed in 2023 and, asked if he was thinking of an international recall, replied: "I'm still contracted. I'd be stupid not to. But it's not my choice. That bit is completely out of my control. I can load the gun, but I won't be the one pulling the trigger. We'll wait and see on that."

Ruthless Red Bull dump Lawson for Tsunoda ahead of Japanese GP

Hong Kong: Red Bull said yesterday that Liam Lawson has been axed and replaced by Yuki Tsunoda, confirming days of speculation after disappointing performances in the first two races of the F1 season.

Tsunoda will take over from the New Zealander starting at his home Japanese Grand Prix next week at Suzuka, Red Bull said in a statement.

The 24-year-old Tsunoda moves up from the Racing Bulls (RB) sister team to partner four-time world champion Max Verstappen, with Lawson moving back down to RB, where he was last season. Christian Horner, Red Bull team principal, said: "It has been difficult to see Liam struggle with the RB21 at the first two races and as a result we have collectively taken the decision to make an early switch. "We came into the 2025 season with two ambitions, to retain the world drivers' championship and to reclaim the world constructors' title, and this is a purely sporting decision."

Lawson, 23, who was drafted in from RB in the winter to replace

Sergio Perez, has endured a miserable start to the season and life at one of the top teams on the grid. He has been knocked out at the first stage of all three qualifying sessions and has yet to score a point.

Verstappen in the other Red Bull is second in the title race with 36 points, eight behind early season leader Lando Norris of McLaren. "We have a duty of care to protect and develop Liam, and together we see that after such a difficult start, it makes sense to act quickly so Liam can gain experience, as he continues his F1 career with Racing Bulls, an environment and a team he knows very well," Horner added.

Tsunoda has shown pace on both race weekends of the season. He was 12th in the season opener at Melbourne and only finished out of the points on Sunday at Shanghai because of RB's flawed two-stop pit strategy.

Tsunoda made his Formula 1 debut with AlphaTauri in 2021, becoming the first Japanese driver on the grid since Kamui Kobayashi in 2014.

"We acknowledge there is a lot of work to be done with the RB21 and Yuki's experience will prove highly

beneficial in helping to develop the current car," said Horner. "We welcome him to the team and

are looking forward to seeing him behind the wheel of the RB21." Tsunoda started racing karts at the

age of four in his native Kanagawa, just outside Tokyo.

He stands just 1.61 metres tall (5ft 3in) and his diminutive frame forced AlphaTauri engineers to develop a made-to-measure pedal kit to make him feel more comfortable in the cockpit. Tsunoda used to be known for his four-letter outbursts on the team radio but displayed a new-found sense of self-control last year, and it helped his performances.

Away from racing, he tries to relax by snowboarding and playing video games, which he describes as "training" for keeping his cool on the track.

"His progress last year, and more recently from the very start of 2025, has been nothing less than sensational," Laurent Mekies, team principal of RB, said in a statement Thursday. He added: "Everyone here at (the team) is looking forward to working hard with Liam to give him the best environment possible for him to shine in our car and to express the talent we all know he has."

Lawson will partner with France's Isack Hadjar at RB.

Pegula beats Eala to set up final with Sabalenka

Sabalenka needed just 71 minutes to win against sixth seed Paolini

Philippines sensation Alexandra Eala's remarkable run at the Miami Open came to a brave end with a three-set loss to Jessica Pegula in the semi-finals on Thursday.

In an enthralling battle over 2hrs 24mins, fourth-seeded American Pegula emerged with a 7-6 (7/3), 5-7, 6-3 win to seal a place in today's final against world number one Aryna Sabalenka.

Sabalenka blasted her way into the final with a 6-2, 6-2 demolition of Italy's Jasmine Paolini.

The 19-year-old Eala, ranked 140th in the world, had only two WTA main draw victories to her name before arriving in Miami.

She proceeded to beat three Grand Slam winners in Jelena Ostapenko, Madison Keys and world number two Iga Swiatek.

The lowest-ranked semi-finalist in the tournament's history, Eala seriously threatened to go one step further with another accomplished and effervescent display.

The tide looked to have turned against her when Pegula broke to go 3-1 up in the second set, but Eala broke back and her fist pump and look of determination was a sign of things to come.

Eala broke Pegula three times in the set and was broken twice herself but crucially was able to hold when serving for the set at 6-5.

Both players protected their serve better in the deciding set but Eala's forehand let her down when the American broke to go 5-3 up and she served out for a victory that brought her visible relief.

"Of course there is disappointment right after the match," said Eala. "But there are just so many times in tennis where you have

to dig through the dirt to look for the positive and I'm just enjoying because there is so much positive around me and I don't know how many times that happens," she added.

Playing with a strapped thigh from the outset, Eala turned her ankle mid-way through the second set but said she had not been impacted by the injury.

"I literally gave everything I had, I'm half tape, I'm like a mummy. I did everything and I have no regrets," she said.

"To have a week like this, the stars need to align and they did this week, and hopefully I can keep that up - that is my goal now, to keep this up," she added.

Pegula said it had been difficult to play an opponent like Eala.

"I let her back in the match at 3-1 up (second set) and she just

started ripping her balls, going for her shots and you just have to weather the storm with people like that. She competes really well," said the American.

Sabalenka needed just 71 minutes to wrap up her win against the sixth seed Paolini.

The Belarusian, beaten in the Indian Wells final earlier this month by Mirra Andreeva, will appear in the Miami final for the first time in her career.

"I'm super happy with the level I played today. Of course super happy to be in my first Miami Open final," said Sabalenka.

Sabalenka was never behind against Paolini. She served six aces and broke the Italian's serve four times. "I definitely would say that this was one of the best matches in the season so far. I don't know, I was just so focused

on myself, on the things I had to do today," she said.

"It felt like everything was just going smoothly my way."

Sabalenka will be keen to banish the memory of defeat in the Indian Wells final and in the Australian Open final, where she lost to Keys.

"The lessons (of those defeats) was I believe focus on myself, not on what's going on the other side," she said.

Nuno urges Forest to write new chapter ahead of quarters

Nuno Espírito Santo wants Nottingham Forest to write a new chapter in the club's proud history by reaching the FA Cup semi-finals for the first time in 34 years.

Forest, chasing a Champions League place after a fine Premier League season, travel to Brighton for the last-eight tie today, knowing they are one win away from a date at Wembley.

They have not played an FA Cup semi-final since 1991 under Brian Clough, when they lost to Tottenham in the final, and Nuno is determined to end the wait.

"As a group and as a club we have managed to change many things. We've broken records that have stood for 30, 40 years," said the Forest manager.

"Suddenly we have another chance to break another. This is how we think."

"Since the beginning of the FA Cup, we have had only one ambition - to go as far as possible."

Forest, who needed penalty shoot-outs to get past third-tier Exeter and Premier League strugglers Ipswich, hammered Brighton 7-0 in February's Premier League meeting at the City Ground, but Nuno said that result would have no bearing on this weekend's

match. "We want to go as far as possible in the FA Cup. We love this competition and our fans love it," he said. "In terms of the bond between fans and the squad, it is growing, it is getting stronger."

"There is a natural belief on both sides that we can do anything, as long as we keep our same approach, work as hard as we can."

Forest's prolific striker Chris Wood is missing with a hip injury picked up on international duty with New Zealand and the club are awaiting results of a scan to assess the severity of the injury.

Nuno's men are third in the Premier League, five points clear of fourth-placed Chelsea and six ahead of fifth-placed Manchester

City with nine games to go.

A top-four finish for Forest would guarantee qualification for Europe's elite competition for the first time since the 1980/81 season and fifth spot would likely be enough.

The club were crowned European champions under Clough in 1979 and again the following year.

Mateta 'ready' to return for Palace in FA Cup after horror injury

Mateta is "ready" to return for Crystal Palace in their FA Cup quarter-final against Fulham today after suffering a horrific ear injury in the previous round. Mateta needed 25 stitches to his left ear after being kicked in the head by Millwall goalkeeper Liam Roberts in Palace's FA Cup fifth-round victory on March 1. Roberts, who caught Mateta as he rushed out from goal, received an extended six-game ban.

The 27-year-old French striker has not played since that match during a period that has included a two-week international break.

Palace manager Oliver Glasner said Friday that Mateta, who has scored 15 goals in all competitions this season, is ready to play at Craven Cottage this weekend.

"Oh yes, he trains now for two weeks with us," said the Austrian. "Of course, always with his protection and it's also

important for him to train a little bit. "We had an internal game in the international break where he could play for 60 minutes without any problems. He's ready." Mateta will wear a protective mask against Fulham.

"I said to him to maybe try water polo because he is tall enough," said Glasner. "It looks a little bit strange, but he says he is comfortable."

"Let's see, when he scores a header tomorrow then it was the right mask and the right protection."

Palace chairman Steve Parish described the incident as the "most reckless challenge" he had ever seen, but Mateta said it was a case of "too much emotion" in the heat of the battle.

"Liam contacted me and texted me while I was in hospital and I told him, 'It is OK, it is football,'" Mateta told Sky Sports. "He apologised. He was worried."

Guardiola seeks redemption as City head to Bournemouth

Pep Guardiola takes Manchester City back to Bournemouth in the FA Cup quarter-finals tomorrow hoping to avenge the defeat that sparked their stunning decline this season.

City's 32-game unbeaten run in the Premier League came to a shock end when they were beaten 2-1 at Bournemouth in November.

Coming just days after a League Cup last-16 exit at Tottenham, it was the first time City had lost successive games in all competitions since September 2023.

City, champions for the previous four seasons, surrendered pole position in the Premier League to Liverpool as a result of their loss at the Vitality Stadium and won only once in their next 11 games in all competitions.

Looking back at City's first-ever defeat to Bournemouth, Guardiola - whose team are fifth in the league - acknowledged he could see the signs of their impending collapse.

"It was our first defeat in the Premier League this season. We have to learn from it and try to reach the semi-finals," Guardiola told reporters yesterday.

"That was the first game where



we were a little bit not competitive in terms of the standards we required.

"The game before we lost in the (League) Cup against Spurs. We were good there. But I could not turn around the symptoms that the (Bournemouth) game started, in terms of being present and winning duels."

"I tried for many months. This time it took more time."

With their dynastic reign over English football suddenly fading, City have been reduced to fighting to qualify for next season's Champions League, while a third FA Cup triumph in the Guardiola era would salvage a little pride.

"The target is to reach the FA Cup semi-finals for seven years in a row, then after that we have to win games to qualify for the Champions League," Guardiola said.

"In the good moments you learn and in the bad moments you learn. We have to be sure he is fine before he is involved."

don't learn they will happen again. "When I said in the past Champions League qualification was a huge success, people didn't believe me. Now they believe me."

After FA Cup final victories over Watford in 2019 and Manchester United in 2023, Guardiola could become only the eighth manager to win the trophy three times.

"Of course with the season we have, to come back to Wembley, with the chance to reach the final, that would be nice," said the Catalan, whose team lost to United in last year's final. "We take the FA Cup seriously like the League Cup in the past when we won it four times in a row."

Asked if Rodri could return in time for the FA Cup final or the Club World Cup in June and July, Guardiola refused to give a timeline for the Spain midfielder's recovery.

Rodri was expected to miss the rest of the season after having surgery on his ruptured anterior cruciate ligament in September, but the Ballon d'Or winner has been training with City recently.

Ex-Barcelona star Dani Alves has conviction annulled

A Spanish appeals court overturned yesterday former Brazil international footballer Dani Alves' rape conviction, citing insufficient evidence.

Alves was sentenced to four-and-a-half years in jail in February last year for raping a young woman in the VIP bathroom of a Barcelona nightclub on December 31, 2022.

The 41-year-old, who won the Champions League three-times with Barcelona, was released from jail last March pending his appeal after he posted the one million euros (\$1.1mn) bail set by the court.

The appeals court said its four judges had "unanimously" accepted the player's appeal and "annulled" his conviction.

His trial contained "a series of gaps, inaccuracies, inconsistencies, and contradictions regarding the facts, the legal assessment, and its consequences," the court said in its ruling.

Alves' accuser was an "unreliable complainant" since her testimony "differed notably" from evidence of video footage taken before she and Alves entered the bathroom where she alleges the player forced her to have sex without her consent.

Alves initially denied knowing his accuser in a TV interview but later acknowledged having sex with her after CCTV footage emerged showing the pair entering the lavatory of the nightclub.

He told La Vanguardia newspaper he had lied because he was afraid his wife would leave him.

The appeals court also lifted all restrictions on Alves, including a travel ban and restraining order, and dropped a 150,000-euro compensation claim against his accuser.

"Alves is very happy. He is innocent, that is demonstrated. Justice has spoken," his lawyer Ines Guardiola told RAC1 radio.

But former equality minister Irene Montero, who drafted a tough new law against sexual offences which came into effect in 2023, said the ruling was a "clear example" of "patriarchal justice that does not protect women and maintains the culture of impunity for aggressors".

The appeals court ruling can still be appealed to the Supreme Court. Alves was a pivotal part of an all-conquering Barcelona team - crowned La Liga champions six times - and won 126 caps for Brazil, winning the Copa America twice. He also won European league titles with Italian giants Juventus and French outfit Paris Saint Germain.

At the time of his arrest, he was contracted to Mexican club Pumas UNAM - he was sacked soon afterwards. Brazil's leftist President Luiz Inacio Lula da Silva criticised the court's decision to grant Alves bail, saying at the time that money "cannot undo the crime that a man commits by raping a woman".


Ancelotti to go on trial for alleged tax fraud

Real Madrid coach Carlo Ancelotti will go on trial next week for allegedly failing to declare income to Spain's tax office, the Madrid court which will hear the case said yesterday. Prosecutors are seeking a jail term of four years and nine months for the 65-year-old Italian, accusing him of costing Spain's treasury more than one million euros (\$1.1mn) in undeclared earnings from image rights in 2014 and 2015. The trial will begin on Wednesday and it is expected to last two days, a spokesman for the court said.

Ancelotti, who as a coach has won a record five Champions League trophies including three with Real Madrid, must be present for the hearings, the spokesman added.

Ancelotti appeared fairly relaxed about the announcement when he appeared at his pre-match press conference yesterday.

"This is not the place really to talk about it," he said.
